Presidents Report

Our first week in the UK coincided with half term school holidays. This meant we could spend time with the family. As a result, we enjoyed time sailing on their boat "Winsome" sailing on the River Hamble from Warsash along Southampton Waters crossing the Solent on a course to Yarmouth on the western end of the Isle of Wight.

Before leaving Australia I saw the movie "Victoria and Abdul" starring Dame Judi Dench and Ali Fazal. Can I recommend if you get the opportunity, go and see this movie?

At the height of her reign, Queen Victoria and her husband Prince Albert chose the Isle of Wight as their favourite holiday spot. Creating a palatial home at Osborne, East Cowes, the royal family spent their holidays visiting attractions, towns and beauty spots across the Isle of Wight. The movie was partially shot on location at Osborne.

The seaside palace was designed by Prince Albert in an Italianate style, Osborne was the much-loved seaside home of Queen Victoria, her husband and their nine children. Osborne was a regal dwelling but also very much a private family home that reflected the royal family's personal taste as well as more stately requirements.

Long holidays at Osborne gave the family much valued time together; swimming, breakfasting al fresco and gardening in the grounds as well as the chance to visit locations across the Isle of Wight. Just a short carriage ride (or in our case, an opened top double decker bus) from Osborne, St Mildred's Church, Whippingham was redesigned by Prince Albert, and rebuilt in a style considered to be more suitable for the royal family.

The family worshipped at St Mildred's when in residence at Osborne. Queen Victoria's youngest daughter Princess Beatrice and her husband were married here and buried here.

Now a private residence, the Prince Consort building was previously known as the Royal Victoria Yacht Club and overlooks the Solent from the western end of the esplanade at Ryde. It was built as a private place for the Queen, because the Royal Yacht Squadron, Cowes would not allow female visitors - whether they were royal or not. (I guess that is why we are moored further west at Yarmouth)

In Victorian times Ventnor became a fashionable holiday and health resort not least because Sir James Clark, Queen Victoria's surgeon recommended the health-giving properties of Ventnor's climate. According to Clark; "Nothing along the south coast will bear comparison with it".

During the early part of Victoria's reign, her Government made a huge investment to protect Portsmouth from the threat of French invasion and Prince Albert, an avid Army reformer, was involved in the design and naming of the first of Palmerston's coastal defences on the Island, Fort Victoria, occupying a commanding view of the Solent west of Yarmouth.

Now on the edge of a woodland Country Park, the Fort's brick casemates currently host a series of indoor family attractions including an archaeology discovery centre, cafe, model railway, reptilium and planetarium. (Doug, the girls and I enjoyed a few hours exploring the discovery centre before retiring to the café for a well-earned cream tea)

The Isle of Wight retreat of Poet Laureate Alfred, Lord Tennyson, Farringford was the centre of the Freshwater Circle group of writers, artists and intellectuals.

Tennyson was a regular guest at Osborne. Prince Albert visited Farringford in 1856, leaving with a handpicked bunch of cowslips to take back for the Queen.

First opened to the public in 1817, the young Princess Victoria visited Shanklin Chine aged 14 with her mother in 1833. Entry was via Fisherman's Cottage (open as a pub today) where local fisherman and smuggler William Colenutt charged an entrance fee. According to legend the then Princess Victoria helped herself to a prawn on the way in!

Queen Victoria continued to visit Shanklin Chine including a visit on Monday, 10 August 1846, with Prince Albert and Leopold and Louise (King and Queen of the Belgians). The Marconi Monument at The Needles Landmark Attraction commemorates the spot where Guglielmo Marconi set up his revolutionary wireless equipment and sent the very first wireless transmission.

In August 1898, Queen Victoria was said to be "delighted" when Marconi, summoned to Osborne House, went on to establish radio communication between Queen Victoria at Osborne and the Prince of Wales (later Edward VII) who was on-board the Royal Yacht "Osborne".

We have a few more weeks to explore Hampshire as well as making a trip north to visit my father's only living sibling and her family. I hope the weather holds for us because in Manchester it either rains or rains harder, still I guess that is all part of the experience.

This is our last newsletter for the year, so I would like to take this opportunity to wish all our members and their families a very happy and safe Christmas and New Year. I look forward to seeing everyone on the third Sunday in January 21st, for our first meeting of the year at our new venue at the Wynnum Library.

- *Sammy Greene's Bicycle*



My apologies to Fay Sheriff, who sent in the details of Sammy Greene's motorised bicycle, but they did not reach me.

The details were provided by Beverley Easterby (nee Greene), Sammy's grandchild, who now lives at Hervey Bay.

"The bike was an auto scooter that he (Sammy) was killed on. I had that at my place for a long time and eventually sold it to a cousin of mum's. Sam started riding auto cycles which was like an ordinary bicycle with a motor, had to be peddled some of the time. I believe that he had quite a few accidents with them. " Thank you Fay.

