Bunjurgen Estate Vineyard at Boonah on the 27 May 2017

The story of Bunjurgen Estate traces its heritage from the very early days of convict transportation to the Colony of New South Wales. John McMaugh, an Irishman, was transported and served his sentence on a series of cattle properties in the Macleay River valley, which is very close to Port Macquarie. Four generations later, a descendant of the original McMaugh family established a vineyard selection in the Teviot Valley, near Boonah in Southern Queensland in a location known locally as Bunjurgen. The property was named "Bellbrook" after the original area named by Caroline McMaugh in the Macleay Valley in 1842. A fitting historical touch. Whilst the privations of the convict era are no longer present, the hard physical work and continual demands of establishing and developing a vineyard have a contemporary parallel with John McMaugh's convict experiences of Port Macquarie 175 years ago.

For many thousands of years, large groups of Aboriginal people gathered at the Bunya Mountains to take part in what was known as the 'bonye bonye' festival (Waka Waka language). The Bunya festivals were regarded very highly. Bunya nuts were gathered daily from the forest. Trees were initially climbed by the tree owners using cut vines made into a hoop plus notches cut in the bark. The nuts were poked down using broken off branches.

Soft, juicy, immature nuts were eaten raw while the mature nuts were roasted or the kernels pounded into meal and roasted into a kind of cake that could be stored for several weeks. Unshelled nuts were often buried in netted bags in the beds of creeks for later consumption (can I say having tried the bunya nut served in several different ways....to me it always tasted like eating the bars of yellow washing soap my mum used to wash to clothes when I was a child and probably should have been left buried in the creek beds).

Expansion of European settlements, along with increased logging activity and clearing for grazing and farming disrupted the large gatherings, making it difficult for visiting Aboriginal groups to travel along their traditional pathways. The last great 'bonye bonye' festival is reported to have been held in the late 1800's.

Today Bunya Mountains is a peaceful retreat for approx. 30 permanent residents and the many visitors (like our family) who visit the area each year to enjoy the Bunya Mountains National Park, the second National Park in Queensland. The National Park now covers approx. 22,000 hectares of tall, moist rainforest, natural grasslands, eucalypt forests, woodlands and other dry rainforest communities.

After our long hot summer, it was nice to have the fire going of an evening, watching the children toasting marshmallows, a new experience for the boys but a regular occurrence for the girls visiting from England. After returning to Wynnum, the remainder of their visit was spent sailing, fishing, canoeing and kayaking on our beautiful bay.

I know, I am often heard to say, but it is worth repeating, we do live in a beautiful part of a wonderful country!! Till next month, don't forget to check out the "Heritage Week" display at the Resource Room and our Bus Trip to Bunjurgen Winery on Saturday 27th May.

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Resource Centre Report - April 2017



- *Pamela Roles Convalescent Home for Crippled Children*

The home was located adjacent to the Wynnum Manly Water Towers on Preston Road and the name of the house was “Burwells”. Today the house and grounds serve as a Retirement Village for the residents using the old home building as a Community Centre.

Recently we had a call from a lady, asking about the Convalescent Home, which was opened on the 2 May 1954 by Premier Vince Gair . Her husband used to make wooden toys for the crippled children and she still has one of the children’s chairs that he made. She has removed the layers of paint from the chair and lacquered the wooden surface. Before she gives the chair to her grandchildren she wishes to place a small plaque on the chair telling of its origin.

We know that the Crippled Children’s Convalescent Home opened in 1954. However my question is, when was the home closed? Or maybe someone may know when “Burwells Retirement Village” opened?

- *“Moreton”, 101 Petersen Street, Wynnum*

The house “Moreton” was an annexe of Moreton Bay College used for a training girls who specialised in Home Studies and Etiquette. The house has been in private ownership for many years and the newest owner has recently approached us for any information about the house. This, we provided.

The house has been for sale quite often in the last twenty years, so one does have opportunity to see inside. I think the most unique feature, besides the expansive bay view, is the cellar, dug into the hillside. The new owners however complained that whenever there is heavy rain, the cellar becomes full of water. Maybe this is due to a rising water table.

- *“Gold Top” Football Team*

Last month I asked if anyone could help Leslie Carl Lawrence in his search for information about the “Gold Top” Football Team. Since then we have had visits from two former Margaret Marr Home boys and one of them has a photograph of the “Gold Top” Football Team. He has promised to bring the photograph to the Resource Room.

