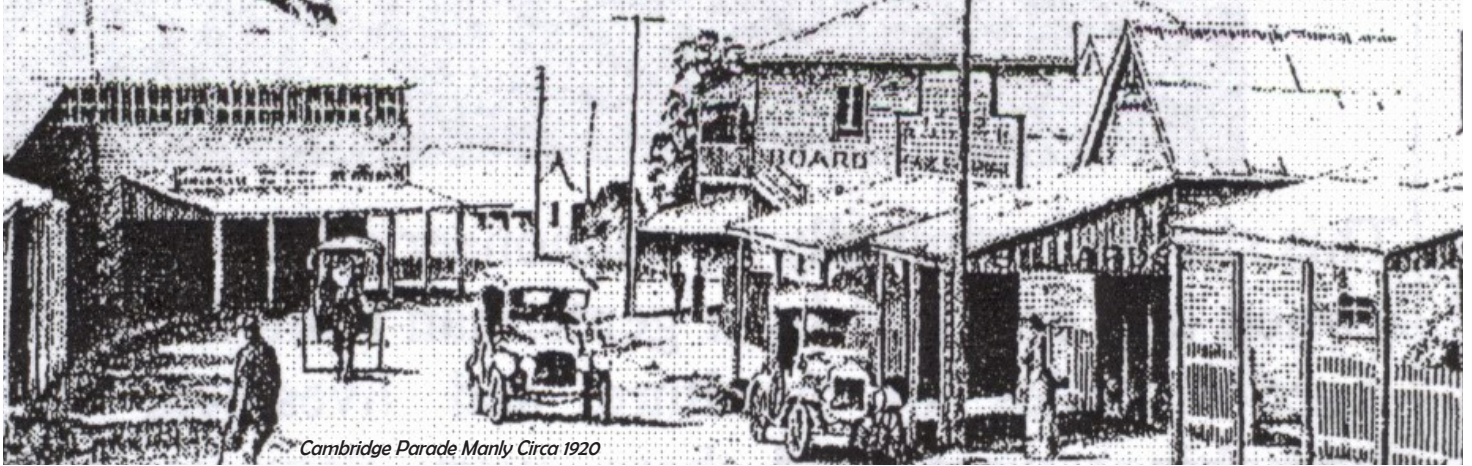

Some September anniversaries include:

- 1st September 1830- Sarah J Hayles published a poem in Boston entitled 'Mary had a Little Lamb'. In 1867 it was set to music and became the classic children's nursery rhyme.
- 1st September 1933- H.G.Well's classic science-fiction novel 'The Shape of Things to Come', was published.
- 1st September 1939- Germany invaded Poland and so started World War II
- 3rd September 1899- Birth of Sir Frank MacFarlane Burnet, the Australian immunologist and winner of the Nobel Prize for Physiology (1960) for his work on acquired immunological tolerance to foreign tissue transplants.

Resource Centre Report – September 2014

- *Visitors who “dropped in” this week and have become members!*

John Rogers called in to enquire about the fate of the guns that once stood on the foreshore. Ian Wheeler and I filled him in and provided the appropriate leaflets. Then John admitted to being a member of the Arms Collectors Guild. This was the group that took the three guns from the foreshore in 1973 and restored them. John and Ian Wheeler had much in common!

John was recommended to join us by member Elaine Gemmell Smith, whom we thank.

Later the same morning **Stewart Burton** came visiting. Stewart was a Margaret Marr Home boy, living there in the early 1940's. He had not visited Wynnum for five years and asked many questions about people he used to know. He and his wife now live in Canberra, but he is interested in keeping in touch with the home of his early days. We are still seeking the date when the Hemmant Quarry filled with water – Stewart phoned me later. His wife was swimming in the dam in 1953. So that narrows our search to late 1930's or 1940's, as the quarry was in use for the supply of roadmetal in the 1930's.

Eighty Grade 3 children descended on us this week, a group on Tuesday and another group on Thursday. Luckily they were in groups of five pupils with a teacher or “minder-parent”. As part of their Local History curriculum they were finding out about their local environment first hand. Their mission in visiting the Resource Room was to find out what used to be on the site of the Library and the our Centre.

