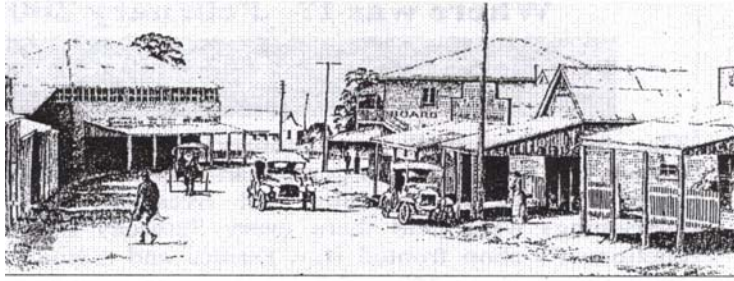

FROM THE PRESIDENT



We are already half way through the year. What a busy year it has been so far. The Municipal Hall concert, "Echoes from the Past" was a great success. I enjoyed telling the story of Wynnum through the eyes of "Artie" the School of Arts. The show was enjoyable because it brought together so many community groups that have been associated with the Hall - the Wynnum Choral Society, Mercury and Savoyards Theatres as well as other groups. As hosts of the concert, the Wynnum Manly Historical Society provided afternoon tea and looked after ticket sales and setting up the Hall. Our members worked very hard to ensure that the show was a success. I would like to thank everyone who was involved for their help.

The bus trip to Stradbroke Island turned out to be a very good day. The weather cleared and we had a fine day. The trip over on the barge was very calm. First, we visited the Aboriginal Elders Centre at Dunwich. The Centre documents the aboriginal history of the Island and the families who have played a prominent part in preserving their heritage.

Our next stop was the Dunwich Museum. It was interesting to learn about the history of Dunwich which dates back to the early convict days. The museum documents the story of the Benevolent Institution which was the home to many elderly people including some who had played a prominent role in Queensland's history. After an enjoyable lunch at the Point Lookout Bowls Club, we drove to Point Lookout and took in the wonderful view from the headlands. Then it was back to Dunwich for afternoon tea and a look round the Dunwich cemetery. The cemetery holds the graves of many aboriginal families and early settlers including that of Dr. Ballow, the Brisbane surgeon who died while administering to victims of a typhoid outbreak on an emigrant ship. Our next trip is to Redcliffe in November which promises to be an interesting one.

In the local area, the Wynnum Plan has been approved by State Government. This will see the construction of high rise buildings in Bay Terrace and west of the Wynnum Central Railway Station. BMD, the development company has announced plans for a new office block and residential apartments on the site of the old Baptist Church. The application has to be approved by the City Council. I will let you know of any further developments as I become aware of them.

The Wynnum Manly Historical Society will work hard to see that heritage buildings in the area are protected however, it is ultimately the responsibility of Local and State government, to ensure that our heritage is protected. At our next meeting I will talk about what Tasmania has done to protect and promote their historical sites. There are some lessons to be learned.

I look forward to seeing you all our next meeting.

COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUES – Wynnum State High School

Over the years, the Society has been responsible for the placement of many plaques in the district depicting historic happenings. The Commonwealth Government requested community involvement for the 50th Anniversary of the ending of World War II calling it *Australia remembers - 1945-1995 – Their Service our Heritage*.

After World War II, an avenue of pine and palm trees were planted which went through Russell Park (renamed Memorial Park). There were Memorial gates at either entrance and names of fallen soldiers were placed beneath each tree. With the building of the High School, the Avenue seemed to be cut and not used as a thoroughfare. It had been a wish for many years of my late husband, Merv, to see Memorial Avenue reborn and rededicated so this seemed a perfect time for this to happen. This activity was made possible in 1998 by donations and gifts from the Returned & Services League of Australia (Wynnum Sub Branch), the Wynnum RSL Services Memorial Club, the State and Commonwealth Governments, and the Rotary Club of Wynnum and Manly. The community of the High School, supported by its students, Deputy Principal, Gary Hunt, Manual Arts subject master, Geoff Arnott, contributed positively to the project.

The names of those servicemen from this district who gave the supreme price were checked with records in Canberra and were then ready to be listed on an oblique placed at the Peel Street entrance to the School. Those servicemen fallen from The Boer to Vietnam Wars were listed on the oblique not only World War II fallen.

The Principal of Wynnum State High School informed us this week that the three plaques from the oblique at the entrance to the school were found to be removed by persons unknown. This is the first time any damage has happened to any of the plaques placed by the Society. Communication will take place with those involved as to the replacement of the stolen plaques.

OUR PIONEERS – Joseph SANDS 1879-1952

The Society has a continuing Project to collect information on persons residing in Wynnum, Manly Lota and District before 1912. In 1912 Wynnum became a town in its own right and there were only a few hundred people residing here at that time. This month we feature Clifford Walden HEERS.



