Membership Draw was won by Jan Aplin.


Meeting closed at: 9.15pm and members and guests retired to a delicious supper prepared by Cherrie Nicholson, Denise Magill and Shirley Houghton.



Our Heritage -

'SS Walrus'



When Taylor Winship left his home in County Durham, he was already a professional boat builder, mariner and shipowner. He arrived in Australia and settled in the Manning River area of the NSW North Coast in 1836.

Over a period of five years, he built seven ships ranging in size from 23 to 177 tons.

In 1849, he moved to Brisbane and due to his building skills, was contracted to build a number of Brisbane's bridges including the first one over the mouth of Norman Creek in 1856.

At Cleveland, in 1864, Taylor Winship built the paddle steamer 'Walrus' which operated around the coastal settlements of Moreton Bay.

This was the time when large numbers of sugar plantations were being established in the southern coastal areas but, initially, there were very few mills for crushing the sugar.

In 1869, the Pioneer Floating Sugar Mill Company bought the 'Walrus' and converted her into a floating sugar mill and rum distillery.

'SS Walrus' (cont)

She became a well known sight, moving from plantation to plantation along the Nerang, Logan and Albert Rivers and up the coast to the extensive area along Bulimba Creek.

The Gibsons, Porters and other local cane farmers used the services of the 'Walrus' before building their own land-based mills.

'Walrus' could crush two tons of sugar a day and also distilled rum from the molasses produced from sugar by-products.

Officially, 84,725 litres of rum were produced between 1869 and 1871 but trying to keep track of all the rum created such a headache for the authorities that the floating distillery ceased operation in 1871.

With the increase in land based mills and the downturn in the local sugar industry, the 'Walrus' became too costly to operate and in 1873, the floating mill closed down.

By 1884, 'Walrus' was no longer seaworthy and she foundered on the banks of the Logan River near Beenleigh Homestead.

Cloncurry, December 17

By Friday's coach Mr. William DRAKE, special representative of the Australian Mutual Provident Society, arrived at Croydon. He complained of the heat a great deal, but was not considered to be very ill till next day, when he became suddenly worse, and died at the Imperial Hotel early in the evening. His death is, I believe, attributable to heat apoplexy.
