

The setting was the grounds of Ringsfield House, which contains many historic buildings such as a Shepherd's hut and an old school.

At lunch we were entertained by local bush poets. The food was well prepared and with dessert and a glass of wine or a cup of tea, it made for a very enjoyable time. After lunch we visited the Information Centre where a generator was started up. This machine powered the butter factory and the town. Nanango is a good example of a town that has moved with the times. The talks also made me realize how hard life once was for people. Up at five to milk the cows by hand and then again in the afternoon. How times change.

The next trip is to the Tramway Museum and Dayboro. It promises to be a good day.

At the last meeting Gerry Cunneen reminded me of the DVD he had made of the National Servicemen's Association Memorial dedication at Darling point last June. I was not present at the service and Gerry's DVD is a good record of the event. I visited the memorial during the week, which is dedicated to four National Servicemen from the Wynnum area who died in Vietnam. As Vietnam Veterans Day fall on Wedesday 19th August this year, the day before our meeting, I thought it fitting that I give a spot talk about the significance of the day and the memorial at Darling Point. NEWS FROM THE RESOURCE CENTRE – July 2010

• Early pioneers of the district are still being found. Brian Tranter recently was asking for information about the Lee family, at the turn of last century. He was in luck!

Emily and Henry Robert Lee had a smallholding in Bride Street (subdivisions 376, 377 and 378) on the northern side of the street, almost at Tingal Road. Emily died on 21 July 1902 and Henry Roberet Lee left the district and moved to Stafford in 1906. He died in 1919. Brian will be bringing in some photographs for this new addition to the "Pioneer Register".

• Pete, the Furniture Man has closed his shop at 121 Bay Terrace, between "Dollars and Sense" and Hargreaves Real Estate. Chemist Warehouse will be opening in mid-July.

A question has been asked – who was the trader on the site previous to Pete, The Furniture Man? Was it BCC stores? And what was there before BCC? Does anyone remember?

Last week, one of our visitors was seeking information about the Great Wall of Manly, in Falcon Street for a University assignment. She happened to mention that the Church Hall at St John Vianney's Church was to be demolished.




This Church Hall was originally built in 1927 by Percy Shepherd and Vince Grotty, using some of the timber from an old pickle factory located on the site. In 1936 Father Gabriel Nolan saw to the conversion of the Hall to a Church and on 16 December 1936 the completed building was blessed by Archbishop J Duhig. The Church was extended in early 1946.

In 1990 the Church was relocated to allow for the building of today's brick Church. Again the original church became a church hall, which now in 2010 is being demolished. Can anyone indicate the reason for the demolition and for what will the space be used?

• The Society would like to congratulate Robyn Nalder of "Tin Shed " fame for obtaining funding to produce a photographic collection chronicling the history of Gumdale and Birkdale during the 1920s.

Several members of our Society assisted Robyn in the relocation of a kerosene tin shed, previously a home in the 1930's, from Green Camp Road to New Cleveland Road where the shed was reconstructed beside the Gumdale Progress Hall. Now a museum depicting home life in the 1930's, the building is open to the public at weekends. Check with Robyn (3245 5009) for a suitable time for a visit.

FEATURE ARTICLE: Lost friends

It started in March this year. Olga Lindsay (nee Szabo) travelling with her husband John, a 'Nomadic Adventurer' 'It ain't over 'til it's over' is their motto, decided to contact her long lost school friend, Gale Haynes. She had an old damaged photograph of her Wynnum State High School Commercial stream class, 3C2/ 4C2 taken in 1962 or 63. In those days there were three choices for students in Years 9 and 10. Industrial for boys, Commercial for boys and girls, and Academic for those wanting higher study. In Commercial, students studied Typing, Bookkeeping and Shorthand, just what you needed for a job in an office.

