The Perch is Back.

Very many thanks to the Rotary Club of Wynnum Manly who re-erected the perch at low tide during the morning of Sunday 2 April 2023.



In 1922 a man named Noel Balgue arrived in the Wynnum area and applied to the Wynnum Town Council to build a slip for his 22ft boat "Lizzie".

He positioned the boat in the slip at high tide and would work, cleaning the hull free of barnacles and growth, as the tide dropped ready for painting.

The last re-build was in 2012 by the Society with the help again of the Rotarians.

<u>Margaret Marr Home</u>

We recently received a visit from gentleman and his wife who wished to see any records that we held of the history of Margaret Marr home for boys, located in Tingal Road, Wynnum North.

The home was opened in 1924 on 171 acres of land donated by Mr John Fyfe Marr in memory of his late wife Margaret. The home accommodated boys over 9 years of age who needed care.

When asked of his association with the home, our visitor said he had lived there in the 1940s. His mother was widowed and obtained a post as Nurse/Carer for the boys in the home. His mother had her own



quarters but he lived with the boys and slept in the annex that was added to the east side of the building. After four years, his mother found a new post, so he then went to live with his grandparents.

The late Lily Viola Owen Winchester



Viola was the Principal of Moreton Bay College from 1965 to 1979.

She was born in Fortitude Valley in 1907 to Nicholas and Lily Ann McCosker(nee Mallet). Nicholas was a school teacher, so Viola moved many times during her childhood, whenever her father was transferred to a different school.

Viola gained an Arts degree from the University of Queensland in1929. She taught in Warwick, then in Perth and finally spent many years in Sydney before returning to Redcliffe, Queensland in1955 to live with her ageing parents.

Moreton Bay College gained a Maths teacher in 1955. Viola travelled daily from, and back to Redcliffe, by bus, train and tram. She reluctantly became Principal of the school in 1965, when the school was experiencing severe financial difficulties.

Case Scholtes, "The Fox", contacted the Society about 2 years ago whilst his collecting of information about the local cycling scene.


The result, a 50-page book has been emailed to us this month, "to add to our collection", by Case.

WHERE WAS I? March 2023



The story starts in the City of Brisbane.

The "new" City Hall was built between 1920 and 1930. The front entrance faced Albert Street but was well above street level. So one approached the main entrance to the City Hall up a steep flight of granite steps from Albert Street.

Two fountains were planned in 1939 to enhance the entrance to the City Hall. Work was interrupted by WW11 and the fountains were not constructed until 1949.

In 1967 Albert Street, in front of the City Hall was

closed to traffic between Adelaide and Ann Streets for a large underground car park planned to lie beneath a new City Square. The square was to be at the level of the entrance to the City Hall. The two fountains in Albert Steet were removed and a new larger central fountain built in the new elevated Square outside the entrance to the City Hall. This new King George Square was officially opened in 1975.

Councilor George Clayton, was the local Councilor for Wynnum Manly at this time, (and my husband's uncle). George procured one of the two fountains, for removal to his electorate, to be reconstructed on the roundabout at the Corner House.

When first installed the fountain was operational. Detergent, put into the water, annoyed motorists. Now the former pond surrounding the fountain is a raised ornamental garden bed.

Quote from Brisbane City Council Heritage Section:

"The removal of the fountain from the formal surroundings of the City Hall, the statue of King George V on a horse, the 2 flanking lions and the 2 shallow fountains, has reduced the significance of the fountain. Now, located on a busy traffic island devoid of pedestrian traffic, and devoid of its previous formal setting, the remains of the fountain are isolated and unappreciated. However, the craftmanship is evident in the sandstone and porphyry stonework.

In 2022, lines of small lights were bound around the trunks of the Palm trees surrounding the gardens.

Here is the summary of the presentation given to the Society by the speaker, Tess Rowley at the Society's meeting, held on Thursday 16 March 2023, kindly written by Lucy Laakso, our new President.

"At our March 2023 meeting, we welcomed guest presenter **Tess Rowley**. Tess is an accomplished author and she spoke to us about her 2022 publication: **'Remembering Nazareth House: God and the Devil Wore the Same Robes'.** The book reflects on the experiences of girls living at the Nazareth House orphanage in the 1940s and 1950s.

Briefly, Nazareth House sits atop the rise at Wynnum North. The land was purchased in 1918, with the foundation stone blessed and the building completed in 1924. The orphanage operated from around 1923 to around 1982.

Tess opened her presentation with context: she had written the book over a 25 year period and, during that period, our Society had provided various means of support; for example, many of the photos shown during her presentation had been provided by our Society. Tess's professional background was in child safety.

Like many others, one of the former residents had suffered abuse from infancy to her late teens. It was Tess to whom she first disclosed the abuse. Friendships among the girls had not been encouraged at the institution but now – some years later – the survivor contacted 15 other former residents. For the first time since leaving Nazareth House, they gathered as a group and they disclosed their experiences to each other and to Tess. At the end of the remarkable session, the survivors (some of whom could not read/write) asked Tess to write a book about their experiences. And so it began.

