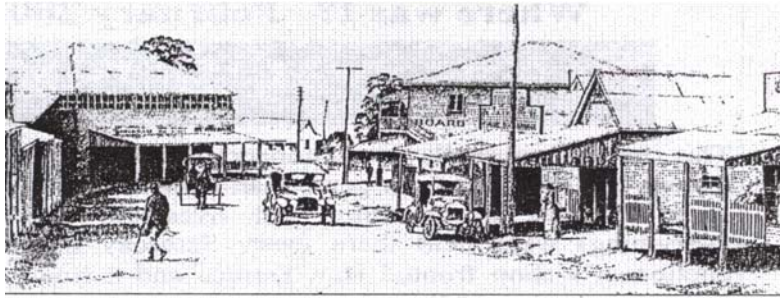

OUR PIONEERS – Clifford Walden HEERS

The Society has a continuing Project to collect information on persons residing in Wynnum, Manly Lota and District before 1912. In 1912 Wynnum became a town in its own right and there were only a few hundred people residing here at that time. This month we feature Clifford Walden HEERS.



Clifford was born in Ipswich on 6 May 1904, eldest son of George Henry Ewald and Mary Dunbar (nee AULD) HEERS. Clifford was the fourth of eight children, six girls and two boys. George Henry was a grocer when he married in 1896, but became a Dairy Inspector, Butter Grader and finally Director of Dairying.

The family moved to Manly when Clifford was three years old. He attended Manly State School and was a first day pupil when the school opened in 1910. Clifford was a quiet achiever and during his schooling was voted most popular boy and won a prize for best kept garden. He later attended Wynnum High School when it was attached to Wynnum Central School.

At the age of sixteen his father apprenticed him to a nurseryman friend at Birkdale, a keen rose grower, with instructions to work him hard. On his first home visit Cliff produced a handful of newspaper clippings advertising "Nurseries for Sale". As a result, Cliff, with the family's help, purchased a piece of land and the family moved from Melville Terrace to 212 Wondall Road in May 1919.

Cliff then began his career as a very successful nurseryman. He specialised in roses and the "Pacific Nurseries" on Wondall Road became well known throughout Australia.

Cliff was interested in sailing, commencing with model yachts when he was ten years old advancing to bigger and better boats and winning trophies along the way. He swam and played football and even won first prize in a singing contest standing on a box on the corner of Cambridge Parade.

Clifford married Violet Muriel NICKOLS, a near neighbour, on 15 May 1937 at St John's Presbyterian Church, Thompson Estate, Brisbane. They had three daughters, Wendy, Cynthia and Jeanette. Sadly Wendy died at the age of thirteen years and his wife died three years later in 1955.

On his retirement from the nursery, Cliff became owner/manager of the Service Station on the roundabout at the Corner House Wynnum. He enjoyed good health and led an active life and died in Wynnum Hospital in 1992.



SPOTLIGHT ON ... Life member, JOHN DAVIES



Although born in Townsville, I went to school and grew up at Windsor on Brisbane's North Side.

In the late 1940's, I worked with my brother and his partner at their recently established drapery business, "Davies and Bingham", in Wynnum. Then in the 1950's, I became a commercial traveller, a most interesting and educational occupation which gave me the opportunity to see a great deal of Queensland.

In the late 1950's, my wife Shirley and I married and, being away for weeks at a time did not sit well with new married life, so that put an end to commercial travelling.

Fortunately the opportunity occurred to establish the footwear retailing business, "Strand Shoes" in Wynnum Central. My wife and I continued with this business for around thirty years.

I have enjoyed participating in community life here in this great bayside locality. The organisations in which I have played a part as either President or committee member are the Rotary Club of Wynnum and Manly, the Wynnum Chamber of Commerce, the Spring Parade Association, the General Gordon Memorial Kindergarten and the Wynnum Historical Society, of which I had the honour of being appointed Life Member in 1997.

I have great pride in the Historical Society and the influence it has had in raising the interest and awareness of Wynnum and Manly folk in our local heritage and the events that have made our special place on Moreton Bay such a great place to live.

THE GIRL IN THE PINK DRESS *by Don Lyell*

It took sixty four years for me to finally meet the girl in the pink dress! The year was 1945. I was six years old at that time playing in the middle of Oceana Terrace Manly (what's new here!) near the corner of Falcon Street, formerly Spring Street (the name was changed by the council because there were too many streets of that name in Brisbane).

I was watching this beautiful young girl walking towards me from the Valetta Street end of Oceana Terrace, she would have been around twelve years old walking with her young six year old brother towards "The Great Wall".

