- **From last time ... Do you recognise this object?**



This dome showing five red reflecting dots was identified by Ian Wheeler as a marker formerly used at the centre of a crossroads. This marker would have been in the centre of five meeting roads. Since the object was dug up in roadworks in Preston Road, its original home could have been at the centre of the "Corner House" meeting of roads , indicating Wondall, Worthing, West and Preston (2)roads. Now there is a roundabout at that location.

Another such object was located at the corner of Fox Street and Glenora Street, Wynnum. This one would have shown 3 reflecting dots. When no longer required this marker is said to have been thrown over the Fox Street bridge into Wynnum Creek, is now buried in the mud.

- **William Sim MckORKINDALE**

One of the descendants of William is seeking information, stories, photos of his Great Uncle, who was Pipe Major of the Brisbane Caledonian Band. Apparently, William attended meetings at the Wynnum/Manly Caledonian/ Burns Society. He also played his pipes for a Brisbane Radio Station and was regularly active in the community.

William was born In Glasgow in 1876, came to Australia in 1900, to Ithaca in 1913, was married and moved to Manly in 1919. He died in 1945, just a year before the Wynnum Herald was first published. So, we have no information of his activities in Wynnum/ Manly. We have found that he and his wife Jessie and son William Sim, lived in a house called "Inverglenn" in Stewart Parade Manly. By trade William was a carpenter.

Can anybody help? Do you know any person/s that may be able to help? Maybe any old newspaper cuttings of the Brisbane Caledonian Band and Burns Society featuring William.

## Bill McFarlane Park


By now (2 March 2021) the new Meals on Wheels Centre and Netball Courts at 880 Manly Road, Wakerley will be re-named Bill McFarlane Park. Bill has been involved with the community for many years both with Meals on Wheels and with the former local Marching Girls.

Back in 1963 Bill loaned money to the Marching Girls to purchase 15 hectares of land, in Wondall Road, Manly West which included a house on the land. This was where Bunnings store now stands. Then Bill spent hours with his tractor, in levelling the land and preparing the surface for the Marching Girls and then continued with the maintenance of the grounds. The venue was officially opened in 1968 by Clem Jones, Lord Mayor of Brisbane and named "McFarlane Field".

When the Marching Girls ceased using the site in 2007, they gave the proceeds to worthy not-for-profit organisations. Meals on Wheels was the main beneficiary and sale of their land to a developer enabled the new Meals on Wheels building to be constructed at 880 Manly Road, Wakerley. The flagpole of the Marching Girls, from McFarlane Field, is mounted in Wondall Road outside Bunnings and this plaque at the entrance to the store.



Bill was also a strong supporter of Meals on Wheels, especially with the free monster raffle held in conjunction with the Meals on Wheels Volunteers Christmas Party. Bill still lives at Manly West and is now 95 years old. He has had a successful career in business and has always been a great community supporter.

Congratulations to Bill for being honoured with a park named after him. The Meals on Wheels kitchen is operating well and the Netball players now have a home.

## A “Titanic” Connection

On 15 April 1912, when the “Titanic” hit an iceberg in the north Atlantic Ocean during her maiden voyage, pastry chef **Henri Marie Jaillet** lost his life.

Henri himself, his parents, Charles Frederic and Josephine Marie Jaillet (nee Guillermet) and his grandparents, Jean and Rosalie Jaillet (nee Badin) were all born in the Rhone-Alps region of France. Henri’s mother, Josephine Marie Jaillet, died on 4 November 1873, only 8 days after Henri was born.

Henri moved from France to England and married Lydia ‘Lily’ Florence Hutton in 1903 in Suffolk, England. They had one son Victor Henri Mari Jaillet, born in Whitechapel in 1907. Unfortunately, “Lily” died after the birth. Victor Henri was brought up by his maternal grandparents, then by his new step-mother, Margaret, when his father, Henri re-married in 1911.

Henri Marie Jaillet, at the age of 39 years gained employment as Head Pastry Cook, on the maiden voyage of the “Titanic”. The *Titanic* was a supposedly unsinkable White Star liner. In April 1912, at least 1,500 lives were lost, including that of Henri, as the ship hit an iceberg and slid to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean.

