President's Report

Our first stop will be morning tea the Seafarer's Mission and then we head to the Port for a one hour guided bus tour of the working Port. After this we will head to the Port of Brisbane Café for a hot lunch (drinks not included in price).

The lead up to Easter saw our family have our last family "get together" before our daughter and her family would leave Australia and return to their base in England. We set off to Stanthorpe on the southern darling downs to enjoy a few days camping. We are fortunate to have friends who live at Amiens (west of Stanthorpe) and have set up a bush camping facility on their property. Our days were spent not only exploring the local wineries and eateries but as our group included our grandchildren, we also explored the Christmas Tree Farm, which is open all year round. You can order your tree for Christmas as well as exploring the shop to pick up some wonderful decorations. The main attraction of course was feeding Santa's reindeers, apparently, they holiday and rest in Stanthorpe while getting ready for their one big job of the year. The children certainly enjoyed feeding the reindeers as well as other animals who reside on the property.

The southern darling downs area has been in drought for the last three years, the dams are either empty or only contain a little brackish water. Some farmers are carting water from as far away as the Lockyer Valley. One small crop farmer was getting three truck loads per day in the hope of keeping their crops of carrots and onions going. In comparison on the other side of Cunningham's' Gap farmers in the scenic rim towns we passed through, Peaks Crossing, Kalbar and Aratula were lush and green. As we

passed through the area, we saw plenty of irrigation happening. The difference a mountain range makes! This was no more noticeable than on our return trip home. The closer we travelled to Brisbane the heavier the rain fell! Our daughter and family have now returned to the UK and are about to set out on the next part of their year long "gap year". In a few days they will start sailing the English Channel, crossing to Cherbourg, France before heading west down the channel to Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney and the Isles of Scilly, before sailing back to the south west coast of Cornwall and Devon. Before starting school and work at the beginning of the northern Autumn in September. There will certainly be a lot of stories of their adventures for the girls to share with their class mates.

VALE PETER MELBOURNE HUGHES (2/11/1932—17/4/2019)



Peter Melbourne Hughes was born at Coorparoo on 2nd November 1932. This was the first Tuesday in November and to anyone who knows anything about horse racing knows that is Melbourne Cup Day and on the day of Peter's birth the winner of the Melbourne Cup was a horse called "Peter Pan" - hence the name of Peter Melbourne Hughes.

As a child, Peter spent time with his parents and brother at Cordelia near Ingham. When his father re-enlisted in the army in 1942, it was decided that North Queensland was not the safest place for the family to reside so they arrived at Wynnum when Peter was 9 years of age. The family lived in a rundown flat at "Beach House" opposite the Wynnum wading pool. He attended Wynnum State School and finished his schooling at Church of England Grammar School at East Brisbane.

He and his brother used to ride their pushbikes from Wynnum to Stanthorpe to do fruit picking. How fit he must have been!!! He married Beryl in 1956 and they built the family home where they would live for the next 50 odd years at Chandler before eventually moving to Belmont.

Peter loved fishing and horses. He shared his passion for horses with his daughter, Julie, and they attended many race meetings together both here and in New Zealand. He was even part owner of a racehorse called "Vain Mate". Peter regularly attended the Melbourne Cup up until 2 years ago when ill health started to get the better of him.

Peter is survived by his wife, Beryl, and daughter, Julie.

A Local Fable

"A long time ago, (in the 1880's) there was a local Bullock Driver, of unknown name, who owned four bullocks. The animals were each named, Charlotte, Florence, Edith and Clara. The bullocks hauled the drays of timber up the hill to Wynnum South to build the new houses.

After hauling timber up the hill to Wynnum South, to build all the new houses, the drays were loaded with pine cones, walnuts, chestnuts and cedar, all of which grew in and around the village of Wynnum, and were taken back down the hill for the use by the timber cutters."

This fable was taught to the school children in Tingalpa State School over 50 years ago. Have you heard the story before? Is this really the reason for the naming of the streets in Wynnum Central?

Stained glass window discovered and re-dedicated

The Methodist Church of Manly, was built in Kingsley Terrace in 1901. With the union of Congregational, Methodist and some Presbyterian churches in 1973 to form the Wynnum Uniting Church, the church in Kingsley Terrace was closed.

The stained glass window inside this church, dedicated to Joseph Curtis, disappeared. After much hunting, member Cherie Nicholson, recently found the window, stored away in Bayside Uniting Church, Wondall Road.

On Sunday 31 March 2019 the stained glass window was re-dedicated and stands inside the Bayside Uniting Church, Wondall Road, Manly West. (See pages 5 and 6)

The Curtis Family of Manly, a Pioneer Family.

