



From the President

World War I. In August 1915 she was arrested by the Germans, court marshalled and charged, and subsequently executed on 12 October 1915.

So great was the impact of her violent death throughout the neutral world, that the recruiting rate doubled and the USA was brought into the war.

Edith Cavell was born in 1865 in the Norfolk village of Swardeston. She was the oldest of the four children of the Rev. Frederick Cavell. She commenced her nursing training in 1895 and by 1907 she was working in Brussels where she pioneered the training of nurses along those principles set by Florence Nightingale. During her time in Belgium, she wrote home: "The old idea that it is a disgrace for women to work is still held in Belgium and women of good birth and education still think they lose caste by earning their own living." However, these feelings soon changed when, the Queen of the Belgians fractured her arm and sent to the training clinic for help.

When World War I broke out, Edith took charge of the Red Cross hospital in Brussels, where, both Germans and Belgians were treated alike. It was there that she established an underground lifeline sheltering and enabling British soldiers to escape. For this she received a hail of German bullets.

On the night of her execution she said, "Patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone." After the war, her body was returned to the UK for reburial, and Westminster Abbey was considered as a suitable place. However, her family preferred Norwich Cathedral and her remains were brought there on 15 May 1919.

"Prawn Trawlers of Cabbage Tree Creek" by Brian Hutchison

Did you realise that the much-used bridge over Wynnum Creek in Tingal Road was not built until the 1960s . . .

£20,000 bridge to replace traffic hazard in Tingal Road

A reinforced concrete structure is to replace the existing wooden bridge in Tingal Road, Wynnum, near Berrima Street.

For years the increased traffic along Tingal Road has made this bridge particularly dangerous, especially for pedestrians as there is no provision of a footpath.

Being the only street running direct from Lytton and Wynnum North to Manly, traffic, including two bus services, is heavy and the width of the old bridge does not allow for two vehicles to pass with safety if one happened to be a bus or a large transport.

Costing £20,000 the new bridge will have a length of 34 feet, will be 30 feet between curbs with two 6 feet footpaths.

Alderman Clayton said that the new structure should provide 10 feet more width for the flow of traffic and the bridge will also permit the straightening of Tingal Road at this site.

Portion of the bridge has been finished. This has been erected adjacent to the old structure which will be demolished. The final stages of the new bridge will then be completed in its place.

The work is expected to be completed by the end of June.

Development of Foreshore is vital to District Progress

Reported by Murray Hulett for Wynnum and Manly Chamber of Commerce

Wynnum-Manly-Lota foreshore is recognised as one of the choicest strips of coastline on the vast Moreton Bay and it can almost be claimed that generations of citizens have clamoured for its development and improvement.

Yet it still remains neglected and for the most part ignored by officialdom and little or nothing has been done to utilize its great potential since the relief works of the "depression" years during 1929-1936.

On any fine week-end or holiday, many hundreds of people visit the shoreline and enjoy family picnics with the scant amenities which it offers.

The chief attraction seems that it is only an economical train or bus ride from the city or nearer suburbs or a short 12 miles or so drive by car. It continues to attract people only because of these conditions and not because it offers anything remotely resembling a pleasure resort.



Let us first look at the credit side of our foreshore attractions. From the Wynnum end we have a pier which has for the past two or more years been undergoing the slow process of reconditioning. It is felt that this is in the nature more of making an ancient structure safe, rather than an attempt to beautify or develop.

A band rotunda which is rapidly deteriorating into disrepair.

A wading pool which does not even start to fulfil the requirements of the hundreds who would use it.

A set of dressing sheds, or are they bathing boxes, which received a coat of paint in recent times, attract few if any patrons.

A pleasant enough drive to Manly, where we have another pier with facilities for the berthing of "pleasure craft" when the channel is sufficiently dredged to permit their approach and a hopelessly inadequate swimming baths, which is no longer large enough to cater for the local swimming clubs who regularly conduct "learn to swim" campaigns and classes for our young folk.