Henri’s son **Victor Henri Mari Jaillet** was living in Manchester, England working as an assistant on a petrol lorry, when, at the age of 15 years, he emigrated by third class to Moreton Bay. He arrived on 25 June 1923. He was apprehended by the police twice, in 1925 and 1926, when a warrant was issued. He worked out from Too-woomba, extracting logs with a bullock team. In 1930 he was a car driver for Hillsdon’s of Herries Street Too-woomba.

In October 1930 Victor, aged 23 years, married Hilda Elizabeth Martin, aged 17 years, at St Peter’s C/E, Wynnum. Hilda was born in Nottingham, England in 1913 and arrived in Queensland with her parents on the “Omar” in 1927.

First son, Anthony Andre Jaillet was born in December 1930. Ten more children had arrived by 1952.

In 1936, Vic and Hilda, with four children, were living in Wynnum at “Innisfail” in Clara Street. Vic was a labourer. In 1940 his sign board went up in Bay Terrace, Wynnum, between Clara and Chestnut Street (near the present location of Ray White’s Real Estate) “Vic Jaillett Licensed Dealer and Cycle Repairs”. (Vic is the son of Henri the pastrycook on the *Titanic*.)

Vic and Hilda divorced in 1955. Vic died in July 1990 and Hilda in 1974. Their tenth child, son Victor Randolph Jaillet, born in 1950, and known as “Sonny”, told this story to “Your Time”. *A Magazine for the 55+*, in November 2020. Sonny, Henri’s grandson, at 70 years is still an “A” grade golfer and a Wynnum boy through and through.

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The research findings of Sonny's niece Karen Haughtey, of Victoria Point, who is great granddaughter of Henri, the pastrycook, give a picture of life on the "Titanic" on that first voyage. Here is an entry from the book, "RMS Titanic", written on 12 April 1912 at 8.45pm:

*"The elegance and beauty of the room was exceeded only by the volume of fine food served there. Dinner in first class stretched for 12 or 13 courses and ended with a desert from Henri Jaillet, the renowned pastry chef. Last night it had been chocolate mousse napoleons, each piece a work of art. The diners were the pampered of the world, used to the very best of everything. And they got it here.*

*"When the lights dimmed in the saloon, excitement buzzed in the vast room. Never mind that every single diner was full to bursting. The anticipation of the next fabulous dessert was all that was required to give them an appetite.*

*"An army of waiters marched in from the kitchen, bearing huge platters of cherries jubilee flambe. There were "oohs" and "aahs" and even a sprinkling of applause. The flaming brandy cast a bluish glow on the white walls and the gentlemen's gleaming starched shirtfronts."*

Henri's body was recovered from the sea and he was buried in Nova Scotia, Canada, the nearest landfall to the site of the sinking of the *Titanic* in the north Atlantic Ocean. His body was described as:

*No. 277, Male. Estimated age 35 years Very dark hair and moustache. Clothing: checked trousers, blue coat, dark overcoat, "H J" on pyjamas. Brown Boots. Effects: 3/10d in a Purse, knife, a card with H JAILETT (Chef). Probably Italian.*

Member of the Society, Ian Wheeler brought the cutting from "Your Time" into the Resource Room and Ellen commenced to fathom the family tree.

## Where was I? - February 2021

FLINDER'S BUILDING formerly Oxley House



182 Bay Terrace Wynnum

Originally named Oxley House before  
"Flinders"

In August 1977 work had commenced on Wynnum's first high rise building at 182 Bay Terrace. The former occupiers of the site were Dollar Curtains and Singer Sewing Machines. Work was to be completed by November 15 1977 for proposed official opening in December 1977.

There were to be 6 stories, 5 floors of offices and shops on the ground floor. The building had air conditioning and elevators. The back and front were glassed in to provide views. There were 32 car parking spaces. The development was funded by Wynnum developers. Spokesperson was Dr Jack Hansen. Cost was to be \$550,000. However the costs skyrocketed to just under \$1m

The public had an opportunity to inspect Oxley House on Saturday 22 April 1978 by arrangement of the owners of the building and the Rotary Club of Wynnum and Manly. A day of festivities was arranged. Stalls displaying arts, crafts and hobbies. The new port plan was on display and aerial views of the Bayside for sale. A raffle was held for a painting of the Bayside area. The lift was available for use. Visitors were encouraged to purchase a card tag which included a helium balloon which was to be released from the top floor. The balloon that reached the furthest afield won the owners two Ansett Pioneer coach tickets to Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide or Cairns. The person who sent the tag back to Wynnum received a transistor radio. If one did not purchase a tag entry to the building was 20cent adult and 10 cents child or 50 cents per family.