- *Pam from Dalveen*

Dalveen is a tiny place between Warwick and Stanthorpe and Pam is related to Alan and Joan Mitchell who used to belong to our Society. Pam found an old family portrait which she had improved at the “Dalveen and Action Graphics” to find her mother’s maiden name in the top corner. The photo turned out to be her mother’s grandparents, two aunts and her father.

One of the aunts, Marion Lessmann, married Albert Nelson Haylock and moved to Wynnum. The question asked was: “Did Albert Haylock have something to do with bread or a bakery” and “did he have a street named after him?” YES, both statements are true. Albert Haylock came from Cambridge, England. He married Marion Amelia Lessmann and lived in Haylock Parade, maybe at No.58. Albert delivered bread and he died in 1942.

Pedestrian Subway for Pine Street: Council Budgets £4000 for work

After receiving many requests in the past, Brisbane City Council at its last meeting decided to make provision for the construction of a pedestrian subway at Pine Street, Wynnum Central.

Representations were made to the council by Alderman G F Clayton for the pedestrian subway under the railway line at Pine Street.

The chief engineer and manager of the Department of Works reported that numerous similar requests had been received in the past for the provision of a subway.

CHILDREN

The engineer stated it had been pointed out that the need of a subway arose from the large volume of traffic, particularly children, which have to use the roadway because no footpath exists.

The provision of a subway has been the subject of protracted negotiations between the City Council and the State Government for some considerable period of time.

The engineer told the Council that, as a result of the negotiations, the State Government had refused to accept responsibility for the provision of a subway for pedestrian traffic. Council's attention was directed by the engineer that it was estimated £4000 would be the cost involved to construct the subway.

ON ESTIMATE

The Council recommended that provision be made in the budget for the ensuing financial year for the construction of a pedestrian subway under the railway line at Pine Street at an estimated cost of £4000.

CLERK'S LETTER

Mr J Kearns, of 52 Tingal Road, is the one who has been pressing for a number of years to have a pedestrian subway constructed at the site referred to above.

In a letter to Mr Kearns, dated March 9 1962, the Town Clerk (Mr J C Slaughter) writes:

Dear Sir,

I refer to your letter of February 5 1962, addressed to Alderman G F Clayton, relative to the provision of a pedestrian subway under the railway line at Pine Street, Wynnum Central and desire to inform you that this matter has now received further careful consideration.

As you are aware, this matter has been the subject of protracted negotiations with the State Government for some considerable time, but the last advice from the Honourable the Minister for Transport was to the effect that the Railways Department was not prepared to contribute towards the cost of the work.

The Council, however, is concerned at the potential danger to the large volume of pedestrian traffic, particularly children, who have to use the roadway as a footpath and I am pleased to inform you that it has now agreed to make provision in the budget for the ensuing financial year for the work to be undertaken. Accordingly, it is hoped that the work will be undertaken during the 1962-63 financial year.

A School! A Boat Harbour? A Hospital?

£14,000 school for backward Children

A start on the construction of the school buildings for backward children at Darling Point has been made by the Department of Works.

The school will be of the most modern design with well ventilated class rooms.

WYNNUM HOSPITAL

The question of a hospital for Wynnum was again raised in Parliament when Mr W M Gunn MLA asked the Minister for Health and Home Affairs if the newly elected Country Liberal Government intended to honour its election promise to build a hospital at Wynnum during the life of the present Parliament.

In reply, Dr Noble said that decentralisation being the accepted policy of the Government, the policy would be implemented and every effort will be made to provide hospital services at Wynnum.

Mr Gunn said the Australian Labor Party Government had approved the construction of a 250 bed hospital on the site acquired for this purpose situated at the corner of Wynnum and New Lindum Roads.

With the defeat of the A.L.P. Government in August last and the election of the Country Liberal Government, the prospect of securing a hospital became somewhat obscure until such time as the new Government declared its hospital policy.

Mr Gunn said that he was pleased with the assurance given by the Minister that every effort will be made in providing hospital services for Wynnum during the life of this Parliament.

If this promise is carried into effect, we can look forward to a start being made during the next two years which will terminate the life of this thirty-fifth Parliament.

BOAT HARBOUR

Mr Gunn pointed out to the new Country Liberal Government that the previous Labor Government had approved of this scheme.

The State Treasurer informed Mr Gunn that the Government's programme of works for the current year covers mainly the construction and repairs to various wharves and jetties along the coast.

