### • Church Buildings Book


Have you had a look at the Society's latest publication.








A greyhound named 'Baby Beaufort' trained by local resident, Marsdon Bool, is posed on Daisy Road, Manly.

We recently caught up with Keith Bool, the 3rd generation of his family to be associated with his Kamarin Street home. Now the sold sign is up, it was time to preserve its history.

When I visited with Keith Bool, the sold sticker had just been put up on his house at 44

Kamarin Street (formally known as Randall Avenue), Manly West. Keith is the 3" Generation to be connected to the property as his father, Marston Bool, had originally built the house for his parents, George and Laura Bool in 1947. The area then was mostly bush with very few houses around. Keith's Auntie, Greta Bool, lived on the corner of Kamarin Street and Whites Road, in the old Tudor style home, which still stands but is now second door down. Greta Street which comes off Kamarin Street is actually named after her. Keith's Uncle Alfred Bool, nicknamed 'Ginga', lived in Empire Avenue, and became one of Queensland's leading greyhound trainers. Alfred later sold from Empire Avenue and moved to


Rickertt Road. Alfred was responsible for the lure at the Greyhound races at Capalaba from the early 1950's. The lure consisted of a bike frame upended and fastened firmly to the

ground, to which a long rope with the lure of a faux rabbit attached would be reeled onto the

bike wheel. Alf would take a peddle in each hand and furiously reel in the lure. An exercise he had to complete 10 times per race meet and without flaw. Should the greyhounds catch up to the lure it would be disastrous for the owners and punters on the day. Previous to that method, a horse and rider was used to pull the lure by riding in the opposite direction to the dogs. An extremely rare photograph of this method being used at Capalaba was unearthed by Keith for use in this story (see next page).

Another early resident of the area was George Soltanko, a Russian, Keith recalls, who had 5 boys and lived on the corner of Killarney and Muriel Avenues. For those on line a search at

https://qimagery.information.qld.gov.au allows searches of Brisbane addresses and access to aerial images spanning decades of progress. Further down Kamarin Street there is



Mercia Street and this is named after Mercia Wilson, who married Gary McKinnon. Gary just happened to pop in while I was interviewing Keith, and contributed some wonderful recollections of the area. Such as the fact a stream once ran from one side of Whites Road to the other, and from this, as a lad, they used to catch lobbies. In the early days, a large chunk of the area was a chicken farm owned by Roy Wilson. Keith's Auntie Greta Bool, married Roy Wilson in 1931. Roy had built a lot of the houses in the area and the Telegraph newspaper 28<sup>th</sup> Feb 1938, page 15, mentions him being fined for an award breach, having kept in his employ an individual who

was not a member of the Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners of Australasia Union.

Interestingly, Kamarin Street (Randall Avenue), was part of the 'Great Blue Wave Estate', which was selling blocks from April 1916, the estate boasted 283 blocks with an average price of £15 each (33 perches). The name 'Blue Wave' was used for the estate due to the blue hue which appeared over the valley where Empire Avenue is now located (Lota-through local eyes, Cherrie Nicholson). An original advertising map of the estate held at the John Oxley Library, even though badly damaged, shows a surfer riding a large blue

Alfred Bool's home is bottom right at the edge of the photo.





wave. The first day of sales on 15<sup>th</sup> April 1916 at 2:30pm offered Free Railway tickets from Melbourne Street Station, free plans of the estate, and a free hair ribbon for all girls. Races for ladies and gentlemen, and sports for the crowd, added to the carnival atmosphere of the day. The Estate gets a less than favourable mention in the recollections of Stewart Simmons, a long time local resident, in the book, 'Lota- through local eyes' by Cherrie Nicholson, "Going up Whites Road towards Manly on the left hand side was the Blue Wave

Estate and it didn't have a good name. I don't remember any of these shady characters being there-I was only five when we moved to White's Road but I remember hearing my father talking about them. There weren't many houses there then."

As a lad, Keith Bool would go to what was then his grandparents house, after his days at Manly State School. Playing golf with his grandfather on the property with a homemade putter. Clouds of dust would be stirred up by the occasional passing car on the

road out front, being only gravel in those days. Keith remembers two shops on Ernest Street, one across the road from the school, two doors down from the intersection owned by the Smith's. Another, in what is now a Chiropractors, was owned by Tommy Gorman, who would allow credit to the children for cigarettes, and was sadly ganged up on and robbed by a gang of kids. Tommy was forced to then install a steel mesh screen from behind which he could safely serve his customers.

Keith, another life long local who was also born at St Kilda hospital, recalls his grandfather working as the pastry cook at Tanton's, Stratton Terrace, Manly. His father, Marston Bool, working as a builder and then later a meat worker, and his mother Eunice, a Sunday School teacher who took great pride in her cottage garden which was augmented with cuttings she took from around the area.

