
Presidents Report

Greetings... and welcome to our November newsletter. This will be our last newsletter for 2015.

What a memorable year it has been - in some ways for the wrong reasons. We have had episodes of terrorism on Australian soil, passenger jets coming down resulting in the loss of many lives, war raging in many countries, and millions of people seeking refuge and a safer place to live. One's heart just aches seeing all those people streaming into Europe from their war torn homelands, because they cannot meet their basic safety needs. I consider that, too often, we in Australia take these basic survival needs for granted.

On the positive side, we have seen our Queen Elizabeth II reach a significant milestone, when, on 9th September 2015 she became our longest serving monarch. On that date, she celebrated her 23,226th day on the throne attending the opening of the Scottish Borders Railway. This line is the longest domestic railway to be built in Great Britain for more than a century. I really admire our Queen. Already the oldest sovereign in British history, on 21st April 2016, Elizabeth II will become the first of our monarchs to occupy the throne in her tenth decade.

While longevity is a great personal achievement for a monarch, it is not necessarily a marker of their success. Queen Victoria's reign spanned 63 years and 216 days. In that time the British Empire expanded.



Dreams in the Past

1947 - 1955

In 1957 the corner of Bay Terrace and Charlotte Street was an empty site, left after the burning of "Ingleston" boarding house in 1947. The City Council owned the land -. Ingleston Corner..

A head-line announcement was made the Herald of 6 February 40,000 was to be built on the site. There would be thirteen shops to let, 37 squares of office space on the first floor and Council offices. This was the first building to be erected under council policy of decentralizing its offices.

Local opinion was not happy. The Chamber of Commerce requested underground toilets. There were already plenty of better and larger shops in Wynnum. Why not build a fine modern civic hall on the site to accommodate local groups and events. The existing Municipal Library Hall was inadequate and could become the Council offices

The 1957 report:

Council Shops for Bay Terrace

Will they build them 20 feet back?

Specially reported by Murray Hulett

Headlines in the daily city press yesterday announced that the City Council proposed an immediate start on their new building to be erected on the council owned block at the corner of Bay Terrace and Charlotte Street.

"The total cost of the building, which is expected to be completed by the end of the year, is estimated at from £30,000 to £40,000" the report states.

The health committee chairman, Ald. Gregory, was quoted as saying that "There would be 13 shops for letting

and 37 squares of office space for letting on the first floor, in addition to council offices; £9000 available for expenditure before the end of June is to be spent on stage one, which will comprise six shops for letting and two for temporary council offices and a women's rest room and toilet. The whole block will be the first to be erected under the council policy of decentralizing its offices.

I have no quarrel at all with the erecting of the rest rooms and toilet proposal, although the chamber of Commerce and every civic minded citizen has long advocated their provision, but underground as is the case in most other civilized communities.

For the council to enter into a competitive field with the progressive and enterprising business community, who have already built the shopping centre of Wynnum into one of, if not the finest, in the Brisbane area, is too utterly ridiculous to contemplate.

Applications are even now before the council as many others have in the past months, for site approval for modern and spacious business premises, of a far larger and more commodious type than the council can ever hope to provide in their thirteen.

Many have been rejected or subjected to such ridiculous conditions as to make their erection an impossible investment.

Lucrative offers have been made to the council in the past for this site for business purposes and many suggestions for its use have been put forward by the Chamber of Commerce, but all to no avail.

Some months ago, a suggestion was put forward

for the erection of an Olympic pool and recreation reserve in the area known as the Blacks Camp. A council official at the time said that the idea, while laudible, was laughable to even think that such moneys could be found by the council; £40,000 would provide two such areas with a much more lucrative result to the council and far more benefit to the community as a whole.

Another point that has more merit than a block of shops for letting is the erection of an adequate civic hall for the district; £40,000 would provide a fine modern hall on this site.

One that would have every conceivable stage and accommodation facility and serve as a great source of encouragement to the local theatrical bodies, musical societies and other commendable district movements not forgetting a first class youth club.

The existing Municipal Library Hall, which is totally inadequate for such a large district could readily be converted into spacious municipal offices, with space to cater for every requirement in this regard.