We were prepared! We had photographs of “Ingleston” ready on the table, one showing its construction in 1915. We gave the children a question - to calculate the age the building would be if it had not burnt down in August 1947. Ninety nine years was more than some children could calculate.

More pupil groups from different local schools are to visit us in September and in October.



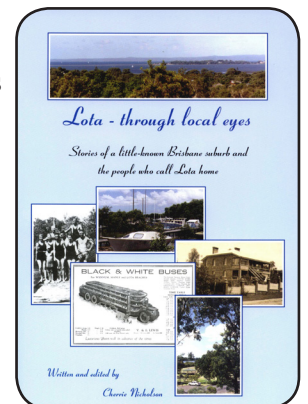

COORPAROO (BRISTOL) POTTERY

Charles A Stone is reputed to have founded the pottery industry in Queensland in 1901 but he took over the pottery that was built on the same site in Coorparoo, by Abraham James, in 1886.

Both men came from England, where they were potters.

Abraham James, was born in Stonehouse, Devonshire in 1854. Stonehouse is now a suburb of Plymouth, on the Sound and very close to the southern border with Cornwall. Father Isaac James was a cordwainer (which is a high- class shoe maker) born in 1817 at Tavistock, just north of Plymouth. Abraham's eight siblings were born around Tavistock and Plymouth between 1842 and 1876.

For seven years, from the age of 14 years to 21 years Abraham was apprenticed in the pottery trade. White clay, kaolin, was prevalent in the local district. However in the 1871 Census, at 15 years Abraham appears as listed as a carpenter.

The whole James family sailed for Queensland in 1876 in the "*British Nation*". Abraham was 22 and married to Mary Ann (Martin/Moreton).

Abraham's knowledge of the pottery trade was of little use to him when he arrived in Queensland. He took up a labouring job, then worked for a contractor and finally became a contractor, in a small way, in his own right. His expertise grew and, by 1883, he was well established. In 1885 Thomas Brentnall, Methodist minister and Member of Parliament, commissioned Abraham James to build his house "Eastleigh" at Coorparoo Junction. Many other construction jobs followed.

On 25 August 1886, Abraham purchased Portion 57, Subdivision 1, between old Cleveland Road and Lackey Avenue. This 10 acre piece of land was on the Old Cleveland Road (in the vicinity of Cavendish Road and Bulimba Creek (Coorparoo Creek) where the family lived in St Leonards Street, Coorparoo.

On the land there were rich deposits of clay, 30 – 40 metres deep. Firstly Abraham built a small kiln and produced red building bricks. His insignia, AJ or A James was stamped on the bricks which have been found in early buildings in Petrie Bight, the Plough Inn, the former South Brisbane Municipal Chambers and the Junction Hotel Coorparoo. By 1887 his brickworks were capable of producing 15,000 bricks per day and a drain pipe a minute, making the venture one of the largest in Queensland at the time.

Abraham stood for election for one of the six local Coorparoo Shire Councillors in November 1888, but was unsuccessful only gaining forty votes and coming seventh on the list.

In the year 1889 there was a widespread occurrence of typhoid fever in Queensland. The Coorparoo Council wondered if the spread was encouraged by people emptying their closet pans into Norman Creek. Mr James had built four workers cottages on his pottery land and stagnant water was lying outside one of these cottages as the drain was blocked further into Mr James's paddock. Five cases of fever were present in three of Mr James's cottages. Mr James refused entry for the drain to be cleared in his paddock. The Coorparoo Council insisted that the job be done, particularly as Mr James's family (5 girls and 2 boys), were also affected by the outbreak.

In 1891 James was producing sanitary ware, pots, all kinds of containers, plates and cups, ink bottles, dinner sets and so on. Before this time such articles were mainly imported.

During the summer holidays, in January 1891 James's wares were exhibited in a shopfront in Queen Street, Brisbane adjacent to Finney and Co. Regular advertisements and articles were printed in the "Brisbane Courier" and the "Queenslander" He advertised his intention to produce Bristol Ware. Bristol China is very hard and white and needs a special furnace. James would have been familiar with the production from his youth as an apprentice potter near Plymouth. In 1891 the brickworks and pottery of Abraham James at Coorparoo was the only major local industry employing 80 men in the 1880's.

The tiled-floors of the South Brisbane Town Hall were from the Coorparoo Pottery.