Beverley also added, "We have an "e" on the end of our name as in "Greene", put there to distinguish the name from other Greens as mail used to get confused so I was told. That apparently was in Wales where the Greens originally lived."

Peter Hughes adds that "Mr Sam Greene's auto bike was a "Sun" brand."

- *In October I wrote "Do you remember this Boarding/Unit House?"*

Peter Hughes certainly did remember Beach House and he wrote the following article for us.

"The old Beach House was on the corner of Edith Street and the Esplanade. I lived in the front flat with my parents from October 1942 to May 1956.

Happy Jack Graham was a Watkin's dealer, similar to

Raw leighs. His products were fitted into a well-presented horse and sulky outfit and he went as far as Redland Bay selling his wares. As a boy I travelled with him several times. He sang all the catchy religious songs, some he put his own words to. His classic was. "Even if your hens don't lay, keep on praising God."

Jack and Maud Graham were highly involved with the Assembly of God Church in Edith Street about the Suncorp/National Bank area – it was a small wooden building.

Subsequent owners of the beach house were the Pratt family of the Moreton Runner Company at the 'Gabba', and Bob West who also owned a nearby Esplanade property .

PEEP INTO OUR PAST**Swimming with women - a hot issue at Wynnum**

AUSTRALIANS today have become blasé at the sight of pretty girls in what is now commonly referred to as string bikinis. Walk along any famous Gold Coast or Sunshine Coast beach at the height of summer and you will see hundreds of our long limbed, lovely Australian lasses taking the sun and the water. The Granite Beach set hardly raises a ripple, even on television.

But there was a time when mixed bathing raised more than an eyebrow. It raised pure hell to say the least. Wynnum which was a well known Brisbane watering resort around the early 1900's and owed its growth in no small measure to its "bathing facilities".

SEAL

Today's civic fathers have set the seal of approval on mixed bathing and the image of the glorious Australian beach girl. Why, an octogenarian gentleman regularly uses a bevy of bikini clad beach beauties to publicise the delights of the coast in Melbourne and other southern cold climes.

Regularly, each summer we have a spate of Miss Sun Girl, or Miss Beach Belle or whatever. Today these lovely young ladies are acclaimed for their anatomical attributes by all and sundry.

A win in one of these beach beauty quests ensures the winner a quick ride to affluence with modelling contracts, lump sum cash prizes and instant media fame.

BATTLE

Back in January, 1913 at Wynnum the question of bathing between the sexes rose its ugly head. Wynnum, as a "watering place par excellence", was caught up in the battle. The community was somewhat divided. There were plenty for and plenty against.

Letters to the Editor of the Brisbane Courier, forerunner of today's Courier-Mail, waxed hot and strong on the issue. There was plenty of tut-tutting, frowns and downright cussing on the issue.

The blue-stockings brigade poured hellfire and brimstone on those who indulged in "mixed bathing". Those indulgences, if they can be called that, retaliated in kind. One erstwhile citizen got off this missive to the Courier.

"As I am only a stranger here I would like to ask why mixed bathing is not allowed at most if not all the seaside resorts around Brisbane. "I was at Wynnum on New Year's Day when a few couples were seen bathing together and a person seeing this "terrible crime" walked on to the jetty and made a notable fuss about the "crime". Signed: Somebody's Husband.

The same day the Courier presses ran hot with this gem - under the heading "Mixed Blessings".

"Sir, hitherto I have been an advocate of the above as being as capable of affording as pleasant a means of social intercourse as dancing or any other social gathering. But my attitude towards mixed bathing has been very much altered by the conduct of a number of young fellows at Wynnum South during the Christmas and New Year holidays."

SWIMMING

"The actions of some of the male persons (it would be a misnomer to call them men) were disgusting and brutish in the extreme.

"Entering the water in regulation costume some of them would drop their hose as soon as they were in sufficiently deep water and then act after the manner of brutes and approached females who were bathing. These being without protection were the more easily attacked.

"Several girls who had been unable to escape from these barbarians, were in such a fix that they certainly would have been insulted had there not been at hand several men from the Senior Christian Brothers College, who were swimming in the same place and who, being chivalrous gentlemen, rescued and protected the young ladies till they reached a place of safety (some with bathing costumes nearly torn off them).

MORALS

The writer continued:

"For the sake of the morals of the rising generation I think it is in the interest of parents to do all in their power to have mixed bathing strenuously regulated, even if the pleasure of a self-controlled majority should be diminished."

The writer signed himself or herself "An Eight Years Resident."

Despite the letters, Wynnum people called it a Brisbane-inspired plot and continued to bathe, mixed or not. Wynnum knew it was on a good thing and publicity re mixed bathing did not do the old town any harm. Actually, the gawkers came in their thousands to see what all the fuss was about, some to openly ogle the young lasses along the esplanade which was then coming into its own.

