

* May 1867. Plans for a high security penal settlement were revealed for St Helena Island.

* 14th May 1943. Hospital ship *Centaur* was torpedoed, without warning, about 56km east of the tip of Moreton Island. Just 64 of 332 people on board survived after spending 36 hours in the sea. The wreck was not discovered until December 2009 and is now a protected site..

* 22nd May 1905. Well known builder and Methodist lay preacher John Iley Green dies after an industrial accident while supervising the loading of barge on the Brisbane River.

* May 1917 Wynnum Council buys a tar boiling plant to help with the bitumising of local roads.

Now do you remember these May Birthdays?

* Florence Nightingale 1820-1910. Founder of modern, professional, nursing.

- * Henri Durant 1828-1910. Founder of the Red Cross and YMCA.
- * Brahms 1833-1897. Musician and composer.

* Sir Arthur Conan Doyle 1859-1930. Writer and inventor of Sherlock Holmes. He was also a noted Spiritualist.

Mrs Kolodzey was seeking information about her great aunt Edith May KAMPE and her husband Victor (Erik) Markus KAMPE.

The Kampes lived in Earl Parade, Manly from 1934 to 1950, and by 1955 were living at Lower Esplanade, then at 225 Esplanade Lota until 1972, opposite the slipways. Victor hired out twelve-foot planked trainee sailboats for many years. One of the houses in which they lived was next to a tennis court.

Edith May KAMPE died on 18 December 1988, aged 86 years, in Pleasantville. Her parents were Auguste Heinz SCHMARR, an orchardist and Antoinette KARL. Merv Hazell of 221 Esplanade Wynnum was the informant named on Edith May KAMPE's Death Notice.

Mrs Barbara Kolodzey is seeking more information concerning her great aunt and her husband Victor. Where was their house in Earl Parade? Both the KAMPES were cremated at Mt Thompson, but where were their ashes scattered? Please, can anyone help?

Coincidence!

In the newsletter of October 2010 I reported on a search for information about Henry Thomas KING for his grandson, Arthur KING. Henry Thomas KING was a tailor living on the corner of William (Akonna) and Chestnut Streets and he and his wife Louisa produced ten children. Arthur's father, Edgar Francis KING was one of those ten children. Henry Thomas King died in 1919 and his wife Louise died in 1952.

A YOUNG WOMAN'S LIFE IN WYNNUM IN THE 1920s

Mena O'Neill (nee Mackrell) writes.....

I arrived in Australia in December 1924 and spent my first Christmas here in Glenora Street Wynnum. In 1929 my father bought a Ford truck (we didn't say 'utility' then). So I went to Wynnum Police Station for a licence to drive it. Sergeant Proud told me that women didn't drive trucks in Australia. I was amazed, as I had driven cars in Canada in 1922. Anyway we drove around the block and he was very relieved to get back!

I attended the Horticultural Show, like most people in the district. I still have prize cards for cooking and artwork that I won there. I also went to the Drill Hall dances where they held heats for dancing competitions. Mrs Bernie Stoff used to play in the band. The Dance Hall Committee used to pay the local bus owner, Mr Garrity, a lump sum to give us a free bus to dances at Wynnum West and Capalaba.

My father owned a shop in Wynnum and horses and drays used to bring produce from Brisbane's Roma Street markets. We were not allowed to take our truck into the markets until after lunch because it would have frightened the horses. Later we had carriers. Manufacturers used to send travellers to our shop for orders once a month. These came from Simpson's Flour, Morrow's Biscuits, Harpers, Nestles and MacRobertson's Chocolates, Hoffnungs, W D & H O Wills Tobacco.

No groceries were allowed to be sold after 5.30 pm. These had to be partitioned off at one side of the shop. We had a list of exempt goods that we were able to sell after 5.30 and these included fruit and vegetables, cakes and biscuits, ice cream cones, walking sticks, tobacco and lollies.

We only had ice boxes for refrigeration and bought butter in 56 lb blocks, which we had to cut into 1 lb blocks with a wire frame, then wrap. Sugar came to us in 70 lb bags and had to be weighed out. There were very few prepacks of anything. We had a traveller from Marchants selling us paper bags. Kerosene, metho and honey all had to be measured and put into bottles.