Tess explained that, during the 25 years, she had written four different versions of the book in an effort to get it right. The book is what Tess called a 'speculative memoir' – it imagines how the women felt at the time. The women approved Tess taking this approach.

As mentioned, the book takes the reader through the experiences of the girls in the 1940s and 1950s. The girls worked extremely hard; their role within the orphanage was to support the operation of the aged care facility at Nazareth House at that time. (Nazareth House is an aged care home today.)

During the session, Tess mentioned that the recent Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse had the book, saying that the stories related in the book had been consistent with many others related across the country. Former Queensland Police commissioner, and former Wynnum resident himself, Bob Atkinson wrote the foreword for Tess's book.

118 (Mary) Berrima Street, Wynnum



Bernadette contacted us last year for information about the house that stood at 118 Berrima Street, which they had purchased and recently moved to a site in Dalveen, near Stanthorpe.

One of our late members, Carmel Henderson, lived in that house.

The house is now proudly standing in Dalveen, 10 km north of Stanthorpe. Bernadette sent these photos this week, and has invited anybody passing to contact her, if they would like to see the former Wynnum house.

The house, now stands at Dalveen, near Stanthorpe.

The verandah has been opened up to reveal the typical design of a Queenslander, known as a Bungalow with one protruding gable, built between 1900 and 1920. Some other external features include:

Small hipped roof

Front verandah only

Verandah under main house roof

Main Bedroom usually under gable

Sash windows (Casement introduced in 1916)

"The Lost Woman of Innamincka" Summary of a story written by Isabella Curtin <u>"TRUTH" NEWSPAPER HEADLINES</u> "Mother, Six Children Rescued from Perilous Life" "Queensland Government acts in grim drama" "Did father stager off to unknown death?" *(Brisbane Truth 16 May 1937")*

Henrietta (Ettie) parents, Joseph Henry Darlington and Catherina Elizabeth Olsson (Kate) lived at Littabella, about 20 kms south of Boaga where they leased a property with Frederick Darlington, Joseph's brother. Ettie was born here on 27 February 1904. Joseph sold his share of the property to his brother and moved the family to Bundaberg, where he opened a restaurant in Bourbong Street, near where the Commonwealth Bank stands today. Kate ran a boarding house located where the Council Offices now stand, also in Bourbong Street. Six more children were born. From 1919 Joseph spent 10 years in the Diamontina Hospital in Brisbane with an incurable disease and died on 29 June 1929. Kate had already moved the family to Wowan, north west of Biloela on a property called "Lorraine". Ettie remembers working in the local store "McSweeneys, Universal Frontier".

Here, in Wowan, Ettie met John Hill, a sheep drover. A romance developed and they eloped taking the train to Rockhampton, then walking to Calliope and on to Gladstone, then caught a train to Brisbane.

The family undertook a very long walk over 15 years. Their first child Kathleen was born in Brisbane. They set out to walk to St George, but Kathleen died in Warwick of septicaemia. Two other children died and Norman was born in Charleville on 11 April 1928 and Olive Elisabeth at Blackall on 25 December 1929. Nora was born in Mackay on 13 April 1931, Ethel at Longreach on 16 January 1933. Betty was born at Boulia on 12 November 1934.

Ettie and John headed south to Innamincka. They owned an old car with no engine, which was pulled by a horse. Cooper Creek was flooded and father, John and only son, Norman helped Ettie and the girls to cross over the flood. They pitched a lean-to tent under an old tree on the high side of the creek. Ettie was pregnant with her sixth child.

When the family were settled, John set out to walk to Mt Isa to look for work. John was never seen again, only his hat and razor were recovered.

Ettie was pregnant and alone with five children to care for and living in a lean-to tent on the bank of Cooper Creek. They were exposed to the weather and the frequent sand storms. The family were given support by the Hotel's publican. An aboriginal woman Molly supplied them with goat's milk.

On 18 July 1936, Ettie left 8 year old Norman in charge of his sisters and moved away from their campsite for the birth of her sixth daughter, on the bank of Cooper Creek. The local Mission Sisters brought the family to the Innamincka Hospital (Elizabeth Symon Nursing Home) and the family was looked after properly for the first time.

The Government Authorities were uncertain as to where the family should be sent, Broken Hill, Townsville or Brisbane. Since Ettie was a Queenslander by birth the family were brought back to the Queen Alexandria Home in Coorparoo in Brisbane.

A mother in the small Queensland town of Mullet Creek, Kate Darlington, longed for her daughter, missing for 15 years. She read the article in the "Truth" newspaper about a woman and family rescued from Innamincka. Was this story referring to her long lost daughter? It was! But she did not have the train fare to travel to Brisbane immediately.

Mrs Hill feared that the family would be split up by the State Children's Department, but she stood her ground and a little home was found for the family on the water front at Darling Point, Manly. This was the family's first real home in 15 years. Youngest daughter Isabella spent the first 12 months in Brisbane in Hospital, suffering from malnutrition. Norman and Olive, the eldest daughter were the first of the family to attend Manly State School.

After a few months a larger house was found at 153 Carlton Terrace. Isabella came home from hospital and the family lived there for the next 20 years.
