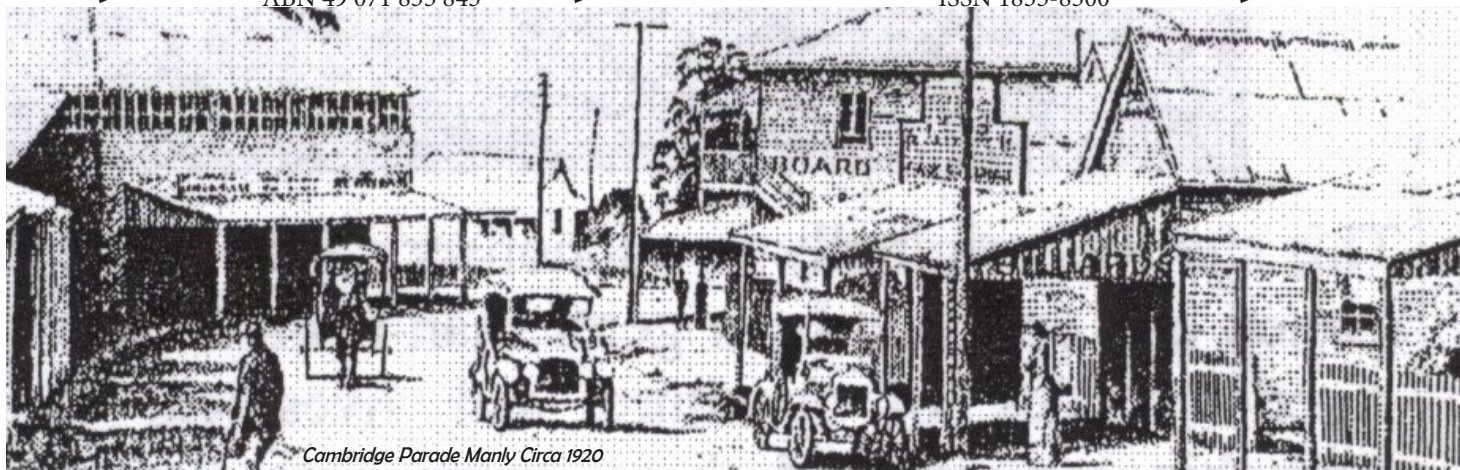

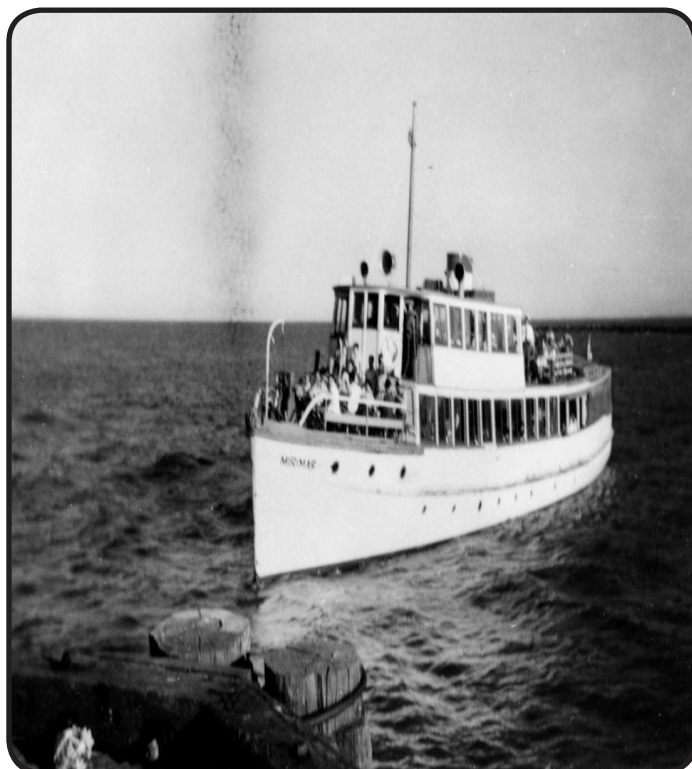

From the President

the Ann Street Presbyterian Church, Brisbane, on the 27th May, and it was good to see a large group of ex students there. Ex Wynnum Central students will no doubt remember Joan's mother, Mrs Catherine Pigram, who taught there for many years, and was greatly respected.