The Manly pioneer family of **Ellen and Joseph Curtis** were by no means the first family into the newly opened township of Manly. They were however, early residents, moving to Manly about 8 years after the formalising of the new township and the sale of land.

The families of **Joseph Curtis** and **Ellen Louise Hinton** moved to Australia from England and Wales during about 1882 when Ellens' parents, Henry and Elizabeth put their ages back by 9 years to enable their entry into Australia as immigrants paying £5 per head for the journey. They travelled to this country together with their 4 daughters, leaving Plymouth on the vessel "Stracathro".

Hinton family stories indicate that they lived and owned the Commercial Hotel in Newport, Wales (close to the British Channel and about 20 miles south from Monmouth) and operated sailing ships trading into French ports, for it is believed that the 4 daughters, Elizabeth, Esther, Ellen and Clara received some schooling in France. Ellen was born in Monmouth in 1866.

Whereas considerable information concerning the **Hinton** side of the **Curtis** family has been ascertained, unfortunately, very little background has so far to date been established concerning **Joseph Curtis** apart from the birth-place in 1858 at Chilcombe, Hampshire, England.

Joseph, together with his mother Louisa and 4 sisters immigrated to Australia. His father John later died in England aged 96. His mother and 4 sisters are buried at Toowong Cemetery with 2 sisters dying of diptheria, a common life-taking disease of the time.

From their births at Monmouth, Wales and Chilcombe, Hampshire, England and their eventual immigration to Australia and the colony of Queensland, Joseph and Ellen were married in January 1892 while living at Fernberg House (now Government House, the home of the Queensland Governor) where Joseph was employed as a gardener and Ellen was a governess and lived with her family at Clifton House, the gate keepers residence for Fernberg House.

Upon leaving Fernberg House, Joseph and Ellen moved with 3 children to a timber slab hut at Belmont and cultivated vegetables which were later delivered by horse and cart to the then scattered settlers of the Belmont, Lytton, Wynnum, Manly areas.

Leaving Belmont, the family moved to the relatively new township of Manly and setup a general store at 197 Stratton Terrace, on the corner of Cambridge Parade (part of this building still stands), which they rented from the **Cosgrove** family. They built a tea garden next to their store, using bush timber, packing cases and timber shingles. Diagonally across from this original store was another store operated by another old pioneer family of **Richard Russell**. The once Commonwealth Bank and car park stood where this original shop stood, although another large store was built on this site in between.

The **Curtis** family were by this time establishing themselves into a community business as well as developing a spirit of advancement within the community. Eventually, the Tea Gardens was demolished and a larger 2 story building was constructed in about 1906 to accommodate the growing business as well as a growing family. This building at the corner of Stratton Terrace and Cambridge Parade still stands today, having recently been refurbished and now operating as restaurants and other shopping services. Also in this same area, now the car park, a residence was built in which one of the Curtis sons, Arthur and his family resided for many years. Another of the sons, James and his family resided in a home near where the food market now stands in the Harbour Village mall.

Early days in Manly saw Arthur (before having the railway) deliver produce by horse and cart and Esther delivering newspapers on horseback. She frequently spoke of concern of the unknown when riding past an aboriginal camp which existed for many years on the hill somewhere between Arnold Street and Falcon Street. Ernest became well known for delivering telegrams on a bicycle, while daughter Vera (**Gibson**) was the post mistress for many years.

JOSEPH CURTIS (1855 – 1928) The first Methodist services were held in an old bush house at the rear of the store. The Teahouse went in 1906 to be replaced with a larger two storied building. The lower floor proved produce, small goods, grocery lines, hardware and maritime items. Joe was Manly's first Post Master. The family lived on the upper floor. There were four sons, Leslie, James, Ernest and Arthur and five daughters, Winifred, Vera, Esther, Ada and Edith.

Son Arthur delivered produce by horse and cart. Daughter Esther delivered newspapers on horseback. Ernest delivered telegrams by bicycle and daughter Vera was Manly's postmistress for many years. Daughter Edith married **William Morrison Gunn** who later became a Member of Parliament

Joe entered local government in 1905 and became a member of the Kianawah Divisional Board. He was elected a councilor in the new Wynnum Shire Council in 1905 and in 1911 became its chairman. He was Mayor of the Town of Wynnum in 1914 and retired from the Council in 1916. Joe also played a significant part in securing Manly State school in 1918, the militia Drill Hall (now the site of Wynnum High School Hall), Memorial Park, Manly Yacht Club and Manly Swimming Club.

Presentation to Joe Curtis from Manly Yacht Club for: "... our hearty appreciation of the valuable efforts rendered by you to the Club in the capacity of President, an office which you so capably filled during the initiatory season of the club's inauguration."