For £40,000 or much less, such a project could well be a far better source of revenue than the proposed "shops for letting".

Does the council seriously contend and it looks like £40,000 worth of contention, that it will attract serious minded business folk, willing to provide good, solid capital in a business venture and tie themselves to the council as their landlords in a shop that, as one of 13 on the site could never hope to be, of a sufficient size as to offer anything like the types that local business houses have in mind and that the size of the district demands.

DEATH OF EX-ALDERMAN

The death was announced yesterday, following a long illness, of Mr Willie Russell Howard, of 15 Seventh Avenue, Coorparoo and formerly of Wynnum.

An engineer by trade, the late Mr Howard was at one time manager of the Wynnum Fish Depot and Ice Works, but is better known for the work he undertook for the district's betterment when elected as a C.M.O. Alderman to the Brisbane City Council in 1940 – an office he held until 1952.

Whilst a member of the City Council, the late Mr Howard was chairman of the Health Committee for a period of 11 years. He was known for his singleness of purpose and for being one to come straight to the point in any business matters he dealt with, having no time whatsoever for trivialities. His energies were always directed to the improvement of the district in which he lived and worked.

FOUNDED RESCUE ASSOCIATION

It was back in 1948, after a boating fatality in which four young lives were lost, that the subject of these lines called a meeting from which was to be formed the Waterloo Bay Rescue Association and eventually, the building of the rescue launch "Dauntless",

which, since 1955, has carried out excellent work in the saving of lives in Moreton Bay.

Of the many activities the late Mr Howard associated himself with, a few to recall included his being a Past President of the Wynnum Bowling Club and a life member of Mt Gravatt Show Committee. He was also Past Master of the Masonic Order and Methodist Church.

For 26 years the late Mr Howard was actively associated with the Wynnum Ambulance, having been appointed to the committee in 1927. In 1931 he was elected treasurer and later in 1936 became deputy chairman and State Executive representative. The following year he was elected chairman and continued this office until January 1953, when he shifted residence.

For a time the late Mr Howard left the district to reside in Bundaberg, but his interest in the Bayside district never waned. For all the good he did for the development of the area, the memory of the public is, unfortunately very short and like many others before him, his works are forgotten.

One project which he fathered and which should be



recognised today was the clearing and reformation of the old unkempt Hemmant Cemetery into the beautiful grounds of the present "Garden of Rest" on the same site.

The late "Bill" Howard was 75 years of age at the time of his death and the condolences of many in the district have been extended to the widow and family who survive. The funeral service took place in the East Chapel at Mt. Thompson Crematorium today (Wednesday 24 July 1963), at 12.30 pm.



Wynnum Man Leading the Way in Cancer Research

Professor Philip Hogg, the son of Lloyd and Dawn Hogg, grew up in Wynnum where he attended Wynnum High School. He is now a leading biochemist based in Sydney and has just been appointed as the Chair of the Translational Cancer Research for Sydney Catalyst and the NHMRC Clinical Trials Centre at the University of Sydney.

Professor Hogg originally started his career researching proteins, and their role in blood clotting as part of his Cardiac research. He discovered a new type of chemical modification of proteins that changed the way the cells metabolise glucose. This lead to thinking about possibilities for this as a type of treatment to shut off energy production in cancer cells.

Professor Hogg's research then turned to this area. The new drug that was developed from his molecule was originally tested on mice with positive results. Trials in the UK showed an improvement in many of the patients. Now an Australian trial is being undertaken with 22 patients in Sydney and Melbourne. The research has received over \$3.75 million of funding from Cancer Council NSW and the NSW Cancer Institute.

This type of treatment is most likely to be effective at treating pancreatic, brain and ovarian tumours, but Professor Hogg warns that there is still the possibility that the toxic effects of the treatment may be too great for patients, or that the treatment may pass through the blood too quickly to be effective.

The head of the Cancer Institute NSW, Mr David Currow, said that, "this is 20 years worth (of research) and we do need to pay tribute to researchers like Phil staying the distance".

Let's hope that his research is successful in fighting this terrible disease.
