

As a poetry lover, this was a special "find" for me!

November

Now beats the first warm pulse of summer now There shines great glory on the mountain's brow The face of heaven in the western sky, When falls the sun, is filled with Deity! And while the first light floods the lakes and lea, The morning makes a marvel of the sea; The strong leaves sing; and in the deep green zones Of rock-bound glens the streams have many tones; And where the evening-coloured waters pass, Now glides November down fair falls of grass. She is the wonder with the golden wings, Who lays one hand in Summer's...one in Spring's; About her hair a sunset radiance glows; Her mouth is sister of the dewy rose; And all the beauty of the pure blue skies Has lent its lustre to her soft bright eyes.

December

The month whose face is holiness! She brings With her the glory of majestic things What words of light, what high resplendent phrase Have I for all the lustre of her days? She comes, and carries in her shining sphere August traditions of the world's great year; The noble tale which lifts the human race Has made a morning of her sacred face. Now in the emerald home of flower and wing Clear summer streams their sweet hosannas sing: The winds are full of anthems, and a lute Speakes in the listening hills when night is mute And through dim tracks where talks the royal tree There floats a grand hymn from the mighty sea; And where the grey, grave, pondering mountains stand High music lives ... the place is holy land!

It should be noted that the poet, Henry Kendall (1839-1882) received only a slight education, but has the honour of being the first Australian-born poet to be published in the United Kingdom. He had a sad life which was blighted by alcoholism and poverty, yet, this did not destroy his creativity. If any member would like a full copy of *Austral Months*, I would be happy to supply same.

November was named by the ancient Romans. In the old Roman calendar November was the ninth month of the year and named from the Latin word "novem" for nine. The Anglo-Saxons called November "Windmonath" or "wind month", as they felt the chilly blast of the wind and watched the birds migrate to warmer parts. Similarly, December was the tenth month of the Roman calendar and named after the Latin word "decem" for ten.



The Wynnum Manly Yacht Club was formed by a small group in 1962. The first meeting was held in Bill Haslett's boatshed. Many social days were held. There were family days out in the boats and the men folk had their races.

In the 1970's leasehold land was acquired on the Esplanade, where an old canopy, known as "The Shed", covered buoys, markers and equipment for race days. A Club House was opened in 1981

The Marina was completed by 1989 Nd boats now had a safe anchorage.

RESURRECTION OF BALGUE'S SLIP

At 5.30am on Sunday 21 October 2012, two utes, with generator, about twelve Rotarians from Wynnum Manly led by President David, Esplanade dwellers Danny and Basil and myself ventured onto the rocky muddy foreshore to re-erect the collapsed half of the slip.



The Slip in use

Noel Balgue came to Wynnum in 1922. He bought a 22' sailing boat called "Lizzie" and applied to the then Town Council of Wynnum to build a boat slip at the foot of Havelock (now Penfold) Parade. The boat was floated into the slip at high tide, then, as the water receded, the barnacles could be scraped off bottom of the boat, ready for painting.

On Sunday 21 October 2012, Engineer Rotarian David Groves was in charge. The stainless steel brackets were donated by Sean Carroll of Capalaba. By 7.30 am the Slip was standing ready for the Pelicans to take up ownership again.

7.00 am – almost complete.

The other half of the slip has not yet fallen but is weakened by the continuing movement of the tides. The installation of stainless steel brackets would certainly prolong its life.

We are asking for donations towards the collection of \$800 to complete this task.

Mr. Poulton's father, James Henry Poulton, before him was a well-known South Brisbane butcher. Mr. Poulton has conducted several butchering concerns throughout the State, and prior to his taking up business here was established at Toowoomba.

DART'S BUILDINGS

This site was originally an auctioneer's Sale-room, (sale market) owned and operated by a gentleman named Power L Dickson. Auction Sales of furniture and livestock, (anything and everything) were held there every Saturday morning. The auctioneer's shop fronted Bay Terrace and a small section of Edith Street, about 75% of the land was an open area where the auction sales were held. I well remember as a child going there-early 1920's. Going! Going Gone!

When we lived at the Shire Clerk's Cottage, we ran a small farm and one of my jobs was as a youngster was to look after the poultry. And I hated it! We had about twenty hens and I was more than happily when they grew too old to be useful and my mother said, "Jac1k! I've had enough of this. Yes! You can take them up to the auction room and keep whatever you get." So I packed them up in my little push cart and wheeled them up to this site. They were so old that one died on the way! But they fetched £12.

At that time my brother, George, worked in the hardware section of Irvine's Emporium at Bay Terrace; George was a trained dealer in hardware, having been trained as an apprentice by the Perry Brothers in Brisbane for some years

But, he was anxious to spread his wings and he persuaded his father to set up his own business in Wynnum. This was done by purchasing a plumber's shop in Bay Terrace made vacant by a plumber called Hazel. This functioned satisfactorily and he built up quite a good business. He was a good salesman

But, and there came a change of direction! He was courting of the daughter of William Logan Dart, the local councillor alderman, who sought to see his daughter and future son-in-law in more prestigious premises. And seeing my father was to be his daughter's father-in-law, he conspired with him to join him in acquiring better premises

It transpired that at this time, the auction market folded up and this prime site came up for sale. With George Sands and Sylvia Dart were making arrangements for marriage the two parents put their hands in their pockets and brought the site (two blocks) at auction. My father gave Bill Dart the option of which allotment he wanted and he chose the corner allotment leaving our dad with the adjacent block (currently occupied by Pete's a second-hand furniture store.)

George Sands and Sylvia Dart subsequently married and their brand new shop was set up for them as a hardware store called for "Wynnum Hardware Supplies". And they successfully sold hardware, cooking utensils, crockery, furniture and the sporting goods and even a motor vehicles

But the War of 1939-45 dealt big blow to hardware and the business suffered. Then three young men returned from army service looking for a place to set up clothing store and so they did a deal with my brother George by renting of the corner and converting it into a drapery store, which functioned under the name of D.B.S. – (Davies, Bingham, Sands). Later, as business expanded, they took over the whole corner as business expanded George Sands being a "sleeping partner".

The very successful clothing store opened by Frank and John Davies flourished and the story of Dart's building from thereon could better be told by either John or Frank, the both of whom are still living in this district



MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING 18 October 2012

(held in the Ambulance Museum Auditorium, Corner Cedar Street and Tingal Road)

Prior to 7.30pm photos were shown of the 150th celebrations at Lota House, the collation of which was done by Noela Stratton.

The meeting **opened** at 7.30pm. 34 members were present and 20 apologies were received. Two visitors were present, Jodi Warbrick, in connection with Mt Carmel Convent and Anita Greenhill, who flew in that day from Manchester, England for a short holiday with her family.