Joan was born at Amiens, Stanthorpe on 29 April 1925 to Harold James Pigram and Catherine Mary Pigram (nee McKinnon). She had an older sister, Mary. Their father (& husband) died when Joan was only 2 years old, and Mrs Pigram returned to her former career in teaching so as to provide for her young family. This necessitated a move to Wynnum, where other family members could give some support at this very difficult time.

Those who knew Joan would agree she was certainly gifted with many talents. After completing Senior at Somerville House, where she was school captain, Joan went on to obtain her BA in 1951, followed by a degree in Advanced Education in 1958.

Her full time teaching career spanned 27 years, teaching mainly English, French, Latin, and History. This included 2 years in England, New Zealand and Canada. Although the majority of her teaching career was spent in Queensland state high schools (Nambour, Ayr, Herberton, Wynnum, Brisbane State High, and Wavell), she also had the joy of returning to her 'old school' Somerville House, for 4 years as Vice Principal.

All of Joan's ex students would agree that as a teacher, Joan knew her subject well and presented it in a lucid enthusiastic manner. She was firm and commanded the respect of students and inspired their co-operation. Along with this she was just, friendly with a sensitivity to the young mind and outlook. Her added knowledge, qualifications, and abilities in music and choral work were always an added bonus at the schools where she taught and beyond.

After completing a Graduate Diploma in Teacher Librarianship, Joan changed her career direction in 1972, and became a lecturer at Kelvin Grove College of Advanced Education (now QUT). During this time (1979) she was chosen to be the Qld judge for the 'Children's Book of the Year Award'. Joan really enjoyed her final years of lecturing at QUT and retired at the age of 60 in 1985.

Much of her time after retiring was spent on church related work. This included holding the position of organist at the Ann St Presbyterian church for over 20 years, and acting as archivist for Qld Presbyterian Historical Records for 7 years. Joan was also an active member of the Toowong Probus Club right up to the time of her fall in March 2013, when she was found unconscious after several hours. From that time onwards her quality of life and ability to return to independent living became an unreachable goal. She died peacefully at 'Beth Eden', in Graceville on 19 May 2015.

Vale, Joan, you have been an inspiration to many students during your distinguished professional career, and a loyal and generous friend to many as well. Until next month, I will sign off with best wishes and looking forward to seeing you at our next meeting.

Local Identity – William Lamond

Bill Lamond (1920 -1990) was our local Member of Parliament from 1974 to 1977. Here is his story, as reported in The Wynnum – Redlands Herald of 29 March 1978

Bill takes a breather from hurly-burly

WHEN the Queensland Parliament met yesterday Bill Lamond was not at the swearing-in ceremony. After three years as Member for Wynnum, Bill was at his Manly home.

Bill, a local real estate agent, won the seat for the National Party at the 1974 general elections in a cliff-hanger decision. It catapulted Bill into the hurly-burly of State politics. He had only accepted nomination six weeks beforehand. The victory was heady and soon afterwards Bill found himself a new-chum parliamentarian sitting on the bloated government benches.

Last November Bill was a government casualty. His seat reverted to the Australian Labor Party.

So what does a retired politician do when he suddenly finds, through the decision of the ballot box, that his “services are no longer required.”

I interviewed Bill at his Manly home and asked him what it felt like to be a retired politician. “When you say a retired politician I never really considered myself to be a politician but someone who had been actively interested in the affairs of this area for possibly 25 years. And I have continued and will continue to follow my interest in community and civic affairs and the various organizations in this district.”