The floating of a "Coorparoo Pottery Company" was announced in the Brisbane Courier in July 1891, with Abraham James as managing director. He intended to expand his empire to New South Wales where 17½ acres of land at Arncliffe was already under consideration.

But, on 26 March 1891, the Union Bank of Australia took possession of his Coorparoo land.

There are three explanations as to why his enterprise in Coorparoo failed. A writer, years later, blames the floods of 1889, which inundated the lower areas of Coorparoo, for destroying the pottery works. There was a severe depression in the 1890's which slowed economic development. Another more likely explanation is that he attempted to progress too fast, with too many different designs and did not have the capital to sustain the work.

Little more is written of Abraham James in the local Queensland newspapers after 1891.

Charles Arthur Stone also came from England. He was born in Tamworth, Warwickshire in 1867, his father, John Stone was a potter and was born in Walmley, Warwickshire in 1837. His mother was Rosina Jarrett.

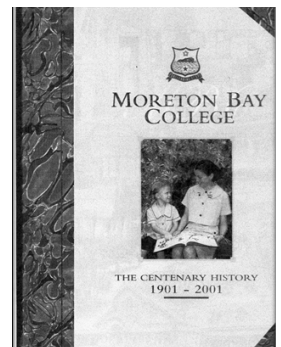

COORPAROO (BRISTOL) POTTERY (cont.)

By 1881, the family had moved to Siston, a village on the outskirts of Bristol and Charles's occupation was that of Potter's son. Siston had a coal colliery, now abandoned.

Charles arrived in Queensland in the "Dacca" on the 9 March 1886 aged 19 years. In 1887 he was living at Dinmore, maybe working in the pottery already established there, near Ipswich. He married Helen Thomson on 5 August 1892, in Merivale Street South Brisbane.

Charles is reported to have taken over the Coorparoo Pottery in the 1890's. The pottery had lain idle and Charles took the venture on "in tribute", maybe from the bank, seeing if he could make the venture workable, but he was struggling to make a living. A large auction sale was announced in 1895 when Charles gave up making bricks and concentrated with the pottery.

The "Bristol Pottery" at Coorparoo officially opened in 1901 and Charles and his family were registered in 1903 as living on the pottery site in Fourth Avenue Coorparoo and at Stratton Terrace, Manly. In 1905 the family were registered in Cavendish Road Coorparoo and by 1908 they had moved to Creek (Coreen) Street in Wynnum. They moved to Wilde Street in 1913. Helen, his wife died in 1919 and Charles remarried Julia Pauli in 1922, at Nambour.

They were living at 'Wilnecote', on the crest of the hill at 84 Hill (Alkoomie) Street in 1925 and until Charles's death in 1936. Eldest son, Reginald Arthur Stone, who lived in Pembroke Street, Coorparoo had become manager of the firm in 1925.

Charles A Stone stood as a candidate for No 1 Ward of the new Wynnum Town Council in 1913 but was defeated only receiving 77 votes. However he was successful in gaining place in the Town Council from 1922 to 1925, the final term before Wynnum became part of Greater Brisbane. He was a member of the Moreton Masonic Lodge and a keen member of the Wynnum Bowling Club. He died in January 1936 and was buried in South Brisbane (Dutton Park) cemetery. His sons carried on the business and adverts were still seen in the press in the 1950's. Cheap imported pottery was blamed for the fall of sales in the local market.

And what of the fate of **Abraham James**, the true founder of the pottery trade in Queensland. One newspaper article recalling early pottery work in Queensland says he went to Africa! However in 1894-95 he is in the NSW Bankruptcy Court - occupation - Builder of Waters Road Neutral Bay. His youngest daughter, Sally died aged 4 years in 1894. In 1899, his wife Mary Ann is in court concerning the sale of land, pottery and brickworks near Sydney.

In 1901 Abraham James is mentioned in a Prospectus for The new Wollongong General Pottery Brick and Tile Co Ltd. He had tested and gave advice on the quality of the clay, estimating that the Wollongong Pottery and Brick works could turnout 5,000 to 6,000 bricks per day.

Abraham James died in 1936 at Emmaville, NSW.

Can anybody remember the Bristol Pottery in Coorparoo or know when the establishment closed?