We used to buy a lot of fruit locally; custard apples from Lords in Preston Road, bananas from Salways at Hemmant, carrots and beets from Ricketts on Wondal Road, strawberries and paw-paws from Hardies, jam from Hargreaves.

Electricity came to houses in the early 1920s. We had one electric light in the shop and one in our adjoining house. Elsewhere we had lamps. Everyone had tanks, some had showers in outside laundrys, with chip heaters to warm the water by burning paper or chips of wood. We had no detergents, just Barilla soap and other brands such as Sandsoap and Monkey Band to clean wooden kitchen tables, Bon Ami for glass. Some people had no sinks but washed up in tin bowls on kitchen tables or in a kerosene tin cut in half. Clothes were boiled in a 10 gallon copper in the yard. We had long wire clothes lines propped in the middle with a wooden forked pole.

The streets were mostly dirt roads with horse water troughs here and there. Cows, too, roamed the streets and then there were bakers, milk, ice and fish carts. Mr Legge, Poulton, and Powell had smallgoods rounds. We didn't have bottled milk either – you supplied your billycan, which we filled for you. Most people kept fowls so we didn't sell many eggs from our shop, but we did sell lots of corn, bran and pollard and wheat. Also pannikin seed for budgies.

Women wore white cotton or calico underwear, camisoles, petticoats and drawers and corsetry, lisle or silk stockings with lace up boots, later shoes, black satin shoes for evening wear. The petticoats had a depth of crochet or lace on the hems. Black georgette or sober colours for older ladies. We also wore big black hats of georgette on a wire base. We always wore new clothes to go to the Exhibition. Later we graduated to Fuji silk, it was pale cream. Hessian sugar bags were made into aprons and decorated with print cotton. We used to plait dennisons crepe paper into strips and sew it on buckram shapes for hats.

Lytton was a military fort. One part was called Reformatory Hill, where deserters were quartered. Sentries were posted but still some got out, looking for money or tobacco. Later before WWII, Lytton was a training camp. My father's shop supplied the Officers' Mess with extras. I used to deliver them in our truck, but only at certain times because they used to have firing practice there. Once, General Chauvel visited there to review the troops, and we had to supply the flowers and tablecloths for the mess. During the war, petrol was rationed by the issue of a set number of purchase tickets per month. Also some food was rationed, and we had tickets for tea and other items. Cigarettes were under the counter for regular customers.

During the early 1930s there was a Depression. If you were out of work, you received a ticket for 8/- worth of food, tea, sugar, butter and jam. In our shop, we had to itemize the items supplied. Some men had to work with pick and shovels on the roads to earn something. Food tickets were our unemployment relief then. There was very little money about to buy anything. Trade was so bad that my sister and I got jobs in Brisbane serving in fruit shops and then in Anne Hathaway's Café in George Street. It closed down. I then opened a cake shop but had to mix everything by hand and serve as well. We had no Mix Masters then, but I did have an electric stove. The City Council had to put power lines in the street specially, because no one else had an electric stove and there were only power lines for lights.

Eventually I closed the shop and got married.

DAIRY QUEEN MILK BAR, Bay Terrace, Wynnum

I arrived in Wynnum in early 1959 with my wife, Yvonne, and her mother Phyllis HUNT. We sought a small business that the ladies would be able to run. The ideal shop was found, the "Dairy Queen Milk Bar", next to Coles on Bay Terrace right in the main shopping strip. Phyl was recently widowed; she had lived in New Guinea for the previous eight years and did not qualify for any welfare so needed a small income to support herself.

Wynnum was a thriving centre in those days. Irvine's Department Store served the rural areas of western Queensland. Bayard's across the street was also a good departmental store. South of Irvine's there was a butcher on the corner of Florence Street, then opposite Moreton Bay Electrics, Moore's Newsagents, Pimm's Greengrocers, Redbank Butchers, our Milk Bar, with DBS Menswear on the Edith Street Corner. Across the Terrace were found Farley's Hardware, a Chemist, a Doctor, a Real Estate Agent and a Bank.

