

A Message from the President . . .

We are really very puny.

Astronomically speaking, over the last few years we've been having a most eventful time. We have had a comet, a few eclipses of both the sun and moon and unusually both wet and dry weather – not at the same time.

Just a few of weeks ago we had the closest look at Mars that will be possible for 60,000 years —if the Earth and Mars stay in the same orbits they now occupy. When you think about it that's a couple of ice ages and reciprocal periods of warming.

Some months prior to the Mars announcement, we were told of an asteroid heading our way that could collide with Earth. As this event is 800 years in the future I'm sure the majority of us immediately forgot about it.

Our Heritage Listed Places:



Hemmant Community Church

In 1859, the area around Hemmant was opened up to farming and much of the land along Doughboy (Bulimba) Creek and the Brisbanc River was soon taken up for sugar growing.

Families would often gather under a tree for their Sunday church services. Such was the case with the Hemmant and district's Wesleyan Methodists. In 1865, tenders were called for the construction of a church at Church Hill. In November 1866, "...a modest, 19th century timber gothic-style church..." was officially opened. This is the second oldest church in the district and also one of the oldest in Brisbane.

The original bellows organ and pews were all carried down the river, from Kangaroo Point, in dinghies.

The Hon. Angus Gibson MLC, son of William Gibson of the sugar pioneering family, was a preacher and trustee of the property for 50 years.

Some of the pioneering families such as the Kelks, Gibsons, Miles, Uhlmanns and Yeos, who have long been associated with the church and district have had one of the church's fourteen leadlight windows dedicated to them.

Following the amalgamation of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational churches in the 1970s, the church operated as the Hemmant Uniting Church but due to a decline in numbers of the congregation, the building was closed in 1988.

With the threat of demolition a distinct possibility, the local community banded together to save the building. Considerable restoration was undertaken before the re-opening of the non-denominational Hemmant Christian Community Church.