Even these and the schools who use them for swimming classes during the summer have too work a roster system, because these baths were designed long ago for a population of 7000 to 8000 people and not the 30 odd thousand of today.

Another band rotunda which sadly lacks maintenance and repair, an odd shelter shed etc and so on to Lota with its sweeping expanse of Esplanade and scenic drive to a dead end.

Not a great deal to stand to the credit of an otherwise thriving community and a city administration which has, with the exception of one short period, reigned supreme in civic affairs for years.

We have all seen the shoulders of the uncurbed side of the Esplanade gradually erode away and bog holes where water will lay for weeks after wet weather, we have noticed the appalling lack of lighting along the whole area

Most of us can remember the repeated negotiations for a safe "boat harbour" at Darling Point, which waxed at times and then alas waned to the limbo of forgotten things.

Let us discard this system of negative approach which seems to have developed to a cap-in-hand plea to Council



or State Government in favour of a positive and not-to-be denied practical approach with a sound and practical plan for development of the great potential which our district contains and which will no longer be denied.

We learn of the practical plans being put forward by the progressive Redlands Council for the development of the great coastline pf Stradbroke Island and for the creating of a boat harbour in Cleveland.

The plans and drive of this inspired body of citizens will soon achieve their goals and will result in the vast and lasting development of an already thriving shire.

This district has equal intelligence and ability in abundance amongst local citizens and it only needs to arouse the enthusiasm necessary to start a drive that will attain the necessary momentum to carry it to a successful completion of well laid plans for foreshore development.

These must include a high priority to full bathing facilities, first to cater for local school children and residents and secondly they must have adequate facilities for the hundreds of visitors who come each week, if we are to retain their patronage to our district.

The matter of maintenance of our road shoulders and foreshore buildings must be an automatic process. Our present wading pool offers ideal scope for enlarging to a perfect swimming pool, which could be designed to cater for swimmers at the one end and safe wading for children at the other.

Several modern, attractive designs have already been suggested for this purpose and any one of them would add immeasurably to our foreshore attraction.

We have taken the liberty of asking a local engineer to prepare a tentative plan for overall foreshore development with an eye to practical achievement, which we hope to publish in the near future in the hope of inspiring the support of a committee of citizens who will press without delay for complete foreshore facilities.

What has been achieved over the last fifty years?





A Report discovered in the Wynnum Herald of **13 December 1961** by Margaret Bulloch

Schoolmaster in a black box

Shades of Oliver Goldsmith and the villager schoolmaster:

"And still they gazed and still their wonder grew
—that small head could carry all he knew."

A British electronics firm has produced a "teaching machine" in a black box which is to be tested in some Edinburgh schools. The tests will be made under the supervision of Dr Keith, Edinburgh Corporation's Director of Education.

The design of the machine, a simple looking black box with Perspex windows and push buttons, is based on a system of presenting written information to a student in short stages, each sequence being followed by a question to test the student's knowledge to date.

One form of proceeding is to give about five different answers the student selecting one by pressing one of five buttons. The button pressed tells the machine if the pupil is bright, normal or requires further instruction.


For the bright student the machine presents more advanced information and questions. For the not-so-bright student it goes back to an earlier stage, to repeat and explain in greater detail, until by question and answer the stumbling block to learning is found.

Would this be the first attempt of using computers for educational purposes?

Today, Grade 2 in our schools learn with the aid of a computer.

In about 1912 the uselessness of the guns for defence purposes became apparent. A local citizen was granted a contract by the Council to transport three to the Wynnum foreshore; one was placed north of the Manly Jetty, this one north of the entrance to the Wynnum Central Jetty and the third found a resting place on the beachfront north of the Wynnum Creek. After restoration the cannon at Manly was returned to Fort Lytton and is fired on special occasions.

B Company of the Moreton Regiment was the first unit to use the Drill Hall as their headquarters in 1916. Stephen's presentation is based on research for his publication "Reflections on a Military Presence" where he has blended the history of the Sandgate Drill Hall with many stories and photographs from individual soldiers from the district.