Keith has been busy sorting and packing in anticipation of his imminent move, unearthing so many pieces of history from the property, which still has its old 'Thunder Box' sitting in the backyard. Among the many items is the original receipts for the connection to the sewer dated 29<sup>th</sup> October 1971, and shows a balance of \$164.34 being charged at a 6% interest rate. A

front page of the Wynnum Herald dated 29th November 1989, features a story about the house across the road catching fire and the 72 year old occupant, Stewart Keir, being saved by his hero neighbour, Garry Webb. Another edition of the Wynnum-Redland Herald dated May 9th 1979, has a front page story of the arson attack on Manly West primary school complete with on the spot photos taken by the Heralds own local photographer. The last page of the paper features a full page advertisement for McIlwraith's Hardware at 120 Bay Terrace Wynnum which spruiks potential Mother's Day presents such as an Electric jug for \$7.96. Greyhound racing record cards and bookies tickets highlight the Bool's family long involvement in the sport.

A photo in Keith's possession shows his father and grandfather posing with a greyhound across the road from the family home in front of bush. The power pole still bears the same identification number, 13902, to this day. Keith

kindly obliged when I asked if I could get a photo of him beside the pole to compare the change seen in the street. Keith reminisces momentarily about all the family pets buried on the property over the years, and while he decided to move on, Keith is very aware of the history associated with the house and has sold to someone who expressed their interest in doing the house up rather than bulldozing it. A fate of which so many homes await these days, as Kamarin Street now lays testament to, with 2 new builds standing on each of the old large 33 perch blocks, blocks so keenly sought after by developers. It is time for somebody else to make their own memories at the old Bool family home, Keith's and his

families association with Kamarin Street will soon be over, but not forgotten.


# Kamarin Street Name Mystery Solved

The original name for Kamarin Street on which the Bool family home is situated is Randall Avenue. According to the Brisbane City Council archives the name was changed in 1962, nessecitated by the duplication of names in the area, i.e. Randall Road. The Brisbane City Council record states that Kamarin Street is named after a 'Queensland Place Name'. The closet match that can be found is Kamaran Downs, a station situated

about 173km's north of Birdsville. Has anybody ever been or heard of any other place in Queensland called Kamarin? Perhaps its been spelled incorrectly or has aboriginal meaning. If you have please let us know. In the absence of information to the contrary it seems likely the street was named after 'Kamaran Downs' station. It can also be noted that Kamaran Island is the largest Yemeni island in the Red Sea.




# Queensland Separation Flag

When the procession of the first governor of Queensland made its way along Brisbane streets, the party included Mr. Herbert, Queensland's first Colonial Secretary. Proudly displayed along the route was what is now referred to as the, 'Queensland Separation Flag', a description of which appeared in newspapers of the day. Although this flag was never formally adopted it is a part of Queensland history and can be seen flying over Newstead House to this day. Herbert Street Lota is named after the first premier.

# From the 'Star' to Coles

Sixty two years ago, on May 17, 1959, the Wynnum Star Theatre was engulfed by fire.

Two firemen were killed during the 40 minute blaze that destroyed the theatre. The firemen were killed

when the projection room above them collapsed, burying them under burning debris and heavy equipment.

'The Star' as it was more commonly known by the local population, was situated in Florence Street and was opened on September 5, 1915. The Star held approximately 1500 people and although its primary function was that of a movie theatre,

premises was used to showcase other events including boxing and wrestling, fancy-dress balls and dancing.

An additional feature of the Star Theatre was its clock, which could be seen and heard from a great distance. When the 'first' Coles supermarket was built on this site, a clock tower was incorporated in the

original re-development of the property.

In approximately 1963, four years after the destruction of the Star Theatre, GJ Coles & Co built their 'first'

Queensland store on the site.

Finally, in 2009, Coles Wynnum Central was

extended and refurbished.

Customers who shopped at the store in the early days may recall the store operated its own 'milk bar' – unique feature for its time.

On September 3, 2008, Coles Wynnum Central unveiled a permanent tribute to the two firemen who lost

their lives trying to extinguish the fire that razed the Star Theatre.

The commemorative mural on the Florence Street sidewall of the building was developed by Coles

team

members who had first-hand knowledge and memories of the tragic event. The commemorative mural was

incorporated into the building design by Hutchinson Builders.

# Where would I have been? - April 2021



I would have been standing on the north-west corner of Bay Terrace and Bride Street looking diagonally across Bay Terrace.

The building on the left side is the former Irvine's Store, now shabby and derelict and converted into flats. The entry stairs to the top floor are against the side of the building.

In the centre is the Good Year Tyre and Auto Repair centre. On this site stood Wynnum's first Post Office opened c.1910.

Irvines Store opened in 1901. The Irvine family lived over the shop. Hugh died in 1941 and sons Sam and Bert maintained the business until 1946. Bayards (Hartley's) bought the business promising that they would maintain the service provided by the Irvine Family.

However by the early 1970s the shop had been partitioned off into smaller shops and flats on the upper level. The building became very shabby with peeling paint and asbestos repairs.

Hartley's sold to Hooker Developments in 1986 and the 86 year old building was dismantled. So the date that the photo was taken would have been around the early 1980s.