Joseph and Ellen retired to Mt Nebo and the family were running the business at Manly until the 1960's. Joseph died in a bush fire tragedy in October 1928 at the age of 73. Ellen returned to the family home at Manly and lived with her family until she died in 1951, aged 85.

It is essential that the significance of the contributions made by early pioneers be remembered and recognised for the important contributions that emerge in the following years of community advancements both in physical and personal. The early Curtis family recognised that their meagre successes could be shared among family and local friends. Many older residents will surely remember the extent of credit available from the **Curtis general store** during those times of financial difficulties, when repayments were made only when, or if, times got better.

No matter where level of success is reached by the various Curtis family members or their additional families up to the present, each in their own way have contributed to the community and in Manly where it all started with Ellen and Joseph Curtis.

Today a dentist's surgery is found next to "Clayton House in Tingal Road.

But do you remember when Sunshine Seafoods Restaurant was on that site?

SEAFOODS RESTAURANT EXPANDS IN TINGAL ROAD

The confidence of a husband and wife team in the future of the Wynnum and Bayside districts has more than been borne out with the announcement this week of the completion of improvements and extensions to their seafoods restaurant which they first opened in Tingal Road four years ago.

The couple are **Lex and Bernice Grierson-Jones** who first opened the doors of their **Sunshine Seafoods Restaurant** in October 1972 when they took floor space in the re-modelled "Clayton House" and their plans to establish a restaurant with a difference has more than surpassed their expectations.

Lex and Bernice set out a menu which they believed would tempt the palates of the people; they enlivened the interior décor with furniture of the colonial style and wall to wall carpet which added a touch of colour and quietness to the restaurant.

That their menu was popular was proven in a very short time and the crabs, oysters, scallops and prawns which were added to the regular fish listings became so much a part of the regular meals of many residents who visited the restaurant to have a meal or take home the items they fancied.

The step taken by Lex and Bernice Grierson-Jones was not the case of entering a field which was new to either of them. Both had been associated with the catering business, Lex being a qualified chef who followed his profession in England for 20 years and for three years previously the couple had established themselves as the Sunshine Caterers.

Through the service they gave to the district at functions for which they were entrusted with the catering arrangements, they gained a reputation for dependability. Undoubtedly the experience gained in this venture stood them in good stead in the management and running of their Sunshine Seafoods Restaurant which has combined quality seafoods with excellent service to the district now for over four years.

Their first tempting treat which proved popular and still is, was the "Fisherman's Basket" – a selection of butterfly prawns, oysters, fish pieces and Tasmanian sea scallops, while there was a great demand for their prawn cocktail, prawn cutlets and lobsters.

They did not forget that in every community there are people who do not like a fish menu and they set about this problem by putting on special T-bone steak meals, cooked to the customer's own particular liking.

Today, the exclusive seafoods are listed on the menu as well as other types of meals in order to offer a satisfactory selection for every individual customer's liking.

The founders and proprietors of the restaurant, Lex and Bernice, are still very active in the business and continue to run their Sunshine Seafoods Restaurant along personal lines – they know their customers and their needs.

Mrs Mary Smalley has been appointed as manager and is assisted by Mr Arch Phoenix, both of whom having had extensive experience in the restaurant business over a period of years.

These new extensions have almost doubled the seating capacity within the restaurant, while the whole complex – dining rooms, Functions Room and right through to the kitchens, has been air conditioned.

The decorations and décor leave the customer with no doubt in mind that the premises cater for foods from the sea – the nets of the fishing boats are strung around the walls, there are monster crabs and lobsters 'caught' in the mesh and on occasions mermaids have been seen sitting quietly, talking to and petting their finny friends from the depths!

And whoever heard of a fish shop with velvet wall-paper and colourful curtains? Well, "Sunshine" has it all in the 'wet' seafoods take-away section that has been specially laid out and equipped with modern refrigerated counter which gives customers a clear view of the fish they can buy to take home and cook for themselves.

Besides accommodation, single meals, tables for two, or the quick business lunch for people working in the district, "Sunshine" caters for the whole family with special tables which can be set up as one unit.

And the kiddies have not been forgotten, for on the family side of the business there is an abundance of high chairs for toddlers who like to sit up to the table with their adults. So this is the place where the whole family can come in and sit down to a meal or dinner without the preparation worry falling upon the shoulders of the womenfolk in the home . . . it's their 'day off' from kitchen chores, which they appreciate.

As the occasion arises and special fish have been landed and flown in, a 'Specials Board' has been set up in the restaurant to let customers know the added selection they will have, quite apart from the regular menu listing.