Olga and her husband, who were travelling through Victoria and staying in Ballarat, rang the Teacher/Librarian at Wynnum State High School. The School had no up to date records of past students, so she was advised to contact Brian Brandenburg, the President of the WMHS. I received a phone call from Olga and later an email with the school photograph and a list of names, which included Elga and Maija, who Olga thought might be able to help locate Gale. Olga also knew that Gale had married a twin and had worked at Burns Philp in Brisbane.

As it happened, I attended WSHS in 1961 and was in form class 3C2, a year before Olga began. I immediately recognised Olga's form teacher, Mr. Griffiths. Mr. Griffiths organised the school army cadets. It was every boy's dream to be picked for the squad. I wasn't. Ironically, six years later I was called up for National Service and had to serve in the Australian Army. As a member of the cadets, I might have been better prepared for army life.

I also recognised some of the students in the photograph. One was Margaret Swan. Margaret and I began Primary School together at Wynnum Central in the prep class of 1952. A few years ago, we had a reunion. I thought with Margaret's help, it would be a 'piece of cake' to track Gale down. I was wrong.

Emails to Margaret led nowhere. This was going to be harder than I thought. Next step - why not advertise in the WMHS Newsletter. The school photograph was published in the next issue, with the list of students sought. Gale, Elga and Maija. At our next meeting, there was an immediate response. Marie Stokes knew Maija. This led to an interesting story which Marie told me.

After WW2, a Lutheran pastor helped a number of Latvian families settle in the Wynnum area. Elga and Maija were of Latvian origin. I also remembered I had a Latvian girl in my class at High School. Was Olga and her friends part of a Wynnum Latvian community. Not so. Olga lived at Hemmant and was of Hungarian origin. Maija also turned out not to be the one we were looking for, but, she did know where the other Maija was. Unfortunately when Olga contacted her she had no information. Another blank.

At this time, I was preparing for an overseas trip. Olga and her husband, John, were coming to Brisbane for a holiday, a few days after my return. It seemed we could do little more than visit the Wynnum High School and look at the Year books which were kept in their Library. Gale Haynes had disappeared. This is not surprising, for usually, when women marry they change their surname to that of their husband. This was true for our Wynnum Central reunion. The boys were easy to find. Many of the girls were never located

Then I bumped into Sandra. Sandra and I had been students a WSHS in 3C2 in 1961. I remember getting into trouble for pretending to dip Sandra's pigtails into the ink wells. There was of course no ink in them. Sandra had also been a teacher as I was. She thought she could help. Sandra remembered Gale Haynes and confirmed that she had married a twin. One of the twins was Robert Brown but she could not remember the other twin's name.

I searched the telephone books for an R. Brown in the Wynnum district. No luck. It was not unusual for people to move away. Where could he be? There are a lot of R Browns in the directory. I happened to mention this to Myrtle Beitz, our local historian. She knew of a Robert Brown that went to her Church. A call to the Parish office confirmed that he had moved away, address unknown. The Secretary knew he had a twin but could not remember his name. Both twins were married. It looked like a lot of work ringing all the R. Browns in the telephone book. On a chance, I rang the Parish office again. The Secretary had just remembered the other twin's name. It was Alan and he lived with his wife in Manly.

As I looked through the directory for an A & G Brown the mobile rang. Olga always rang me on the mobile. "Hold on" I said. I rang the Brown number on the home phone. "Is that Alan and are you married to Gale?" "Yes", he replied. "Is Gale there?" I asked. "I have one of her old high school friends here who is trying to contact her." "No", he said. "Gale is up at the hospital. Our daughter has just given birth to twins."

Later in the day, Olga was in touch with Gale. When Olga and her husband, John, visited Wynnum in May, they met Alan and Gale. It was a very happy reunion.

In forty years time, I am sure some of these young people will be looking for old school friends. I hope they find them.

OUR PIONEERS - Hedley Francis SIBLEY

The society has a continuing project to collect information on persons residing in Wynnum, Manly, Lota and district prior to 1912. In 1912 Wynnum became a town inits own right and there were only few hundred people residing here at that time.

