The Lucky Door Prize was won by Doug Gilshenan and the Membership Draw was won by Jan Aplin.


Meeting closed at: 9.05pm and members and guests retired to a delicious supper prepared by Eris Powell, Ian Wheeler and Minnie Bowman..

## Our Heritage - Queensport Meatworks



Few people know that Napoleon was responsible for the invention of canning. He offered a reward to the inventor of a system to preserve much

needed food for his long lines of soldiers involved in the Napoleonic Wars.

A Frenchman developed the first method which involved large, fragile, glass jars, but it wasn't long before the British came up with the idea of using tin cans.

Australia became the first country to develop a commercial canning process and we also built the world's first freezing works in Sydney in 1861. In 1879, 40 tons of frozen meat was successfully shipped to London.

The Hemmant area was first settled in 1859 and became a thriving farming district due to its rich soil and easy access from the river. Other industries soon developed and in 1881, the Queensport Meatworks became Brisbane's first processing plant.



A number of reporters were brought down to the works, by steamer, to view the canning plant and the freezing chamber that was in the process of being built. A Haslam 'dry, cold air' machine was ready to be installed and put into operation as soon as the building was completed. This was supposed to be a rather daring experiment, as the Bell-Coleman process was the more, well known system.

It wasn't intended that fresh meat be sent overseas from Queensport, but cold storage was




## Society Receives Grant

considered necessary for the local trade. The plant was owned by the Queensland Freezing & Food Export Co. Ltd. And was able to treat about 50 head of cattle a day

The next two owners were the Graziers Meat Export Company and then the Baynes Bros.

In addition to slaughtering for its chain of 50 city and suburban shops in Brisbane, Baynes Bros. began to build an export trade. They had some good contracts with the Netherlands India Government and high quality salt beef was sent up to Java, in casks, for army supplies. In 1929, the plant was sold to the Angliss Group.
