Lucky Door: M Skelton Membership Draw I Wheeler.


Meeting closed at: 9.00 and members and guests retired to a delicious supper prepared by Noela Stratton, Jan Parnell and Ian Wheeler.

Marjorie Winifred Davenport OAM 1924 – 2004

It is with great sadness that we advise of the passing of one of our members, Winifred Davenport.

Before moving to Manly, Win grew up and went to school in the Moorooka area.

After leaving school, her mathematical and drawing talents came together when she was offered a cadetship with shipbuilders, Evans Deakin.

She completed a four year course in mechanical and electrical engineering and became Australia's first female engineer. This was later followed by a Master Mariner's certificate which was earned by working in the engine rooms of such vessels as the SS Koopa and the MV Mirimar.

Early in her career, Winifred joined the Department of Harbours and Marine where she remained until her retirement. During this time, she designed the Manly Boat Harbour, the survey ship *Trigla* and wrote the *History of the Harbours and Marine Department 1924 - 1985*.

Following her retirement, Win joined the Wynnum Manly Historical Society in 1991. She continued her research and undertook the mammoth and time consuming task of recording shipping and passengers into Moreton Bay. Two volumes had been published to date.

In 1990, Winifred Davenport, was honoured with an Order of Australia medal for her services to engineering.

Manly War Memorial



Situated in an oval shaped amphitheatre in a park in Carlton Terrace, is the Manly War Memorial. It was unveiled in April 1921 by W H Barnes, MLA and honours the 16 local men who fell during the First World War.

The land on which the park is located was originally part of a 150 acres (61 hectares) lot bought by Thomas Jones in 1860. In 1882 the land was sold to the Arnold brothers who sub divided the land for auction.

From the late 1890s the area was designated as a water reserve and eventually formed part of the Manly Dam. It was filled in some time after 1908.

The land was never developed and was subsequently divided by a road. Although the memorial was erected in 1920, the land, which had always been considered a park, was not officially resumed until 1937.

Previously known as Manly Memorial Park, it was renamed in 1990 after Richard Russell, a Manly pioneer citizen and businessman who was elected Mayor in 1919.
