One of the pleasing events that did occur in this hostile and unpleasant environment was that an Australian nurse, Grace Wilson, who served at Lemnos, Egypt, Britain and Abbeville in France was awarded the Royal Red Cross medal [first class] for her distinguished service in the field. As well as that, she was mentioned in dispatches on four occasions for her outstanding service. She must have been a strong and remarkable woman.

Nazareth House



The school was opened on 12 September 1966 with 54 pupils. Farm land was first purchased in 1964 – 10 acres from Mr Quick followed by land from Mr Bradford, Mr Blimco and Mr Coroneas. Jennifer Schoch was the first student enrolled. The adjoining property was named the "Spring Gardens", of Hargreaves fame, so in the early days many drainage problems were encountered in developing the sport fields. Two ladies approached us last week for information in preparation for a large 50<sup>th</sup> commemorative fete later this year.

# The MYLNES of LOTA

Graham Douglas Mylne was born near Dundee, Scotland in 1834. His elder brothers James, John and Thomas were among the very first Europeans to take up land for grazing in the Clarence Valley near Grafton. Graham and his younger brothers all had military careers. Graham sold his commission as a Lieutenant in the British Army at the age of 27. He was wounded and had sunstroke and joined his family in Australia.

In 1861 Graham married Helene Duckett White, daughter of William Duckett White, who built Lota House The Mylnes lived at Amby Downs, near Roma.

Graham died at the age of 47 years.

This 326 page book was kindly donated to the Society by its editor Thomas A Mylne. Though it contains memoirs and biographical sketches of Mylnes world-wide, there is plenty to be found concerning the local scene.

# A School for Wynnum?

#### Part 3

In the last two newsletters I have traced the early days of the school from 1896 up to the 1940's, when application was made for a new brick building. Les Greenhill 's first employment was on the site of this new building.

# CONSTRUCTION AT WYNNUM CENTRAL STATE SCHOOL (1946-48)

Paper delivered by Les Greenhill on 20<sup>th</sup> April and 15<sup>th</sup> June 1995 at the Monthly Meetings of the Wynnum Manly and District Historical Society

#### INTRODUCTION

First, I wish to emphasise that this presentation is based mainly on my personal experience and in compiling my notes I must also emphasise that I have endeavoured to avoid the possibility of offending the memories of some of those fine citizens and workers who toiled on the large block of the Wynnum Central State School. If I have offended those memories, any offence is totally unintended. Tonight, I hope to achieve two goals.

First, I am particularly interested in presenting the personality characteristics and the lifestyle of the workmen, who toiled on the project. Women rarely worked in the building industry in those days.

Second, since we often hear statements about the worth of Australian workers, or should I say the lack of worth of our workers. I hope to add to the understanding and appreciation of the backbreaking toil some of our workers endure, often for low wages, to the benefit of our society.

**Danny Lind** - the father of Lind Bros, who were local carpenters and later became hardware merchants; first on the corner of Florence St. and Bay Terrace, later at Singer Street - once told me that Australian workers were considered the best in the world.

To achieve my goals in this short outline, I will present a brief description of the culture of the building industry. Then I will give a few impressions about a few workers.

#### **BEGINNING**

On the twenty-seventh of February 1947, along with Bobby, my twin brother, I presented myself to Bill Holmes the general foreman on the first phase of the building. We were to commence employment in the Department of Public Works as apprentice carpenters. I remember, in my hand, I carried, wrapped in a work apron, my first work tools - a claw hammer, a folding three-foot rule and a carpenter's pencil.

I began work when a tradesman's pay was approximately £5.00 which was \$10.00 per week. A first-year apprentice received a weekly wage of eighteen and sixpence - \$1.85. By the end of the first year that wage had risen to thirty-six shillings - \$3.60. This sharp rise was the result of post-war economic inflation and special increases in apprenticeship wages. When I began work, the building had reached the first floor.

I since found out the foundations of this first phase had presented serious problems. The subsoil was mainly red ironstone gravel and the water table was close to the surface. Some of the workers said the water came from underground springs. It seemed that the walls of the trenches simply slid into the centre no matter what precautions were taken to solve the problem. I understand the pumps worked nonstop to keep the trenches dry.

When I worked on the second phase of the building, all of the trenches were timbered to prevent any cave-ins. In these situations, workmen were paid wet pay and depth money for working in wet unpleasant conditions. At one stage on the second phase I saw the trench walls collapse seconds after a labourer came to the surface. I remember the deepest point of the trenches was six to seven metres. Holes were then sunk another three metres below this depth to reach sound bedrock.

Another point that must be emphasised is that the total construction was completed with a minimum of mechanical equipment. The trenches were shovelled by hand. Each morning the labourers would line up at the door of the tool shed for their issue of tools generally a pick or mattock and a long handled shovel. The men would shovel the spoil upwards through a series of levels or benches, which meant the deepest spoil could be tossed upwards through three or four levels. Some soil was raised using a common windlass and bucket. Hard rock was cut away with a jack hammer driven by a huge compressor. Some of the men had amazing stamina. Day in, day out, they would shovel the eight-hour day in four two-hour stints.

When the architects and engineers gave the OK, reinforcing steel was placed in the trenches and the concrete footings were poured.

Today, steel reinforcing is manufactured by a specialist organisation and delivered on the site, ready-made. In those times, carpenters made and fixed in place all concrete formwork and reinforcing steel. It was dirty, backbreaking, unpleasant work, which the workmen avoided like the plague.