By 1993 when purchased by a group of local businessmen, the building was known as Flinders. Areas were available for rent. Redeeming features were air conditioning and carpeted.

### The Wild Scotchman (Part 2)

This month we continue where we left off with the story of James McPherson aka The Wild Scotchman.

#### St Helena Penal Establishment – Misdemeanors and Punishments

12 April 1870: **Attempted escape. Punishment:** James McPherson, Ross and Dyball were given 1 month's solitary confinement while Howard, Gray and Devitt were given 25 lashes.<sup>8 3</sup>

It seemed that James McPherson and his fellow escapees were to be punished in a way that would send a strong message to all other would-be escapees. Attempt an escape at your peril.

This was not the only punishment meted out to bushranger and prisoner James McPherson while he was incarcerated on St Helena Island.

30 July 1870 Signed a petition asking for vegetables as he had only rice for 10 months.<sup>9</sup>

3 October 1870 Assaulting a fellow prisoner **Punishment:** Admonished Supt.<sup>9</sup>

10 January 1871 Refusing to work. **Punishment:** 3 days' solitary confinement<sup>11</sup>

23 January 1871 Fighting. **Punishment:** Seven days' solitary confinement.<sup>11</sup>

27 February 1871 Making a noise in cell. **Punishment:** To Be placed in a cell by himself at night. VJ<sup>10</sup>

1 May 1871 Disobedience of orders. **Punishment:** Admonished VJ<sup>10</sup>

15 May 1871 Making frivolous complaints. **Punishment:** Indulgences stopped till further orders. VJ and JP Hobb.<sup>10</sup>

Life inside the prison it seems was not something that James found easy to adjust to or to accept. An adventurous, spirited man, James felt keenly the close walls of the prison:

#### St Helena

*"How wretched are they who are shut up in prison;  
lying unhappy in the dark night and reflecting on the past life?  
This is life; alas, unhappy me!  
What the future has in store, I do not know.  
But this time to me is an eternity.  
I would rather be tortured than live such a life for twenty years."*

This poem was written by James McPherson at St Helena Island. Poetry and foreign languages had always been something that James had excelled in and had loved, being an educated man. It was reported that on arrival from Scotland in 1855, James and his worked at Cressbrook station, where 12 year old James and his brother were sent to a hut by themselves as shepherds. In this hut he learnt to speak German by a native German man at the hut. This was not the only language, as it is said that while in prison, James learnt to speak more languages including Spanish, Italian, Hebrew and Latin.

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He also wrote 19 poems on St Helena Island. His most epic ode paid homage to the vast hoardes of mosquitoes that mercilessly preyed upon the prisoners. Hear the full poem entitled [Mosquitoes in the Stockade](#) spoken by Ranger Daley Donnelly, recorded as part of the Queensland State Archives Birdcage of the Bay project You're in for a treat!

2 sentences of 25 years gaol, served concurrently, for Mail Robbery must have felt impossible for James to conceive. But he was lucky as he knew the right people in the right places, as evidenced by a petition for his release signed by certain members of both houses of Parliament, Clergy, Justices of the Peace and others.

James was discharged 22 Dec 1874 after serving 8 years and 3.5 months. Mr W Brown, Visiting Justice stated: "During the time on the island, his conduct with one exception has been remarkably good when in jail. I believe the prisoner to be thoroughly reformed...Certainly great lenience was shown towards James, for serving such a short sentence.

But the gesture it was not ill placed, as on his release, James never went back to bushranging. In 1878, he eloped with 17 year old Elizabeth and had 7 children while working as a stockman, a drover, and a stonecutter. James died on the 23rd July 1895 after falling from a horse at Burketown, where he is buried fondly remembered for his generosity, fearlessness, and endurance.

The town of Gin Gin continues to remember James McPherson's presence in the area, with 'The Wild Scotchman' markets, statue and a large festival annually in March.
