Colonial Residences in Wynnum Manly and Lota.

In February I asked for members to look for Colonial Houses, or houses modelled on the Colonial design. I do hope to get some examples in the local district. So far there have been no responses..

Distinguishing Feature of a Colonial House - A Stepped Verandah Roof

The roof of a stepped verandah is attached to the wall of the house and not part of the roof of the house. The verandah is supported by posts.

Colonial refers to the class of styles of fashion between 1859 and 1901, when Queensland was a Colony. Few houses of the upper classes remain, however there are plenty of examples of 1870 – 1890's houses of the common folk, especially in Spring Hill and West End but also in Wynnum, Manly and Lota.

Ronald James Woodforth (1897 – 1958)

Ron's parents, James Frederick and Rosetta (nee Bolt) were married on 12 August 1896. Their eldest son, **Ronald James Woodforth** was born on 25 July 1897 at Newstead, Brisbane.

Ron's father, James, then was a painter, the family residing in Jane Street, Breakfast Creek. In 1899 he was a coach painter of Commercial Road Newstead. Four children followed, daughter Doris Ireen Rosetta (1900), then Norman Sydney (1903), Pearlie Margaret May (1907) and James Maitland Thomas (1910). After the family had arrived at Wynnum, Lenton Brisbane was born in 1913.

The family came to Wynnum in 1911, when Ron was 14 and his parents, James and Rosetta's first address was Water Street (now Colina Street) in front of the Croquet Club. The next address was at "Mintacute" in Chestnut Street in 1917, then "Mena House" in Pine Street in 1921.

Ronald James, the eldest son, served an apprenticeship with the Local Cycle Works, then started his own motor and cycle business in the Mors Building in Florence Street, Wynnum in 1920. In 1922 he acquired premises on the opposite side of the road, on part of the Wynnum Central School playing fields. And, also in 1922, Ron married Gladys Lydia Sibley. Son Kenneth James was born in 1924, daughter June in 1925 and son Ronald Hedley in 1927. The family lived in Gibb Street.

In 1928, Ron moved his business from Florence Street to Bay Terrace, between Edith and Clara Streets, opposite the Post Office. He built a new garage and part of the land was the flower garden of his neighbours, the Kerr Family, next door.

Mr and Mrs Kerr were the grandparents of member, Nena Robertson and they lived in Bay Terrace. After Mr Kerr died his flower garden was tended for a while by his son and then Ron Woodforth had the use of the land. Six years later, in 1934, Ron purchased this property, which later would become Woodforth's Arcade. His previous premises, in Florence Street, said to be an old shed, were purchased by the Education Department and used for the teaching of manual arts.

In 1951 Ron built a new modern service station on the tennis court on the south eastern corner of Berrima Street and Bay Terrace opposite the Waterloo Bay Hotel. This garage became the location of a Ford subdealership in 1953. In 2008 this property was known as Pitstop Garage. And today in 2020 the old garage is in the process of being demolished to make way for a new, high-rise apartment block. (Where am I? April)

Ron's business moved again, to a new spacious workshop facing Lower Bay Terrace on the north east corner of Berrima Street. In 1958 extensive additions were added to provide a larger workshop and showrooms.

Later became Bayside Mufflers was on the site (Nev Harrison), and now "Bayline" Apartments.

Early in 1957 the foundations were laid for a modern block of shops and offices on the site of the original garage in Bay Terrace opposite the Post Office. Woodforth's Arcade was completed in August 1957. Mr Woodforth had spent most of his working life here and he wished the new Arcade to be considered as his monument.



Woodforth's Arcade, 148 Bay Terrace. Opened in 1957.

Ron was a Past Master of Tuscan and Kianawah Lodges and a member of Conclave Lodge, Joseph of Aramathea and the Order of the Eastern Star. He was a foundation member of Kianawah Lodge.

Ron died on 6 August 1958, aged 61 and is buried at Hemmant Cemetery. The Masonic fraternity paid their respects and the graveside service was conducted by the Grand Master.