We traded 8.00am to 10.00 pm. Phyl worked the day with the help of our girls, Joyce Ramsey, Val Geary or Judy Benfer. Eric worked in the evening himself after he came back from his job in the City. The area suffered from the lack of convenient parking facilities. A few of the Traders suggested that the Chamber of Commerce buy land at the bottom of Edith Street to help in this problem, but there was little support coming.

Late in 1967 our lease on the shop expired. We decided that it was time for Phyl to retire. Eric had other interests so we closed the "Dairy Queen" milk bar.



Ethel Rose Argaet

Mrs Ethel Rose Argaet, formerly of Kingsley Terrace, Wynnum, died in the Princess Alexandra Hospital, South Brisbane, on Sunday 8 September 1974 aged 81 years.

She and her late husband Mr W S Argaet, operated the Pioneer Bus Service from 1925 between Manly and Brisbane, firstly from their Cedar Street residence and later Kingsley Terrace.

Mr Argaet died in August 1951 and Mrs Argaet carried on the business until 1952.

Before coming to Wynnum, the couple operated a bus service from Coorparoo in 1924. This service ran from Cavendish Road to the city.

The late Mrs Argaet was a tireless worker for the Queensland Ambulance Transport Brigade, Church and charitable organizations in the Wynnum district.

Before her death, she was residing with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr and Mrs Frank Argaet at Wynnum Road, Cannon Hill.

A private funeral service was held at St Paul's Church of England, Manly, on Wednesday 11 September. This was followed by a service at the Mount Thompson Crematorium.

She is survived by sons, Mr Syd Argaet of Home Hill, Mr Frank Argaet of Cannon Hill and Mr Roger Argaet of Highgate Hill and a number of grandchildren. Obituary from the *Wynnum Herald,* 12 September 1951, p. 1.

William Stanislaus Argaet

Following indifferent health over the last year or so, the death occurred on the 28th August 1951 of Mr William Stanislaus Argaet at his home in Kingsley Terrace, Wynnum.

The fighting spirit which characterized his life prevailed until the end and although his health was not the best, he maintained a personal supervision until the eve of his death over the business which is a glowing tribute and a memorial to a man, who, despite many obstacles, never gave up. With the help of his wife and later his family, the Pioneer Bus Service was built up from one vehicle to the fleet it is to-day.

Bill Argaet was born at Gundagai, NSW in 1894 and was educated at the Parramatta Boys' School. He served in the Merchant Navy in World War I and afterwards settled in Brisbane where he worked firstly with the City Electric Light Co. and later with Borthwicks as an electrician. He then went into the transport business and conducted a bus service through Bowen Hills, later at Coorparoo and in 1925 he commenced the first Manly – Brisbane bus service. Early records show that at the beginning the service consisted of three return trips to Brisbane on weekdays, one on Saturdays and two on Sundays. Now-a-days the Pioneer Service runs 36 trips to and from Brisbane on weekdays, 30 on Saturdays and 27 on Sundays.

Those who can recall the Brisbane Road in the middle twenties will remember what a rough road it was and how the solid rubber tyred Leyland which was the first bus on the run bumped its way to the city and in wet weather was often bogged. The spirit of Bill Argaet and the ready assistance of the passengers however, always managed to get it through somehow. That is what has built the Pioneer Bus Service to the position it now holds.

Remembering how the people had helped him in his early days, always prompted him to quietly assist them in return and especially in the depression years of the early thirties many people were given a helping hand by Bill Argaet and many friendships which strengthened and multiplied as the years passed on were made in this way.

His hobby was radio and in this sphere he is particularly well known. His own station VK4KH was one of the best equipped in the state and it was in his radio den that he could always be found when he had any spare time. A memorial to him in this sphere is the amplifying system which he donated and installed in St Peter's Church of England, Wynnum Central.

He is survived by his wife Ethel Rose and sons Mr Syd Argaet of Home Hill, Mr Frank Argaet of Cannon Hill and Mr Roger Argaet of Highgate Hill and a number of grandchildren.

MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING 18 April 2013