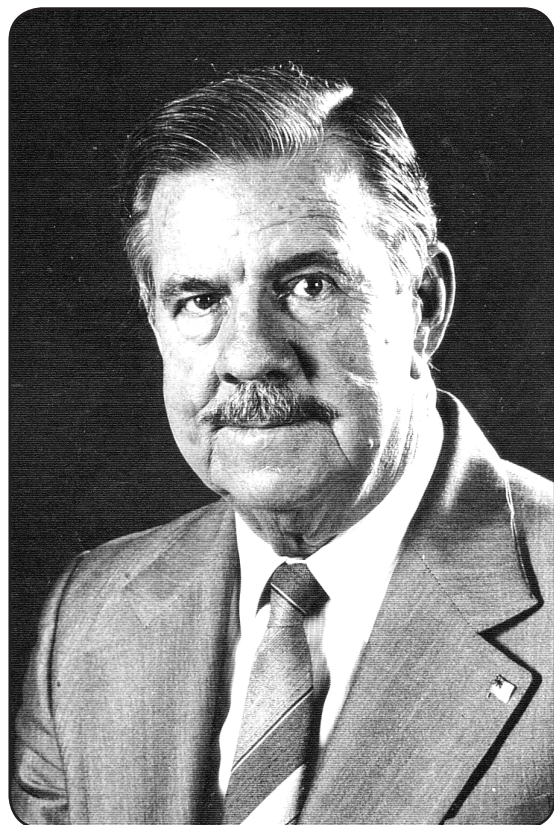
REQUIREMENTS

“I always looked upon myself as someone who had some ability to take the requirements of the people of this area to levels where we might get something done.”

“But to answer your question more directly after three strenuous years in government in which I worked on average 15 hours a day seven days a week I suppose it has been nice to have a short break.”

“We were in England in 1972 and we made many friends there and we would like to go back to England and Europe to spend a little time, we hope this year,” Bill said.

He has been getting back to fishing and taking an interest in Rugby League. He said he and wife Bettina had been taking short trips around south-east Queensland.

UNITS PROJECT

Before entering parliament he had planned to build a block of units near his Manly home.

Plans had been drawn and tenders called but these were shelved on his entering parliament. Now these plans had been revived and he was in the process of building the units.

Since November he had been kept busy. A lot of people, through community and sporting organizations, still called on him and Bettina to attend functions.

Bill was born at Cloncurry but spent most of his formulative years in the South Molle group of islands off the Queensland Coast. He said his father had taken up farming on the islands. In 1936 his father sold out and bought a dairy farm at Lindum. The family operated a warm milk delivery.

In 1939 his brother and sister and himself joined the forces. Bill saw service with the A.L.F. and was discharged in 1945. Following his discharge he worked with Bruce Pye Industries.

In the early 1950's he entered real estate at Wynnum and developed this business, as well as auctioneering and valuing.

Bill said he had been at Wynnum something over 40 years.

He met Bettina on New Year's Eve 1941. "In those days the very fine R.S.L. club structure we have today was purely a small structure in Tingal Road." "I went to this New Year's Eve dance and Bettina, who then was quite a young lass, went to the same dance and we met. History tells the rest."

Bill spoke highly of the role Bettina had played in his life and as the wife of a Member of Parliament. He said they had worked as a team. Bettina had closely involved herself in his work as a parliamentarian.

A hospital for Wynnum and improved foreshore development and facilities are Bill's two pet projects for the area. He believed the hospital would be established and would pursue the matter as a citizen of the area.

Since he had been out of parliament, Bill said he had been doing various repairs and maintenance around the house. "I think you said, "What's it like not to have a boss?" I said, "Crikey, I've got the hardest boss in the world now." My wife is making sure I do those gardening things or those repairs to the back steps or those squeaky doors, or a bit of concrete work which should have been done two years ago. "She's a harder boss than Joh ever was. I sometimes wonder whether husbands should have a union so that they would have some right of redress."

I asked Bill if he could see himself again standing for parliament. "In the next two and a half years, providing my health permits and I'm sure it will, I will continue to be most active in our area and we will see what happens then."

