# TERRIFIC EXPLOSION SENSATION AT WYNNUM MAGAZINE BLOWN UP

#### **Miraculous Escapes**

Wynnum residents were quietly having their breakfast yesterday morning when a tremendous explosion shook every house, shattering windows, bringing down lamps and vases with noisy clatter, and sending the people into the streets in affright. A local explosives magazine, berthed near No. 1 jetty, had blown up with appalling force, the whole district being shaken, and the roar being plainly heard over Brisbane, where in places houses quivered faintly, and crockery on the shelves rattled slightly. The debris of a 50-foot launch, which constituted the magazine, was hurled in massive pieces of wood and iron all over Wynnum, and the sea was strewn with wreckage. One huge portion of the iron bilge of the boat, weighing half a ton, hurtled through the air for a hundred yards, and struck a pile of the jetty, shearing it clear in two. A second big wedge of angle iron struck the decking of the pier and tore up a plank, and passed on. Another piece was thrown over the pier landed 200 vards Marvellous to relate no one was hurt.

For some time past dredging operations by the Harbour and Rivers Department have been carried out at the mouth of the creek which discharges beside the pier and blasting has been necessary. A barge, from which the men operated, lay in the creek half way down the pier, and about fifty yards from the barge, on a mud bank, lay the magazine, a discarded anchor launch. it being abreast the end of the pier, and about six chains away. At 8 o'clock yesterday morning work was commenced. Michael Woods, a young man, the son of the ex-member of Parliament of that name, was in charge of the magazine. It is said to have contained 200lb. of gelatine stored in four or five cases, besides numerous detonators.

The launch was 50ft. long, and the detonators were stored at one end, and 35ft. away was the gelatine. It was Woods's duty to prepare the charges and carry them over to his workmates on the barge - James "Riley, John Gregg, and James Lawrence. According to his own story Woods started to prepare the first charge. Obtaining a piece of gelatine he removed the outer wrapper and proceeded to attach the detonator. It was necessary to light a spirit lamp in order to fuse the insulation. He struck a match, and the head flew off, and alighted on the exposed gelatine which lay some distance away. The explosive started to burn, and Woods attempted to stamp it out with his bare feet. It burned fiercely, however, and Woods, finding he could not extinguish the burning material, realised the tremendous peril of his situation, and leaping over the side of the launch, raced for dear life along the mud bank to warn the other workmen of their imminent All four hastily took shelter under the nose of the barge, facing the shore, and awaiting the explosion. First came the sharp report of the detonator Then a great sheet of flame, exploding. a huge puff of smoke, a terrible roar, and the air was black with flying de-The men came through the bris. ordeal unscathed, and not a single fragment appeared to strike the barge. More exposed than the workmen were two residents seated out at the end They were Mr. T.C. Porl and "Alick", a veteran Italian fisherman. After the detonator exploded, Mr. Porl threw himself down full length on the pier, and called upon his companion to do likewise. Then a terrific concussion shook the air, and the pier moved under them, for, as previously mentioned, it was struck by a piece of the iron bilge, measuring some 10ft. in length and a great mass of angle iron, which crashed into the jetty. Besides the damage done to the pier, the force of the concussion was so great as to hurl large pieces of iron from the destroyed vessel a distance of more than half a mile One piece, weighing half into Wynnum. landed near the Methodist a pound, Church, and a mass weighing 14lb. dropped down at Bay View, one of the houses on the sea front, and to the left of the pier.

As demonstrating the force of the explosion, it may be mentioned that the new police station, a strong structure, about three-quarters of a mile away, was severely shaken.

The concussion shook the whole of Wynnum, some residences on the sea front and others higher up on the hill suffering severely. As already stated, windows were broken, ornaments came tumbling down from mantelpieces and other resting places, pictures fell off the wall, crockery and glasses were broken, and, curiously enough, pianos in some cases were thrown out of tune, and in a couple of instances the strings of violins were broken as they lay in their cases.

The force of the explosion was felt considerably at the residence of Dr. Barker, which lies on the sea front, opposite the scene of the accident. Dr. Barker was sitting on the veranda at the time, and stated that his legs were considerably jarred by the concussion. Some of the windows in the house were smashed, and a number of movable articles were thrown to the floor. At the time of the occurrence Mr. A. Machin, a baker, was delivering bread there, and the horse was with difficulty prevented from bolting. It was fortunate that the animal was stopped, as Mr. Machin's little son was alone in the vehicle. The nerves of many residents were considerably shaken, and, naturally, the ladies suffered worst.

