Residence of Thomas and Eliza Dean



Shooting rats a lucrative pastime

SHOOTING rats was a lucrative pastime for a boy growing up in the 1920s, especially at sixpence per carcass. Wynnum historian Jack Sands 81, was one of many youngsters of the Great Depression era who refined their marksmanship skills using rats as the target.

Jack recalls regularly bagging good catches of the rodents and handing them over to the authorities in exchange for what was then a sizeable reward.

But there was a darker side to Jack's boyhood bounty hunting expeditions.

The price on dead rats was the direct result of a 1900 outbreak of bubonic plague in Brisbane, an epidemic which claimed 219 lives during the next decade.

The first plague victim, a Woolloongabba van driver, had regularly carried goods from a Brisbane wharf which medical examiners of the day found to be the home of plague infested rats.

Subsequent cases of plague in Spring Hill, Wickham Terrace, Red Hill and Paddington were believed to be due to wharf rats using an old and defective sewer as a "highway', infecting other rat communities in the course of their travels.

As the plague gathered momentum "tent hospitals" were established at Colmslie and Lytton to quarantine vic-

Jack said it was a sad fact that a government plan to clean up towns and eradicate the disease had initially met with opposition from the ill-informed, many of whom believed that Brisbane's Chinese population was responsible for the epidemic.

A clean up campaign was well under way by 1902 and a bounty placed on rats was still in force more than 20 years later.

Jack said many of those who died from the plague lie buried on Gibson Island, but no memorials mark the site because "nobody knows where they were buried."

He said medicine had come a long way since the turn of the century when people also regularly died from illnesses such as diphtheria, tuberculosis (known in the early days as consumption), tonsillitis, appendicitis, pneumonia and a throat infection called quinzey.

"In the case of serious illness or an operation there was always what we called a "three-day crisis," Jack said. "If the patients rallied to survive the first three days their chances of recovery were good."

Jack said blood transfusions such as the one given to his brother-in-law were unbelievably primitive.

"The blood donor would be put into a bed alongside the patient and blood would be collected by opening the donor's vein, collecting the blood and passing it literally into a vein in the patient," he said.

"This actually happened to my brother-in-law following an amputation. Both the patient and the donor lived for many years afterwards."

As a founding member of the Wynnum Manly Historical Society, Jack gives regular talks at clubs, libraries and schools "when I'm invited."

And he may be just joking when he describes himself as "a living relic", but metaphorically speaking, the description is superb.

That is if you take the dictionary's definition of a relic as "something treasured for its past associations."

And as far as Wynnum is concerned, Jack's association goes back a long way and his memories are a historical treasury.

Medical Care in Wynnum Manly

The early Wynnum citizens had the services of nurses and midwives who travelled from home to home as required. Small "Hospitals" followed, for example, the six-bed St Mary's Hospital on Bay Terrace, the maternity services at St Kilda. These premises were really nursing homes where the early doctors visited their convalescing patients.

The first chemist shop was owned by Thomas and Chater, next door to Reeve House (now Ray White) in the early 1900s. The early chemists imparted much medical advice. The Ambulance Movement stared in Wynnum in 1915.

Not until the 1950's was the need recognised for a fully equipped hospital in Wynnum. In 1955 "Bill" Gunn, (State Member, 1944 – 1966) reports in the *Herald* as follows:

"Proposed Wynnum Hospital sites inspected

The first step in recognition of Wynnum's claim for a hospital has now been achieved, said Mr W M Gunn yesterday. In company with members of the South Coast Hospitals Board he made a thorough inspection of the district to secure a suitable site for hospital purposes.

Many excellent sites were inspected and Mr Gunn is now awaiting the Board's decision as to the most favoured.

Board members present for the inspection included Dr A Pye (Brisbane General Hospital; Mr Coll assistant Under Secretary of Department Health and Home Affairs; Mr Mahoney, manager Brisbane General Hospital; Mr P Hanion and Mr Bryan.

Queensland is the only State that has held fast to its free hospital scheme, said Mr Gunn. Free hospital and medical services introduced by a Labor Government many years ago are a traditional and integral part of the government's policy and to spread hospitals throughout the length and breadth of the State.