- Must carry comprehensive and compulsory third party insurance applicable to the class of vehicle

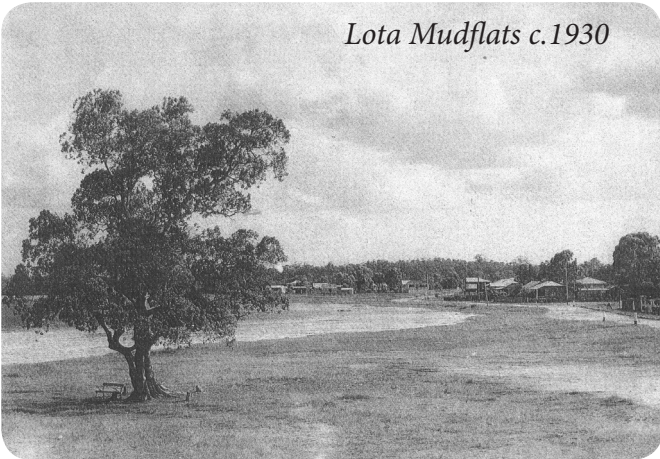

Lota Mudflats today



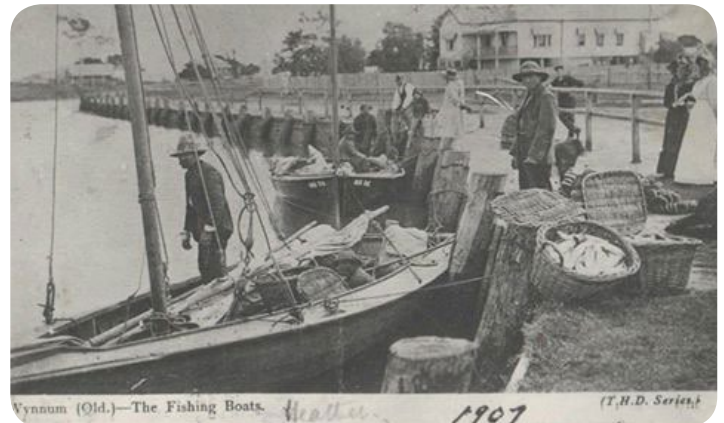

Queen Competition

WYNNUM, December 14

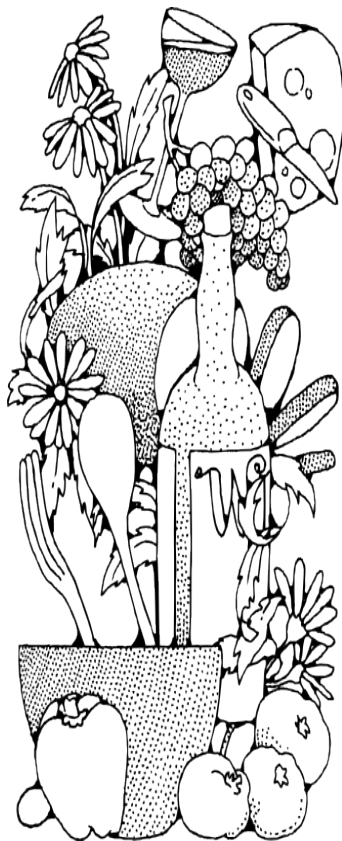
The R.S.S.I.L.A., Wynnum. and Manly Sub-branch; - queen competition was brought to a close on Saturday evening by the crowning of the successful queen at the Memorial Hall grounds, Wynnum South.

Mr. G. Geddes, who acted as chairman, welcomed the guests and introduced the State Treasurer (Mr. W. H. Barnes) and the Lord Mayor (Alderman J. W. Greene), and explained that the competition had been held for the purpose of securing funds for the reduction of the debt on the building. A concert programme was then rendered by Mesdames H. Gunderson, G. Roulston and A. J. Binnle, Miss Unlce Norrls and Mr. G. Geddes, Mrs. G. W. Edmonds and Miss V. Nickols acting as accompanists. The two queens. Misses R. Willis and E. Day, promenaded the grounds