First all steel had to be cut by using a large cutting shears, which never seemed strong enough to cut the mild steel rods cleanly. Often we would have to slide a long pipe over the steel handle to gain greater leverage to cut the larger sections. All hooks and bends were fashioned by hand using a piece of pipe to bend the steel around a series of short steel pins set into a hardwood plank. The steel was finally twitched together with light gauge wire (annealed in a fire) using a 'twitcher'. Today, most reinforcing steel is welded or twitched by using a special pliers that twist on a spiral shaft. When the reinforcing was fabricated, it was fixed in the boxing or trenches so that it would not move or distort. To prevent spalling (outside peeling of concrete through rust), in all circumstances the reinforcing was never less than one inch (25mm) from the surface.

#### THE CHARACTERS

It is important to accept that each building site has a particular character - a sort of social mood. The range of topics discussed was endless and the subjects didn't necessarily centre around, women, booze and race horses. One of the burning topics was how the last hand of 'Five Hundred' (euchre) was won and lost. The men played for a lottery ticket each week and many heated arguments emerged out of these games.

**Bill Holmes**, the site foreman, was a carpenter by trade whom I believe progressed to being a permanent foreman in the Works Department.

I recall he was a tall, rawboned man, ruggedly handsome, with a shock of gray hair. He gave the impression he was gruff, no-nonsense person, but in reality, he was a warm compassionate man. Like most of the workers he always wore 'bib and brace' overalls, khaki shirt and Wellington army boots.

Only once did he reprimand me. I was on an errand and a couple of workers stopped me to talk. Immediately Bill appeared around the corner, they began to haul on a rope through a jenny wheel to pull timber up to the higher level. Since I wasn't supposed to be there, I turned to walk away. Bill reprimanded me for walking away when there was work to be done. Man-management was mostly bluff in those days.

Bill Holmes retired before the job was finished. At a simple gathering of the workmen, he was given a small gift (it certainly wasn't a gold watch). He told the apprentices to be 'good boys'. When it was over, he calmly walked out the gate. I never saw or heard of him after he passed through that gate.

During the first few days of our employment, my brother and I were given the task of dismantling and cleaning a huge pile of used concrete formwork. All formwork was made out of what would be now classed as first quality timber. The best of the cleaned boards was to be recycled. We cleaned up the pile in two days.

Before we arrived, an old builder's labourer, whom I only knew as **Old Brownie**, had the responsibility to clean the boxing.

Old Brownie was a wizened old man - a character out of our pioneering days - who trudged around the site performing a variety of tasks. I suspect Bill Holmes had a soft spot for Old Brownie, who's main responsibility was that of billy-boy. He was probably the oldest billy-boy I've seen in the system. Generally apprentices were made billy-boys.

Workers were entitled to hot water for the morning 'smoko' and lunch and a degree of ritual accompanied the making of billy tea for the workers. Each morning before marching out onto the site, the workers would clean their billy (mostly by throwing the dregs out the window or door) and place a cupped hand full of tea leaves into the billy add the required sugar and place the billy on the table in the change shed. You can possibly imagine the types of containers that passed for billy-cans.

Old Brownie would collect the billies and feed their handles through a long stick which had a nail part-driven into one end to stop the handles slipping off. He would carry the cans to a large open fire, rest them on the ground and carefully ladle boiling water into them. The filled cans would be returned to the shed and set out on the table for the workers prior to their break.

I remember that he suffered bronchitis – 'Brownchitus' he called it and I'll never forget the image of him swinging a seven-pound hammer to strike a huge gad being held by ...... who was a 6-foot 11/2 inch pentathlon champion. This man went on to be elected as a member of the state legislature.

**Stan Mullins** was a chunky-built apprentice. He went on to be a foreman in the Public Works Department. Unfortunately, Stan was killed in a shark attack at the Darcy Light, off Wynnum at the Boat Passage. His remains were recovered and the shark caught.

Graham Duval and Bill Haslett were apprentice carpenters. Both were local building contractors.

**Percy Sheppard** was secretary of the Local Labour Party. He eventually contested the council seat against long-standing Alderman George Clayton. He stood as a Democratic Labour candidate.

**Danny Lind** was an aged carpenter who seemed to be a thousand years old and he would have been if he had performed the tasks he said he had. He would never reveal his age because he was worried he would be retired.

**Jack Houghton** and **Neil Canneen** were employed as Civil Reconstruction Trainees. I understand Neil had been an artillery captain in the army and Jack sunk and captured while serving on the navy ship, 'Perth'. As a POW he suffered being torpedoed a second time by an American submarine while being transferred to Japan.

**Jack McGraw** was one of the apprentice plasterers. He suffered a badly broken leg in a motor accident and became a local taxi driver.

**Ern Snow** was an elder in the now Uniting Church. He was honoured as a long serving secretary of the Carpenters Union. He was one of the most physically strong men, I have ever known.

Many of the local fishermen were builder's labourers on both the high and primary school projects. **Billy Stone** and **Jack Prickett** were two to come to mind. **Jim Blinkley** considered himself a leading-hand labourer. He was the most experienced worker in the group. He often acted as the scaffolder.

**Jack Thurlow** is the only bricklayer, I remember. A sometime fisherman, he is a member of a family with a tradition of being stone masons and bricklayers.