Ron was survived by his wife Gladys, son Ken of Wynnum Central, son Ron of Manly and daughter June (who had married Ken McLeod) of Manly.

After his death the garage business on the corner of Berima Stret was continued under his wife, Mrs Gladys Woodforth, with eldest son Ken as Manager.

Woodforth's Arcade, 148 Bay Terrace Wynnum

This was the first arcade for Wynnum, built on the site of the Woodforth Garage, located between Edith and Clara Streets and opposite the Post Office in Bay Terrace. The garage had moved away in 1951, northwards along Bay Terrace to the south west corner of Bay Terrace and Berrima Street.

The foundations for the Arcade were laid in early 1957. The building consisted of seven shops of modern design of brick construction.

The contract for the building was entrusted with Jenkins and Day, of Bennetts Road, Camp Hill and Waterview Avenue, Wynnum. Jenkins and Day had only recently completed the Boden Building, on the corner of Bay Terrace and Edith Street (Bare Traps today) and were presently constructing the new Council Chambers and shops further north along the Terrace (Civic Centre).

The design and plans were prepared by Mr Reg E Wood, local engineer and draftsman.

Brickwork was executed by Mr Jack Clune of 105 Waterview Avenue,

Plumbing was installed by F Huysing of 822 Wynnum Road, Cannon Hill.

Painting and decoration was completed by P A Thomas of 1 Algoori Street, Morningside.

Electrical installations were installed by Hamilton and Parker of 11 Blackwood Road, Cannon Hill.

Plasterers were P Hiscock and Son of 43 Jellicoe Street Manly West and sign writing was by H Bone and Son of Gordon Parade, Wynnum Central

In the Wynnum Herald of 19th June 1957 there was an advertisement:

APPLICATIONS for Shops in Woodforth's Arcade, Bay Terrace, diagonally opposite post office, may be lodged with W M Lamond 125 Bay Terrace, Phone XM 1942.

On 31 July 1957, "Alfreda" Millinery Salon announced its impending arrival in Woodforth's Arcade "Come and see the new Spring range of Model Hats. Bring your old hats to be remodeled: also hats made to order".

The "modern" shopping Arcade, the latest addition to the rapidly expanding Bay Terrace shopping centre and the first arcade to be built in the district, was completed by August 1957. The official opening, together with a party, as recalled by one of our members, was held at 9.30am on Thursday15 August 1957with Mr W M Gunn MLA as the official visitor. The occasion was said to mark,

"... another milestone in the development of Wynnum business community. The new development demonstrates the faith in the future of the district that has long been foremost in the minds of some prominent citizens and business men, a faith that they have been prepared to back with solid bricks and mortar, which will stand as a monument to their enterprise and courage".

The arcade of brick construction provided seven shops of modern design, utilising to the greatest advantage, the natural lighting and ventilation.

There were six businesses trading in the Arcade on opening day in 1957. They were W M Lamond, Real Estate Agent, Carousel Frock Salon, Christian's Delicatessen and Snack Bar, Simond's Fruit Shop, Alfreda Millinery and Murray's Barber Shop.



March 2020 Where was I?



Mudflats Arts Inc was established in 1988 as a proactive group to address community and environmental issues. The Lota Environmental Sculpture Project aimed for the community to take control in the creation of its cultural environment. There were community workshops, ecological site walks and dissemination of project information through local media, together with displays at Civic Centres. A detailed project brief was formulated. Local resident and artist, Geoffrey Hulme, was contracted to produce a sculptural maquette (small preliminary model). This was presented for public scrutiny.

Moondance II , the resultant sculpture stands "...like totemic custodial of the foreshore environment at Fig Tree Point, Lota focussing on the natural attributes of its vicinity. Hardwood pylons support carved organic forms at their apexundulating curves, glimpses of wings, sunrays and clouds melt in pastel hues against an aquatic backdrop At the base, tilted planes of pine serve as a pathway over large quarry stones"