with their retinues. The attendants included Misses V. Curtis, M. Christie, E. Cross, G. Love (maids of honour), Misses C. and V. Roulston, J. Turn-bull, and Unice Norris (pages), and Miss Olga Unwln (herald). The sub-branch secretary, - Mr. L. Curtis read- the financial statement showing- the results: Miss R. Willis (the Manly-Lota queen) £68, and Miss E. Day (Wynnum . queen) £42 7s. id., and declared Miss R. Willis the winning queen, Mr. Barnes performed the coronation ceremony. He congratulated the successful queen, and made special reference to Miss Day, who had come forward when the committee was in difficulties. The Lord Mayor congratulated the successful queen. Later a dance was held in the Memorial Hall, Mr. G. Geddes acting as M.C. and dance music being provided by Messrs. V. Cousins, H. J. Chantler. F. A. Jones, and A. Wood. Extras were played by Mrs. H. Penrose. During the dance the Lord Mayor presented to the two competing queens with xylonite toilet sets as a token of esteem of the diggers.

Behind the scenes at the State Library of Queensland

For the past two weeks, I have been fortunate to be able to spend some time working behind the scenes at the State Library of Queensland, in both the Queensland Memory department, and also in Conservation. It has certainly been interesting to see what goes on behind the scenes

It has been surprising to learn of all the different things that the State Library collects.

The librarian in charge of Queensland Literature explained that they try to collect every work of fiction that has been published by a Queensland author, a task made more difficult today with a proliferation of self-published authors for her to find. There are other librarians who cover different areas such as Queensland Music, Oral Histories and Digital Stories, Web sites, newspapers, and one of the most surprising, Ephemera.

Ephemera is basically junk mail! Well, almost. It is a collection of things that would normally be read and thrown away, such as tourism advertising brochures, real estate advertisements, political campaign materials and health promotions. They even had boxes of re-usable shopping bags, water bottles and hats with different advertising designs printed on them. They have also collected samples of wrapping paper, 5 boxes of it, to show different wrapping paper designs of the time. These are all part of the State Library Collection, so if you wanted, you could go to the library and ask to see their re-usable shopping bag collection, just as you would ask to see a book from the collection!

Another interesting group that I have spent some time with is the Q ANZAC 100 team.

Q ANZAC 100 is a huge 4 year long project aiming to collect and digitise as much information relating to Queenslanders' involvement in WWI as possible. This involves digitising all of the WWI photos that the library currently has and they are always on the lookout for new photos to add to the collection. They are also transcribing (thanks to the amazing work of their volunteers), hundreds of letters, diaries and other written information from that time, which will all be eventually made available online.

I was able to help with the sorting of a new collection of photos that they have recently purchased. These were photos taken by a young nurse, Sister Marion Winifred Croll, during her time in Egypt in WWI. Many of them show her adventures in the area on her days away from the hospital, visiting the pyramids, the river or the small villages in the area. Another section of the library that I have enjoyed spending time in is Conservation. I have had the task there of cleaning one of the old real estate posters from a large collection they have advertising 'new' subdivisions around Brisbane. They also taught me how to do tear repairs (much harder than they made it look), and make boxes on their amazing box making machine.

It was interesting to sit in on the Conservation Clinic that was being held last week. Did you know that you can book a free 15 minute consultation with the conservators from the museum and the library about your own objects? One of the ladies who visited the clinic had brought along photos of her father from World War 1 and she was very pleased to be asked if they could be borrowed to digitise and add to the SLQ collection.

I have been so grateful to have had this opportunity as part of my studies. I have learnt that their main aim is to make the resources available for people in the community and they really love it when people make use of them for their own projects and research – something I will be doing more of in the future!

on Thursday 21 May 2015

The meeting opened at 7.30pm with 37 members and 2 visitors present, Fay Smith and Shaun Forrester. Apologies were received.

President Jan Parnell opened the meeting promptly at 7.30pm, with the useful fact that on 21 April 1937 the first solo flight took place across the Atlantic.

Members were sought to assist at History Alive to be held at Fort Lytton on Saturday and Sunday 6 and 7 of June 2015.