Joe Sands was born in Brisbane on 22 June 1879.

His father, John Sands, who arrived in this country from England in 1849 as a ten month old infant in the emigrant sailing ship "Chaseley". He lived with his grandparents in Fortitude Valley and raised a family of three sons and one daughter. Joe Sands was his second son.

Joe's primary school education was received at the Fortitude Valley State School and having gained a certificate in the Sydney Junior Examination (which he passed in seven subjects) he was awarded a scholarship to the Brisbane Grammar School. He attended Brisbane Grammar for two years (1893 to 1895) and the Headmaster's entry against his record in the school archives is, that he was "Hard working and intelligent."

From 1896 to 1906 he worked in a clerical position, first with the Brisbane Permanent Building and Banking Society (now the Bank of Queensland) and later with the Brisbane City Council. He studied independently to qualify - first as a Shire Clerk and then obtained his membership with the Institution of Municipal and County Engineers (England).

In 1907 he applied for the position of Shire Clerk and Engineer with the Shire of Wynnum which was then a small but growing area with a bright future. So he resigned his position with the Brisbane City Council to take up the position of Shire Clerk and Engineer at Wynnum.

Joe Sands lived in the Shire Clerk's Cottage from 1907 to 1935 carrying out the dual position of Shire Clerk and Shire Engineer, then later as Town Clerk and Town Engineer, and still later as Wynnum District Engineer when the Greater Brisbane City Council absorbed the municipality in 1925.

It is on record that in 1917 the elected Councillors reached an impasse which could not be resolved and the administration of the town was in crisis. It was then that the full Court of Queensland dismissed the mayor and all the Councillors and appointed Joe Sands Sole administrator of the Town for a period of three months until a new election could be undertaken.

It is remarkable that one man should be able to fill the dual position of Local Government Engineer and Shire/Town Clerk for a period of 43 years and, as a result of this service, one can see his guiding hand in the development of Wynnum from a village to a thriving suburb.

Not only did he serve as Town Clerk and Engineer, he served on various committees setting up the Local Fire Brigade, Ambulance, Bowling Club, Golf Club, Agricultural, Horticultural and Industrial Society and was involved in many other community projects.

No other single person has had such an influence on the growth of the district and many of the roads, drains, bridges, parklands and water-front improvements bear the stamp of his foresight. Joe Sands retired from the Council's service in 1950. He died on 20th October 1952 and was interred in the Hemmant Lawn Cemetery where his grave is marked only by a modest stone slab.

His professionalism and dedication to the Wynnum District was outstanding.

SPOTLIGHT ON ... Committee Member KERRY GREENSILL



On 9 January 1941 twin sons (Kevin and Kerry) were born to Johanna and Douglas Greensill in the Wondai Hospital. Several days later, Johanna Greensill died and Kevin and Kerry were given to Johanne's sister, Catherine Conway, to be raised with her four children.

Peter and Catherine Conway were a Christian couple who treated all the children under their care in the same loving way. The only failing that Peter Conway had is that, in his lifetime, he never drank alcohol and he passed that trait onto me and I rarely touch alcohol.

Kevin and Kerry both went to primary school at St Pius School, Banyo, and then to St Patrick's School, Shorncliffe, for secondary education. We both joined the State public service in 1958 – Kevin in the Native Affairs Department and yours truly (Kerry) in the Department of Transport.

I married on 8 May 1965 to Patricia Baker from Morningside and in 1966, we moved into our present house in Manly West. We had four children (Vincent, Bernadette, Damien and Matthew) who went to primary school at St John Vianney's, Manly, and then the boys went to Iona College and our lovely daughter to Mt Carmel College in Wynnum. Vincent, Bernadette and Damien are married and we now have eight grandchildren. All of our family live in the Brisbane area and we see them regularly.

As for myself, the good Lord did not overburden me with a lot of intelligence but what he instilled in me was the desire to assist as many members of the general public as I could. My working life as a State Public Servant has been dominated by an interest in road safety.

- Part of the team that introduced the Queensland Government's first practical motorcycle training program
- Part of the team that introduced the Queensland Government's baby capsule hire service.

- Baby capsule hire service taken across to QAS 1992 – This gave me the opportunity to expand the baby capsule hire service so that all child restraints could be checked by QAS
- Travelled the length and breadth of Queensland calling into Ambulance Stations training staff in the use of all child restraints. On these trips, also undertook child restraint checks in shopping centres and home based Family Day Care Centres
- Information sessions on the use of child restraints for Australian Breastfeeding Association, Family Day Care Association and many other groups

Finally I became involved in the Local Ambulance Committee Wynnum and the Ambulance Museum which led me to be involved with the Wynnum Manly Historical Society.