The Treasurer said that a more vigorous programme of marine works will be carried out next financial year and no doubt that a boat harbor at Manly will be included.

Mr Gunn said that the Treasurer's reply was very promising as plans have been prepared and the dredge has been engaged in taking the necessary soundings in preparation for the construction of the outer wall section of the harbour. Should the Government proceed with the project finance will be made available from the Commonwealth Aid Marine Works Fund.

Mr Gunn has made arrangements for a dredge to return to Manly within a few weeks for the purpose of dredging the Manly channel and the swinging basin at the jetty head to a depth of six feet at low water. When completed the channel will be in first class condition to cater for the larger class of launches, including the motor launch "Cameo", approximately 70 feet.

Wynnum Locality Names under discussion

The allocation of a Post Office at Wynnum North has once again revived the question of the conflicting names of our suburbs.

Visitors travelling by train to Wynnum for the first time have often remarked that they did not know whether to get out at Wynnum North, Wynnum or Wynnum Central.

The naming of our Post Office is also misleading and the local Chamber of Commerce is considering proposals to overcome the confusion.

As matters stand the Wynnum Post Office is adjacent to Wynnum Central Station, the Wynnum North Post Office adjacent to Wynnum Station and a new Post Office is being built adjacent to the Wynnum North Station.

Accordingly, Post Office authorities have in effect put forward the following proposals for discussion by the Wynnum and Manly Chamber of Commerce:

1. That the new Post Office to be named Wynnum North and the name of present Wynnum North Post Office be changed to Wynnum Central.

2. That subject to approval by all concerned in the Wynnum District and by Queensland Railways authorities, the name of Wynnum Station be changed to Wynnum Central and vice versa. A general meeting of members of the Wynnum

Manly Chamber of Commerce will be held on November 9 when the proposals will come up for consideration and discussion and for a resolution to be made thereon by all members present at the meeting and to which representatives of other organisations in the district are invited to attend.

This matter is of vital importance to the district and all serious discussion said Mr D I Drouyn, President of the Wynnum Manly Chamber of Commerce.

Shingles, what is it and what can you do to prevent it?

Herpes-zoster (Shingles) is a painful blistering rash caused by reactivation of the varicella zoster virus – the same virus that causes chickenpox. The shingles rash occurs when the dormant chickenpox virus is reactivated in the nerve tissue, causing inflammation of the nerves. Sometimes pain in the affected region can be severe and prolonged. When it lasts more than 3 months it is called post herpetic neuralgia (PHN). Other less common complications may include scarring, skin infections, loss of vision or hearing, pneumonia, or neurological complications.

Causes

Once you have had chickenpox, the virus can stay in your nervous system for many years. For reasons that are not fully understood, the virus may become active again and give you shingles. Shingles can spread through direct contact with an uncovered rash. 1 in 3 people will develop shingles in their lifetime. As a person gets older, the risk of getting shingles and PHN increases.

Symptoms

Initial symptoms of shingles can include headache, fever, flu like symptoms and malaise (general feeling of uneasiness). A stinging or burning sensation may appear on the affected area before the appearance of the skin rash (normally within 1-2 days of the initial symptoms).

The rash is commonly on the trunk or body but can also appear on the face or other parts of the body and can be quite painful, causing a tingling or burning sensation. It creates a stripe or belt like pattern on the affected area and is usually limited to one side of the body. The rash forms small blisters which fill with a liquid and burst before the skin crust over and heals.

Although most people recover within a few weeks, some go on to develop chronic nerve pain called post herpetic neuralgia. This may be severe and can sometimes go on for months.

Prevention

Shingles is a vaccine preventable disease. Immunisation against shingles is achieved by a dose of the Zostavax® vaccine which can be given to adults 50 years and over.

National Shingles Vaccination Program

The shingles vaccine is provided free for people aged 70 years under the [National Immunisation Program](#). There is also a five year catch-up program for people aged 71 – 79 years until 31 October 2021. To receive the immunisation visit your local doctor or vaccination provider. It is important to note that although the vaccine is provided at no cost, a consultation fee may apply.

Routine vaccination of persons aged 70–79 years is expected to obtain the greatest benefits against shingles and its complications. Further information is provided in the online version of [The Australian Immunisation Handbook 10th edition](#). People who are not eligible to receive the free vaccine are able to purchase the vaccine on the private market.
