From the President

Greetings, and welcome to our November newsletter.

I don't know about anyone else, but I seem to be running out of days in which to complete all my projects for 2019. Usually by this time of year I have almost finished my Christmas cards and correspondence for the year and have it all ready for posting on 1st December. So far, nothing! I've been reflecting on what to say this month in our newsletter, when a wonderful book entitled *The World's Heritage* landed on my desk from the UK.

Also, last week, Ayer's Rock or Uluru—Kata Tjuta National Park received some publicity in the press, announcing its closure to hikers. Having climbed it about 60 years ago, I had no intention of ever doing it again! Believe me, it is dangerous and the chains provided for safety get so hot you could give yourself a nasty burn if you grabbed them! So much for being young and stupid.

Anyway, this book is a guide to the most interesting sites on our planet and lists all the UNESCO World Heritage sites. This list currently includes 1073 sites. These include 832 cultural, 206 natural and 35 mixed properties, all of which have been recognised for their "outstanding universal value" as determined by the 1972 UNESCO *Convention Concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage*.

Criteria used for including Uluru on the World Heritage list for both its natural and cultural values include:-

- Traditional human settlement
- Heritage associated with events of universal significance
- Natural phenomena or beauty
- Major stages of earth's history.

It was included on the list in 1987 and is one of the 19 sites listed in Australia. Others include:-

- Australian convict sites
- Fossil mammal sites (Riversleigh/Naracoorte)
- Fraser Island
- Gondwana Rainforests of Australia
- Great Barrier Reef
- Blue Mountains area
- Heard and McDonald Islands
- Kakadu National Park
- Lord Howe Island group

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- Macquarie Island
- Ningaloo Coast
- Purnululu National Park (W.A.)
- Royal Exhibition Building and Carlton Gardens (Melbourne)
- Shark Bay (W.A.)
- Sydney Opera House
- Tasmanian Wilderness area
- Wet Tropics of Queensland
- Willandra Lakes Region (N.S.W.)

Uluru and Kata Tjuta and the surrounding country are part of an important cultural landscape. They dominate the vast red plain of Central Australia, and are composed of hard red sandstone exposed as a result of the folding, faulting and erosion of the surrounding rock. Rock art around its base provides evidence of the cultural traditions of the Anangu Aboriginal people.

The part is home to 21 native mammals including the rare hairy-footed dunnart, the sandhill dunnart and the mulgara. More than 170 bird species, 73 species of reptile and at least 7 species of bat.

When we consider that, damage to World Heritage sites has become more widespread e.g. recently in Iraq and Syria, it is great to think that we now have a worldwide organisation involved in their protection.





Former Late Member "Col" Colin Harold Brown

Colin was born in St Kilda Hospital, Wynnum to parents Robert and Lucy Brown on 2nd August 1932.

Colin grew up in Wynnum and is fair to say was a Wynnumite through and through. Colin was the seventh child of a large family. His siblings were Robert, John, Gordon, Graham, Gloria, Neville and Nancy. The family home was in Chestnut Street, Wynnum just a few metres up from the Wynnum foreshore. Growing up during the Great Depression meant that there was very little money to go around, however Colin had a happy childhood with the Wynnum Esplanade and the iconic Wading Pool as his backyard. They made their own fun. Col went to primary school at Wynnum Central State School and would comment, later in life, at how during the Depression all the kids at school went in bare feet.

As a child and a young man Col loved sailing, cricket and fishing. He played first grade cricket for Wynnum Manly at the age of 16. He won numerous sailing races in which he participated on Moreton Bay. Later, with his good friend Les Clements, he would sail luxury yachts from Manly to the Whitsundays to deliver to wealthy owners.



In his late teens Col moved to Melbourne and was working as a storeman for Colgate Palmolive and worked his way up to Warehouse Manager. Col enjoyed his life in Melbourne, but in his late twenties decided it was time to move backCol to Wynnum.

Col then went on to be an owner operator of a Wynnum soft drink run. In the early 1970's Col began working as a Trades Assistant at GMH in Brisbane and worked there until 1984. After finishing with GMH, Col went to work for Dandy Factory as Head Storeman until he retired at the age of 65 and one day, as he would like to say.

Col enjoyed his retirement. He loved camping and fishing. His special spot was in the dunes north of Cabarita Beach and he would stay for weeks, where he would spend the days beach fishing and walking. He would go well prepared, with a TV and video recorder hooked up to his car battery. He would even take a lawn mower so he would keep his spot mowed.

Col was a member of the Wynnum Manly Historical Society. This made sense because he loved Wynnum and was extremely interested in its history. Col did several talks on historical events and went on many excursions and reunions with his friends from the Historical Society. Col had collected a large amount of historical information about the Wynnum and Manly area over the years - everything carefully put in order in a huge filing cabinet. Col's years of research and resources have been donated to the Historical Society and I believe they are still cataloguing, 18 months later, such was the extent of his passion.