This month we feature HEDLEY FRANCIS SIBLEY.

Josiah Sibley and Jane Willingham were married on 24 July 1867 at Bury St Edmunds in Suffolk. Their eldest son, but second child, Hedley Frances Sibley was born on 9 April 1869 at Charlton Musgrave in Somerset, England. His mother died in childbirth at the age of 38 years.

Hedley did not get along with his new step-mother. He ran away from home, put up his age and joined the army as 'George' Sibley. He served for 30 years in the army with both the 1st and 4th Norfolk Regiments.

When he eventually produced his birth certificate and he served as Hedley F. Sibley. Twelve years were spent in India, including action in the Burma War. His record was unblemished and his service was recognised with a medal, presented in 1909 by King Edward VII for long and meritorious conduct.

He met his wife Beatrice in India, she had been widowed after only 18 months of marriage to Thomas Porter, a British serviceman in the 1st Norfolk regiment who died on April 25 1898. Hedley, aged 21 years, and Beatrice, aged 20 years, were married on11 July 1898 at Allahabad, India by Garrison Chaplain G E Oldman.

Three children were born in India, Hedley Francis Junior (1899), Lilian May (1900) and Lydia Gladys(1903). Three more children were born in England, Beatrice Mary (1905), Josiah (1906) and Percival Clarence (1907). The family moved to Australia and two more children were born, Edith Rose (1913) and Albert Eric (1915).

When his tour of duty with the British Army was completed Hedley brought his family to Australia. They left Tilbury Docks, London on the *"Orana"*, a Royal Mail steamship of the Orient Line on 10 November 1911 and arrived in Brisbane on Christmas Day 1911. His sister May had moved to Australia in 1889 followed by their father, then the rest of the family.

Hedley and his family settled on his brother, Percy's farm at Lindum and Hedley worked for Brit and Co as an accountant for 14 years. Hedley eventually bought his brother Percy's farm and more property nearby, including the present site of "Pleasantville". He worked his own sandpits, with the help of his son Eric. On the farm he grew bananas, pineapples, small crops and he kept some Jersey cows for milking.

Hedley was thrice elected Councillor of Ward 4 in the Wynnum Town Council (1920 – 1923) and served as Chairman of Finance. He was held in high esteem for his honesty and loyalty. He donated land on his property for a road to make easy access to Wynnum, now known as Sibley Road.

Hedley died in December 1950 and he and Beatrice are buried in Hemmant cemetery. Their youngest son, Eric died on 2 June 1999. However with their 35 grand children there are many descendents living in the district.

Eccles Cakes

8 ozs puff pastry

(or sheet pastry. Using a 3 1/2inch diam cutter you can get six rounds out of a sheet of pastry)

6 oz currents

1 teaspoon mixed spice

1 oz soft brown sugar

Milk or a little beaten egg white

A little granulated sugar

Chorley Cakes, from the neighbouring town of Chorley, are similar, except that they contain mixed peel and have four 'slashes'. Lancashire cakes are made the same way, but with a yeast dough instead of puff pastry. They are pricked, not slashed before baking, and when cooked resemble fruit-filled buns Set oven to 230 c . Cut 6 x 9cm (3 ½ inch) rounds out of each sheet of pastry. Mix together the butter, currents, spice and sugar and place generous spoonfuls in the centre of each round. Dampen the edges of the pastry, draw up into the centre, like a parcel to enclose the filling and seal well. Turn over and flatten very lightly with a rolling pin. With a knife, make 3 slashes across the top of each cake, brush with milk or egg white and sprinkle with sugar. Place on a greased baking sheet and cook for 15 minutes or until golden. Serve warm with cream.

These little cakes are believed to date back to medieval days, and they were originally served at religious festivals – the three 'slashes' being said to represent the Holy Trinity

THE FIRE BRIGADE BELL


Whilst in Maryborough recently, Ian Wheeler came across an old bell bearing a striking resemblance to our very own fire brigade bell.