She just walked past me as though I didn't even exist. Who was this young girl? Where did she live? I have never seen her around here before. I just stood there mesmerised looking at this girl walking along the top of the wall with her little brother walking behind her on the road in Wellington Street. Falcon Street is at the bottom of the wall which runs from the Esplanade at the bottom to Oceana Terrace at the top as shown in the picture.

The girl in the pink dress sure captured my full attention; she was slim, beautiful and who the hell was she? I still recall this vividly, although hazy on some other details. Hey, I was only six years old!

Still watching this pretty girl in this pink dress what was about happen stayed with me for the next sixty four years of my life. She seemed to hesitate or maybe even look back probably at her brother and then just suddenly fell off the wall half way along Falcon Street.

I panicked and ran home as fast as I could which was only one house away, I was yelling out to mum that a young girl had just fallen off the wall. A cause for concern was at bottom of the wall is a garden bed with a rough rock edging around it and it is still there today. The picture above was taken from Falcon Street looking towards Oceana Terrace where I was and it shows the rough garden edging.

Mum called an ambulance and I still remember seeing the ambulance arrive there in Falcon Street. I remember very little after that. Dad was in the Progress Association at the time and he pushed for a fence to be built around the wall and this happened shortly after. The thing is that I must have run around the top of that wall many thousands of times before this accident.

I have sure had my share of falls like from the top of a thirty foot tree in our back yard and I have fallen off the wall near the bathing boxes just to the Lota side of Falcon Street where the wall then was probably about twelve foot high. So I do know what it's like to have a fall or two. But nothing to compare with what this young girl in that pink dress must have endured on that day. The wall at it's highest is I believe some twenty four feet.

The year 1945 was a bad year for both Barbara and I (another coincidence) I also was in hospital with diphtheria for six weeks and not expected to live.

I have never been able to erase the images of that day from my mind and I have always wondered what ever happened to this girl in the pink dress. Did she survive the fall or did she die? Parents never told us much in those days, but I never stopped asking and wondering what happened to this girl in the pink dress.

I have asked many local people over the years who I thought might have known something but I always drew a blank. I also enquired at the ambulance, police and the 'Historical Society' but all to no avail. It was as though I was the only one that saw her fall that day and I was!

In October 2008 sixty four years later I called into the 'Historical Society' at the Civic Centre in Wynnum just to pick up a Newsletter. I ended up talking to the girls there for a while and something inside compelled me to ask again about this girl in the pink dress falling off the "Great Wall of Manly" when I was six. It was meant to be!

Jill Greenhill put that request in the October issue of their Newsletter also mentioning my Dad's part in getting a fence erected around the wall because of this accident.

I can't believe what happened next after sixty four years of not knowing what happened to the girl in the pink dress that snubbed me all those years ago. Vera Melen a friend of this girl saw the article in the 'Historical Society Newsletter' and contacted her and as they say the rest is history!

I made contact with this girl in the pink dress at 3.30pm on Sunday November 9 2008. Her name is Barbara Waters (nee Lauchlan) who lived at Stratton Terrace Manly all but for a few short years of her early life.

Finally I meet Barbara in person the next day at her home in Wynnum, after sixty four years of not knowing anything about her except this re-occurring vision of her falling off the wall that day. Barbara has never been out of my mind or thoughts all those years and my persistence has finally paid off.

There were many emotions mixed with a few hugs and reminiscing. Barbara is now in a wheelchair and is very bright and cheerful in her-self with the most beautiful smile. Barbara said that she was in and out of hospital for four years with both arms and legs broken with many other serious injuries.

One doctor wanted to take one of her legs off from the hip but luckily for Barbara another doctor took a special interest in her and said that he thought he may be able save her leg and he did!

Barbara is still living in Wynnum with her husband Reg. Barbara didn't keep that illusive pink dress that captured my imagination all those years ago. It's been hard for me to put this story into words probably partly because I was expecting to see Barbara as she was a spritely young girl in that beautiful pink dress.

Anything in life is possible if we want it bad enough, we see in people what we want to see and that depends on what we are really looking for. It's what's inside a person that matters and if you haven't found that special quality that you're looking for then you haven't looked far enough!

I said to Barbara I never ever forgot you and yet you didn't even speak or acknowledge me as you walked straight past me that day as though I wasn't there.

Barbara said Don, "Your prompt actions on that day most probably saved my life! We were always told not to talk to any strangers."

At least I have some closure now on the vision of that incident that was deeply etched in my mind for sixty four years. I didn't expect to get that closure for another sixty four years the way it was panning out!

Looking at Barbara now in her wheelchair I can still only see the girl I saw on that day all those years ago. I can't see any disability whatsoever in Barbara with her bubbly personality and beautiful warm smile she hasn't aged a day in my eyes. Barbara you are special, you are unique, you can do anything.

God loves you, not because of what you do or who you are, but because of who He is.