Aboriginal Place Names . . .

Tingalpa

The word “Tingalpa” pronounced Ting-al-bah by the Aborigines from tingal, the word for ‘fat’ and bah ‘there’ as usual actually “the place where we got the fat”, originating from an early settler, who had a fat cow killed by a falling tree, and he presented her to the Aborigines, who had never seen so much fat before in all their lives and they never forgot the cow. Now the fine euphonious word is changed to Tingalpa.

Tingalpa

Tingalpa come from TINGGAL – meaning Fat and PA meaning plenty. There was a great supply of food and many fresh water billabongs plus the creek.

WYNNUM AND MANLY NOTES

This report, appeared in the “Brisbane Courier” in 1900, emphasising the early rivalry between Sandgate and Wynnum for recognition. The railway line had reached Sandgate in 1882, being built to take city residents to the fresh sea breezes of Moreton Bay. Wynnum did not have the benefit of many visitors until the railway to Cleveland opened in November 1889. Sandgate was always ahead of Wynnum in its early development.

In 1900 we read:-

“At the last meeting of the board (writes our Wynnum and Manly correspondent) correspondence was read from the Railway Department on the question of running excursion trains when band concerts were given at Wynnum and Manly and the apparent lack of decision on the part of the Commissioner provoked several members to draw a comparison between Sandgate and Wynnum in the matter of railway favours. Some very caustic things were said in that comparison, which some members perhaps regretted, for in Saturday’s “Courier” the department advertised that an excursion train would be run this (Wednesday) evening, on the occasion of the Wynnum Band concert. It is to be hoped the public will recognise the efforts of the board in getting them a cheap run to the seaside during this oppressive weather. The band will play near No. 1 jetty. (*Location would be next to Wynnum Creek*)

It is somewhat surprising that an offer by a ratepayer of three guineas towards the erection of a bandstand in No. 2 (*Wynnum Central*) and to bear the expense of lighting the same with acetylene, was received so coolly. Was it subdivisional jealousy? It was pointed out by Mr Jeffery that the band members have invariably to wrestle with the elements at their seaside performances and if the residents are jealous of the favours shown to Sandgate when band concerts are given, their executive authority might take the initiative in securing some of the attractions that the older seaside resort has had for many years.

The Manly representatives have recognised that they must do something this dry weather to cope with the stream of visitors who are expected during the holidays. They are, therefore, at the cost of some £25 providing a water tank and trough near the residence of Mr Neighbour. It is expected that these will be available for the public convenience on Saturday. In previous years the public have been indebted to the kindness and courtesy of Mr Curtis, who gave free access to a large underground tank on his premises to which a pump was affixed.

A bazaar was opened in the Board Hall (*now replaced by Tingal Road Leisure Centre*) yesterday afternoon by the Hon. J R Dickson and promises to be a success. The proceeds are on behalf of St Peter’s funds.”

Provision of a source of water for visitors would have been an achievement in 1900, for, after arriving by train to Wynnum or Manly station, there was still a considerable walk to the foreshore.

Where would I have been in 1912?



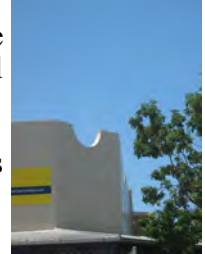
I would have been on Bay Terrace. The café is at the corner of Bay Terrace and Florence Street, opposite Birchley's General store.

Miss Peel sold fruit, tea and coffee and cocoa and hot water between 1908 and 1915.

Previously Miss Peel traded at the Wynnum Kiosk (Fox Street).

In the 1920's Kennedy's Warwick General Store was on the same corner. Now there is a travel agent on the site.

The roofline still has the distinctive shape, that was present in the 1920's

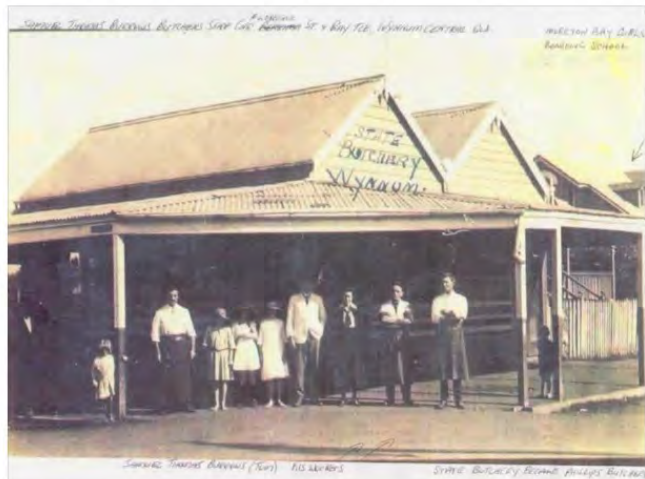
