Presidents Report

Greetings.....and welcome to our May newsletter. Thanks to those who supported our bus trip on the 30th April, and a big thankyou you Doug and Debbie who took care of all the organization. It was an interesting day and we certainly had an enjoyable time. For most us it was our 1st ride on



the Gold Coast light rail link, which was a lot of fun. The scenic drive back via Canungra was most enjoyable.

It is with sadness that I report the recent death of our past president and longtime member, Percy Duke. Percy was in his late nineties and was a longtime resident in the area, having attended school in Wynnum West.

This month marks the 120th anniversary of the first car show at Londons Imperial institute. The display included ten models of "Horseless Carriages" as they were then called and they caused quite a sensation for the Londoners of that time.

Last month I forgot to mention a most significant event for all theatre lovers – the 400th anniversary of the death of playwright, William Shakespeare on the 23rd April 1616. This is the traditional date for both his death and his birth (in 1564) One wonders at the coincidence that this is also St Georges day, the national day of England (quite an appropriate day for such a significant English poet, playwright and actor to be born and die).

Shakespeare wrote his first major play, "Loves Labour Lost" in 1588, but it was only staged in 1594. His first performed play was "Henry VI – Part One" around 1589 and his last "Henry VIII" was staged in 1613. He married Anne Hathaway in 1582. They had three children, including twins.

I've always appreciated Shakespeare's very fine understanding of human nature. He really had his finger on the pulse of the society in which he lived and his wisdom comes through in all his writings. I will conclude with some of his pearls of wisdom.





A School for Wynnum?

Part 3

In February's Newsletter we learnt about the acquisition of the land, in March, the first pupil. April gave a report of the building workers of the new brick building. This month we follow the development of the school from the opening of the modern building in the 1940's to the 1980's

1940 to 1980's

The first Parents and Citizens Association was formed on 11 February 1944. The meeting was sponsored by the Head Teacher, Mr Derrington and 11 parents attended.

In August 1944 the Parents and Citizens Association applied for a new building.

Progress was slow and in February 1945 the Association approached Mr WM Gunn MLA to see if plans for a new building could be drawn and part of the building started to relieve congestion in the infant classes. Mr Gunn had already approached the Minister but he agreed to have another try. Due to his persistence approval was given on 15 March 1945 to prepare and plan a plan of 17 rooms and a preliminary cost of 6 rooms for infant classes. On 29 April an amended plan was drawn to provide nine classes.

In November 1946 the Foundation stone was laid and on 2 November 1946 and building of the new school commenced. This building provided employment for the local tradespeople £the area and generally boosted the economy. There was a sense of enthusiasm in Wynnum's close-knit community.

The former drainage problems re –emerged in the digging of the foundations. The late Les Greenhill was an apprentice on site for the first phase of the building and part of the second phase. In a talk given to the Wynnum Manly Historical

Societyin1995 he remembered when the foundations collapsed at the end of the building of the first level. There was no heavy machinery in the 1940's, all earth digging was by hand. Men could be digging for an 8-hour shift. The new trench was 30ft deep and the walls timbered to reduce the chance of a further collapse.

The entire building was constructed with the use of only one electric power drill and a petrol driven circular saw. Huge hardwood timbers were cut precisely with cross cut saws and hoisted to the roof with a hand winch and a block and tackle. Each brick was cut with a bolster and lump hammer. Most workers brought their own tools with them and had them serviced on site. Construction continued for five years.

First phase of Wynnum Central State School, completed on 24 December 1948

The first phase was completed on 24 December 1948 and the building officially opened on 5 February 1949 by the Hon H A Bruce MLA Minister for Public Instruction assisted by Mr W M Gunn MLA, Member for Wynnum Manly. Daily attendance in January 1949 averaged 633 students, less than in the 1930's, but now only catering for Grades 1 to 5 as Wynnum Intermediate and High school had been opened in 1941.

Bernard Mahoney was the Head Teacher and great festivities were arranged for the official opening. Bicycles were festooned with crepe paper, some with red, white and blue strips threaded through their spokes. There were square dancers, fancy dress parades, precisions movement groups and the choir produced an acetate play-back record of the school song, "Excelsior".

The second phase of the building was completed and opened in 1953 and any superfluous buildings, eg the original play shed, were removed. The School Association convinced the Department to retain the original timber buildings and they remained until demolition in 2015, after the school had closed. Seating and storerooms were added in 1953 under the new building to provide a dry lunchtime retreat.



Part of Memorial Gates placed in Florence Street Memorial gates were installed and opened on 10 October 1954 at the Florence Street entrance to honour the former pupils of the school who were killed in the wars overseas. The fountain and stone, previously dedicated to those who died in the 1914 -1918 war was removed from the Charlotte Street side of the school and placed at the front of the new building. A flagpole was added in 1955. The Memorial Gates have been moved to the new Wynnum State School in Box grove Avenue after 2012.

The 1950's and 1960's were known for the spectacular fetes held in the school grounds. Roy Mahoney, son of Bernard Mahoney, and member of staff 1950 – 1957 and 1962 – 1964, trained the boys in precision gymnastics.

The girls demonstrated precision, skilled performances with pine-turned clubs, painted bright colours, which were fitted with wires, batteries and coloured cellophane for spectacular for night time club swinging performances.



The Drum and Fife Band, founded in 1931, was still performing, but by 1960 girl players stood alongside boys in the previously all-boys band and the peaked caps had been traded in!

This new modern school did not have a dedicated library in 1955, just a reading room, often used for other purposes. In 1965 Karl Volker was the new school principal and immediately began creating a "place where children do not want to leave". Soon the room had tripled in size. There were rotating magazine stands, book displays and large landscapes on the walls. When Mr Volker retired in 1975 the Library was named after him.

The need for a Special Education Unit was not recognised until 1985, when an unofficial Wynnum Central State School Project was established, but with no funding. Special Education teacher, Elizabeth Marshall scrounged around for tables and chairs and had the support of the two infant teachers, Lena McCreadie and Doreen Wilson. The following year the Unit received \$800 to build up Staff and materials.