The new sea wall, which has been constructed for a distance of 40 yards, distant about 200 yards from the magazine, felt the force of the explosion, and was thrown quite a foot out of plumb.

Acting Sergeant Reardon and Constable Hall rendered useful work in not permitting persons to venture near the wrecked launch, there being latent danger owing to a number of live detonators having been thrown out on the sand around. Such of these as could be found were picked up as quickly as possible by the dredge hands.

The Deputy Engineer for Habours and Rivers (Mr. Eliott) was early apprised of the occurrence, and accompanied by an assistant proceeded by train to Wynnum to inspect the scene of the accident. He was met by Woods, who explained to him all he knew of the occurrence. After making a careful inspection of the site Mr. Eliott returned to town. It appears probable that a spit of sand to the left of the pier and further away from the township will be used as the site of the next magazine.

The tremendous upheaval formed the sole topic of conversation at Wynnum throughout the day, and hundreds of curious persons visited the scene of the disaster, a small portion of the hull of the vessel, which had apparently been driven into the mud by the force of the explosion, and debris strewn all round on the water being the only remnants of the wrecked magazine.

Many persons who examined the jetty commented on its evident weak state before the explosion occurred, and remarked that the proposal to add 400 yards to such a structure was a very doubtful proceeding.

## Francis (Frank) Joseph Gillies WATSON Ph.C., MPS. Local Chemist, Bay Terrace, Wynnum. c. 1940 – 1975

Frank was born on 28 January 1915, son of Joseph Charles Gillies WATSON and Mary Gertrude Paula nee KELLEHER. His brother Joseph Kelleher WATSON was born on 16 February 1919. Parents, Joseph and Mary WATSON were buried in Toowong Cemetery on 7 May 1950 and 13 December 1947 respectively.

Frank's grandparents were John WATSON and Elizabeth Mary Frances, nee GILLIES, hence the choice of Gillies in Frank's and his father's name.

Frank married Mary O'SULLIVAN on 3 June 1939.

Two sisters, G(M) and HE TAYLOR conducted their pharmacy on the railway side of Bay Terrace between Edith and Clara Streets, maybe from the mid-1920's. Their father ran a pharmacy in Cambridge Parade, Manly. The sisters sold out to Frank in the early1940's. At that time Frank and Mary were living at "Hilacris" Esplanade Wynnum and Frank's occupation was that of pharmacist. They moved to reside at 132 Akonna Street in 1941 and are recorded as living there until 1975. The house has now been demolished to make way for a Unit building. Marianne WATSON (daughter?) lived with them in Akonna Street from 1963 – 1967. She is recorded as a stenographer.

In the early 1950's Henry HASE built a row of brick shops in front of his residence on the seaward side of Bay Terrace, between Edith and Clara Streets and Frank moved across the road into one of these new shops on 1 December1954. His advertisements prominently displayed photographic equipment.

In 1957 the "Master Pharmacists of the Wynnum Manly District" combined to open a Night Chemist in Room 6 (now the Information Centre) in the newly opened Civic Centre. The Centre of 11 shops and offices had been developed by the Brisbane City Council, primarily to house a City Council receiving office. (The Library was not built on the former site of Ingleston, which burnt down in 1947, until 1972.)

The Master pharmacists were P M Benjamin, Mrs E A Boden, J F Cameron, D W Curtis, R Dunn, M Jones, E Masters, S M Shenton and F J Watson. The Night Chemist opened from 7pm to 11 pm every evening and from 10am to noon on Sunday. Frank died around 1975 and Mary is record as residing at 5/52 Berrima Street from 1977 to 1989. (My mother Mrs M Potter purchased the same unit in 1993).

Frank was not a robust man. He always wore his white coat when dispensing and is remembered for his pencil moustache. He was well liked and respected in the community and had the reputation of being a fine pianist.

Frank was involved with the Golf Club, winning the Moreton Bay Cup in 1940 (partnered with Henry HASE) and also in 1941, 1945 and 1948 (partnered with Harry ORR). He was, at one time, the longest serving Captain and in1976 the *Frank Watson Memorial*, a single stroke event, was introduced into the Club.

In 1950 Frank was Chair of the Entertainment Committee of Wynnum Bowls Club, in 1956 the President of Manly Swimming Club and Secretary of Wynnum Manly Rotary Club. He became was President of Rotary Club of Wynnum Manly at the handover on 29 June 1960. In that year he donated a First Aid kit to the Pony Club.
