Main Speaker, Ken Goodman, told us about his book "A Moreton Bay Larrikin" which outlines his adventures on the bay 30 years ago.



The Visitors Book for 2003 holds 923 signatures and 30% of these were from the community. 24 of our members volunteered their time to "Keep the door open" - thank you very much.

The collection of comprehensive Reference Material is the aim of the centre for 2004. Already there are some local Electoral Rolls. The Commonwealth Rolls for 1903, 1906 and 1912 provide information on addresses and occupations while the State Roll for East Moreton for 1864 shows that Tingalpa, Lytton and Doughboy were the only local residential locations.

Our Heritage Wynnum Manly School of Arts



Following a public meeting in 1910, it was decided to erect a School of Arts and a building committee was formed to undertake the project.

The opening of the Wynnum-Manly School of Arts in 1913 created a centre for people to get together and meet for various activities.

Mr AE Chave was appointed President and Miss E Crofts became the first Secretary and Librarian.

What is now the central section, housed the first library which was stocked with 7,300 books and had a reading room with newspapers and periodicals. Meetings, church fetes, society balls and weekly dances were regularly held in the hall and the building also hosted the district's first four horticultural shows.

Following the formation of the Wynnum and Manly Agricultural, Horticultural and Industrial Society, in 1919 the shows moved to Russell (Memorial) Park.

Later, extensions were made on each side for a concert hall and dining halls and for many years, regular movie nights were held.

The building has been well maintained and is still in constant use by many groups and for community functions.