In September 1999 Ky Brown, Col's only grandchild was born. He was the apple of Col's eye. From Ky's birth Col would come up to Bargara from Wynnum at least once a month to see him. Diana and Daryl (his children) also lived there. Col would house-sit for Diana and walk much loved dogs, Rosie and Roxie three times a day. Col enjoyed walking and at the age of 70 he once walked the 20 km from Wynnum to Brisbane Central, just to see if he could.

Col had a series of strokes in December 2017 and was unable to return home to Berrima Street. He was admitted into Palm Lake Care at Bargara. Here he passed away on 16th July 2019. His ashes were scattered into Moreton Bay, from the end of Wynnum Central Jetty, on Saturday 28th September 2019, according to his wishes.

HISTORY OF THE WYNNUM MANLY GIRLS' MARCHING ASSOCIATION

September 1957 Mr Rex Dodd, who was a member of the Wynnum Manly District Band at the time decided to hold a meeting at his home to see if there was enough interest in starting Marching Girls Teams. The first training session was at the old Army Drill Hall near Wynnum Central Station. Approximately 20 girls attended.

They then moved to Kitchener Park (Junior Rugby League Field) and in June 1958 there were then 80 girls participating. The 6 teams at that time were – Coronets & Vikings (Senior), Mariners & Commodores (Junior) Daffodils & Mermaids (Midget). These teams soon became 9 competing teams plus a training squad, where members learnt the basics before being placed in a team.

In 1963 due to limited space available at the football fields, the Association had the foresight to purchase a piece of land on Wondall Rd. It was 15 hectares and included a house. The purchase price was 3000 pound. 3 Members at the time provided the deposit for this land.

This was then the beginning of weeks of work which became years. As this was a rural ground there were many trees to be removed and ground levelled. As all the land was not needed the house was moved to be closer to the fields. In the years to follow a BMX track was also built as well as basketball courts to support other local sporting groups.

Before too long a canteen was built followed by a toilet block and dressing rooms. A music room was built on top of the dressing rooms. This music room was used on training nights and competitions. Posts were put into the middle of the field when speakers were hung so all teams could hear the music (and apparently half of Manly West)

Each of the teams were given their own training field to look after, plus there was a championship field roped off to be used for Championships only.

In 1968 the field was officially opened by Lord Mayor Clem Jones. A memorial with a flag pole commemorated this occasion. This plaque is now on display at the entrance to Bunnings on Wondall Rd, which now stands on the site of the old field.

During the time at the field it was decided to name the field "McFarlane Field" after Mr Bill McFarlane, one of the members who loaned money to purchase the field. Mr McFarlane also volunteered hours of time to maintain the field.

Over the years our club participated in the community through the local Spring Parade. The club were Parade Participants, and Fundraised on a Stall with handicrafts, jams and Mrs Denby's famous fudge. The club also entered members into the Queen Quest which the club were successful in winning a number of times.

Our members remember numerous hours put in by members and their families to raise funds over the years to maintain our field, purchase uniforms and travel to completion events. Funds were raised through events such as – Raffles, Lamington and Pie Drives, Cake stalls, Phone Book deliveries, Christmas Gift wrapping and now Bunnings Sausage Sizzles. These events often strengthened the relationships and bonds of our club members and families.

In the year 2000 changes came to the sport when the first National Championships was held Indoors – here in Brisbane. The sport had to change to keep up the interest with the current generation and being able to perform without the inconvenience of the weather was seen to be important.

Wynnum Manly were the last club to stop training in the outdoors when financially the decision was made to sell McFarlane Field. Member numbers had dropped dramatically through the 1990's when it was not "cool" to be a marching girl. All fundraising dollars at that time were put into the up keep and maintenance of our field.

The 2006/07 season was the last one at McFarlane Field.

The club then moved to the Gospel Hall on Preston Rd to train but as our numbers grew more space was needed so we moved to the Wondall Heights State School, where we have been ever since.

In 2010 another change came to the sport with the name of our National Body changing to DrillDance. This was again aimed to modernise the sport. Most members still head off to "Marching" training each week though.

Although the sport has changed name we still perform Drill routines yet have included Thematic and Dance routines to attract the younger generation. Interestingly younger members are attracted to the sport for the fancy costumes and dance routines but soon enjoy the drill too.

The club continue a few of the past traditions such as our annual Marching Out Parade – although we now celebrate with a club dinner. Our Long Service badges continue to be awarded and volunteers are acknowledged. We even still ensure our team names have a connection to the water.

In the 60 years of the club we have fielded teams for competition every year, with up to 9 teams in one season. In total of the 60 seasons from 1958 – 2017 the Wynnum Manly Marching Association has been represented by 274 teams.

For the club it has always been about – Fun and Friendship which still continues for us today.

This information was provided by Kim Rooding of Wynnum Manly DrillDance (formerly Wynnum Manly Marching Girls' Association) and was prepared for the Club's 60th anniversary celebrations in 2017.

Note from Editor: The Club is still operating under the banner of Wynnum Manly DrillDance and teams train in the Wondall Heights State School Hall. They are always looking for new members—young and old.
