#### A Message from the President . . .

One of the objects of our Society is to encourage the preservation of local historic associations, buildings, photographs and artifacts relevant to the history of Wynnum, Manly and adjacent district areas.

We have all been guilty, in the past, of disposing of historically valuable material. At the time it probably seemed that there was no other course. We could have been under stress for a variety of reasons or unable to cope with the vast quantity to be dealt with, so truckloads of goodies have been taken to the dump.

I would say that the greatest amount of our heritage is lost because of ignorance. At the time of the clean-out it probably wasn't known, or cared about, that that old photograph with dirty glass may be the only existing evidence of a missing piece of research or that tatty bunch of letters or papers could flesh out the life of a highly prized pioneer. At other times an old desk, table or chair may have been thoughtlessly discarded when, in actual fact, it is still in good order and does its job well, quite apart from its often considerable historical value. IT IS UP TO US TO DO OUR BEST TO MAKE OUR FRIENDS, ORGANIZATIONS TO WHICH WE BELONG AND OUR CHURCHES AWARE OF THE VALUE OF WHAT THEY MAY BE THROWING OUT.

This experience is on the personal level. The equivalent is occurring all too often on a much larger scale. Look how many old houses have disappeared from our streets in recent years. Institutions no longer viable are not only losing their identities, but their physical habitats, sometimes beautiful, are being replaced by *redevelopment*.

We converts already know how much we learn from the past and the great influence it has on the present and the future. IT IS UP TO US TO SPREAD THE WORD AMONGST OUR FRIENDS, ACQUAINTANCES AND BUSINESS ASSOCIATES IN AN EFFORT TO SAVE AS MUCH OF OUR HERITAGE AS WE CAN.



## Our Heritage Listed Places: Nazareth House



After visiting Nazareth House in London, Archbishop Duhig wanted to set up an aged persons and children's home in Queensland. He requested that a Chapter of the Poor Sisters of Nazareth be established here.

He searched for a suitable site and in 1918, purchased Mt Margaret, a 60 acre property at Tingal Hill, Wynnum. The property, which included a nine room villa, had been the home of former Queensland Premier (1906-07), William Kidston.

The six sisters didn't arrive in Brisbane until March 1921 but immediately took in and began caring for seven elderly ladies.

The following year, Archbishop Duhig purchased the neighbouring property of Silversprings. The buildings from Mt Margaret were moved to the new property. By Christmas, the home had 35 residents and it was obvious that there was an urgent need for more accommodation.

The firm of Hennessy, Hennessy, Keesing & Co and JP Donoghue were engaged to design the new building. George Turner's tender of £44,200 was accepted and construction of the first section began in 1924. the building was officially opened on 16 August 1925 by the then Governor of Queensland, Sir Matthew Nathan.

In 1939, a second stage, which included a convent, chapel and laundry, was added.

By 1963, it was caring for 85 elderly people and 70 children but in 1982 it ceased to function as a facility for children. However, there was a growing need for a nursing home so, following the completion of renovations, the new Nazareth House aged care facility was opened on 17 June 1984.