The ever-increasing population throughout the State and particularly the Greater Brisbane area has called for further expansion of our hospital programme. The Queensland Government in keeping with its progressive medical policy and to meet the requirements of Greater Brisbane established a most modern hospital at South Brisbane.

The structure will provide accommodation for a further 716 beds, at a cost of £4,000,000 and is expected to be completed in the very near future, will no doubt, in conjunction with the Brisbane General, provide adequate accommodation for Brisbane's requirements.

The time has now arrived said Mr Gunn to implement the policy set down by the government six years ago when it was decided to establish hospitals in and around the more populated districts within the Greater Brisbane area at the time.

Mr Gunn emphasised the necessity why Wynnum should receive priority over other contemplated units to be built, pointing out that a hospital built at Wynnum would serve not only the local population of approximately 30,000, but also the Cleveland, Redland Bay and surrounding districts.

HOSPITAL SITE?

A roundsman of the Chamber of Commerce reports that the Brisbane and South Coast Hospitals' Board representatives were very interested in properties in the vicinity of Wagner's Corner last week. It is understood that the area of land sought is approximately four acres.

Moves have been made by the Chamber to secure a visit from the Lord Mayor as early as possible to ascertain the new council policy and intentions in regard to improvements in our districts. "

With change of Government in 1966 came the statement "No decision has yet been reached by the State Government on the establishment of a public hospital in Wynnum" Wyn Her. 24 August 1966

However on the 30th October 1966 a loan was approved by the Government for the establishment of a hospital in the area. Six years later on 9 December 1972 a reserve of land, formerly owned by the Education Department was set aside for the development of the hospital in Whites Road, Lota. Nine years later Sir William Knox was present when earthworks for building officially commenced on 5 August 1880, for a forty-bed secondary hospital. The first parent admitted was Mrs Marie Petersen on18 January 1982.

But thirty years later, in 2011, Ambulances officers are instructed not to deliver patients to Wynnum Hospital. We learnt that \$13.6 million was given to Redlands Hospital on February 1 2012 and Wynnum Hospital was closed on 31 October 2012.

Five years later, "Gundu Pa" has arrived, not a hospital, but "a new frontier for health on the Bayside", and built on the site that was considered for a hospital in 1955.

The park on the Lower Esplanade at Darling Point, fairly close to Darling Point School was named after Bob Drevesen.

Bob was listed in the 1978 Queen's New Year Honours list for outstanding Community Service. His interest in sailing commenced at the age of 10 years, racing model yachts. He was one of the founding members of the Imperial Junior Sailing Club, in 1928, which became the Darling Point 10' Flying Squadron in 1930. He assisted in building Sabots for the Darling Point School and instructing children to sail them. Bob was a member of the Lions Club and the Lota Pensioners' League where he organised activities for the "oldies".

HISTORIC BUILDING

This building was built in 1923 as the second Wynnum Post Office, the first being located in shop premises at 57 Bay Terrace. It was subsequently re-named the Wynnum Central Post Office to more correctly relate to the area it served. After 71 years as a Post Office and Manual Telephone Exchange, the operations of Australia Post were, in 1994, transferred to a new modern building in Edith Street.

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This plaque was erected in the interest of Local History by the Wynnum Manly Historical Society.

"Where was I?" this month was a photo of the plaque mounted at Drevesen Park, Lower Esplanade, Manly. Bob was recognised in the Queen's New Year's Honours List in 1978 for outstanding community Service. He started sailing at the age of 10 years with model yacht racing at the Darling Point basin, then crewed for his father. He helped form the Imperial Junior Sailing Club in the 1928. This Club became the Darling Point 10' Flying Squadron in 1930. Bob helped the Darling Point School with the building and sailing of Sabots.

Over 15,000,000 persons died from the start in 1918, more than the number of deaths from the two World Wars. Matthew explained the strict quarantine conditions imposed as soldiers brought the disease back from Europe, when returning home after WW1. People were jailed in Queensland for crossing the border from NSW and not observing the Quarantine rules.
